OTTAWA, March 16.—There was a breeze

n the House this afternoon before the debate on Mr. McCarthy's resolution was resumed. It arose over the reading of a published cablegram conveying to the Canadian public Sir Charles Tupper's indignation at the conduct of the Canadian Government in declining to ask Parliament to ratify the treaty, and his statement that it was the Government's own treaty, approved by them in the draft and signed by him as their representative. Mr. Lister wanted to know if it was true that Sir Charles only acted as instructed. Mr. Foster said the whole cablegram was based on the tundamental error of supposing that he had said he would not ask Parliament to ratify the treaty this session. He had simply said he would not then ask the House to ratify it. There was no insult as stated in the cable to the French or British Governments or to Sir Charles Tupper.

Mr. Edgar read from the official documents the cablegram from Sir John Thompon on Feb. 6 to Sir Charles Tupper in Paris, stating that he did not understand the propositions or terms on either side. The remarkable thing was that on the day that Canada's First Minister cabled his entire failure to understand the terms of the treaty, it was signed on behalf of Canthe treaty, it was signed on behalf of Canada, by her accredited representative. Mr. Mills believed a very grave blunder had been committed in the negotiations. Mr. Davies and Sir Richard Cartwright thought that if the doubt existed in the public mind Mr Foster should say frankly and plainly whether the Government proposed to ask Parliament to ratify the treaty.

 $\times \times \times$ Mr. Foster said he stood by his previous statement, and unless the conditions changed he would not change his words. changed he would not change his words. This was taken to mean the rejection of the treaty. Several members demanded, also, a reply to Sir Charles Tupper's statement in an official cablegram that the treaty had been signed in accordance with the precise instructions and authority transmitted to him from Ottawa. In reply to all the speakers Mr. Foster referred them to the papers brought down and declined to answer the questions put to him in any other way. Dr. Borden took the ground that if Sir Charles Tupper's statement was correct, then this was the Government's treaty, and they were bound to submit it to Parliament for action. The matter then dropped. matter then dropped.

Mr. Foster, in reply to Mr. Bowers, read details of the industries in Digby, N. B. Laughter was caused by the number of bakeries, dressmakers, and kindred "in-kin. dustries" which swelled the total. Discrimination in favor of Great Britain would involve like discrimination in favor of all other countries with which Britain had favored nation treaties, and those countries would get more benefit than Britain. The adoption of Mr. McCarthy's policy, he said, would close Canadian factories and give outsiders control of Canada's markets.

Mr. Davin urged the Government to yield to the pressure for tariff reform. He denied Mr. Foster's statement that the denied Mr. Foster's statement that the farmers of the country were not taxed. Farmers were taxed heavier by the N. P. than any other class, and there was no reason tariffreform in their interest should be delayed. He quoted Joseph Howe's statement that it was useless to quote his old speeches against himself, at there was no authority he had such a contempt for. Mr. McCarthy had given reasons for changing his opinions, and those reasons must be dealt with. He regretted that the clause of the resolution proposing discrimination in favor of Great Britain precluded him from voting for the resolution.

The debate was continued by Mesers. Coatsworth, Stevenson and Kenny. The latter made a long speech in favor of the latter made a long speech in favor of the N. P. and grew facetious at Mr. McCarthy's expense. It was, he said, actually a race between Mr. Tarte, Mr. McCarthy and Count Mercier as to who should lead the Opposition. Dr. Landerkin-"Has the honorable gentleman enlisted for Ulster under the Comptroller of Customs." (Laughter.) Mr. Kenny-"I don't change my coat or my ulster." In conclusion Mr. Kenny declared against specific duties as a rule.

Mr. Laurier rose at 10:30 to explain the vote he intended to give on this question. There was a good deal in Mr. McCarthy's vote he intended to give on this question. There was a good deal in Mr. McCarthy's motion of which he approved. In some particulars it was not commendable. The burdensome nature of the tariff had been established in this debate. There was a growing discontent in the country due to the tariff and its injuities, and he was prepared to vote in favor of a motion effirming these things. But while he did so, he did not intend to be bound by the proposition with which the motion concluded. The resolution could not be amended and they must weigh the balances for and sgainst the resolution as a whole. The last proposition in the resolution for a caduction of duties on British goods was based on sentiment. If it was simply a proposition to reduce the duties on British goods alone it would be a proposition to be discussed on its merits, but the resolution included as well all those countries with which Great Britain had commercial treaties. An important deputation representing the wine manufacturers and grape growers of Ontario waited on the Minister of Finance this afternoon and protested against the French treaty, which admits French wines at a reduction of 30 per cent. A memorial signed by all the interests affected was read by Mr. Ernest Girardot, of Sandwich. Among other things it recited the following: "Any change in the wine tariff immediately concerns the grape-growers and manufacturers of Canada, and these industries are at present in their infancy, and should need encouragement rather than adverse legislation. We hope that legislation involving the material interests of thousands of our industrious citizens and the loss to them of hundreds of thousands of dollars will not be enacted without compensation or the necessary provisions for the protection of those whose business would thereby be ruined. A certain effect of the proposed treaty would be the flooding of this country with cheap and spurious wines, in which grape juice will hardly, if ever, be present, and an indirect incentive also to the Canadian manufacturer to make spurious wines. The freight rates on wines shipped directly to Canada from France or other European ports are very much less than the rates we have to pay to our railways in Canada. For example, the freight charges on a consignment from Bordeaux, France, to Windsor, Ont., is less than one-half the cost of the freight on a similar consignment from Windsor to Montreal, although the distance between Bordeaux and Windsor is over five times that between Windsor and Montreal. An idea of the magnitude of the grape-growing interest and wine manufacture in Canada can be had when the following facts are taken into consideration: There are at least 5, 000 acres of land planted in vines, capable of producing 1,500,000 gallons of wines perhaps 1,000,000 annually are now produced. Ontario alone has an area suitified without certain restrictions, and a

Dr. Anna Shaw's Eloquent Plea for Her Enfranchisement.

A Large Audience Unanimously Indorses the Principle.

The Lecture a Masterpiece of Oratory and Incisive Logic-Anti-Suffrage Arguments Shattered Resolution To Be Forwarded the Dominion and Ontario

The Talbot Street Baptist Church was crowded upstairs and down last night on the occasion of Dr. Anna Shaw's lecture on "Woman's Enfranchisement." The lecture was not only an able, earnest plea for the enfranchisement of women, but an entertaining treat as well, the speaker's bright and witty sallies impregnating the address from start to finish, causing an almost continual ripple of merriment. Again at times the lecturer was extremely pathetic and her eloquent portrayal of the injustice under which woman suffers caused the sympathies of the entire audience to go out to them and their cause. The Rev. It a Smith, passor, occupied the chair and on the platform with him besides the lecturer were Mrs. May R. Thornley, president W. C. T. U., Mrs. Dr. Eccles, Mrs. Sheriff Glass, Mr. John Cameron, Rev. W. J. Clark and Rev. Wm. Godwin. The two last named gentlemen took part in the exercises. The Talbot Street Baptist Church

After the singing of "Lead Me Gently Home" by the church quartet, the chairman introduced the speaker in a short advantage of the speaker in man introduced the speaker in a short address. Among other things London was noted for, he said, was its progressiveness, and one of her most progressive institutions was the W. C. T. U. "Of which," said Mr. Smith, "I am sure every citizen is proud except the whisky party. (Applause.) They mean business and they mean to achieve, at no distant day, the entire overthrow of the liquor traffic. One of the means by which they expect to overcome it is the ballot for women, a plea for which we are going to hear to night."

night."
Dr. Shaw is not a stranger to a London audience, and on rising she was greeted with a ringing burst of applause. The speaker commenced her lecture by telling about a discussion she had had with Rev. Dr. about a discussion she had had with Rev. Dr. Buckley at one of the greatest Chautauqua circles in the world on the question of the ballot for women. She took the affirmative and Dr. Butley the negative, and the latter's chief argument was that it was impossible for women to understand problems from the standpoint of men. It was impossible for them to discuss them from man's standpoint, and therefore he asked whether women should preach and teach as men taught and preached, because they could not do it. "Now I am sure," said Dr. Shaw, "there is not a woman among us who for a moment would be disposed to contest the truth of the offmion that women cannot discuss questions from the standpoint of men; while that is true the converse is equally true—man cannot discuss or understand questions from the standpoint of woman. And therefore to understand both sides of the question, it is necessary that it should be discussed from the standpoint of both men and women. There never has existed and inever will exist, a perfect system of government without woman having an equal chance, equal opportunities, and bearing equally the burden of government with men, enjoying the privileges of the same." The speaker held that the purposes for which government was established were three in number and outside of these three purposes there was no possible excuse for the existence of a government at all: (1) For the protection of person and property, (2) for the administration of justice, (3) for the Buckley at one of the greatest Chautauque protection of person and property, (2) for the administration of justice, (3) for the development of society. "Now those," said the speaker, "are the three things for which governments are established, and it is because we women believe this in its highest sense that the women of to-day are selving for the ballst?"

highest sense that the women of to-day are asking for the ballot."

There are many objections raised to the enfranchisement of women that have nothing to do with the question under consideration. You hear first that if women are permitted to vote, evil women will vote as well as good. The gentleman who raised that objection told me he would not object to women voting if he could pick them out, and I said, "Sir, that is exactly how we women feel about you men, but we cannot and I said, "Sir, that is exactly how we women feel about you men, but we cannot pick you out; neither can you pick us out. You have just got to take us like you take eggs, the good and the bad alike." Senator Ingalls has said that if women were admitted to the ballot it would add in the United States, 2,000,000 or 3,000,000 illiterate voters. Now the trouble with Senator Ingalls is that he parts his hair exactly in the middle and he parts his figures on one side. (Laughter.) It is true that we might add 2,000,000 of intelligent voters, and with the 9,000,000 intelligent voters, and with the 9,000,000 intelligent votes we would wipe out the illiterate voter, both men and women, and have a majority of 3,000,000 left.

"We hear again that if women were permitted to vote there would be trouble in families because husbands and wives would not agree. Of course it is assumed that husbands and wives all agree now, but in my short life I have found exceptions to the rule. Well, what of it if men and women would not agree perfectly in their homes? Homes are not heavenly new, and the man that would disagree with his wife on politics would be apt to disagree with her on other things. We believe that the average mangist tolerably decent, and a tolerably decent man would not agree with him in politics."

It had been said that women would be shocked by the rough manners and excitement of men at the polis, but in Kansas, where the women had the ballot, the ludicrous politeness manifested by the men, and the candidates espocially, was productive of a good lauph under the able portrayal of the lecturer. "Nover in my life," she said, "have I seen such gallantry, such devotion. Every man who was in the field was just dwing en feel about you men, but we cannot

my life," she said, 'bave I seen such gallantry, such devotion. Every man who was in the field was just dying to be hitching post and everything else for every woman who drove to the polls. If it had been July instead of April, every man would have been sunstruck because they stood with their hats off all day long. The speaker gave instances from the same State, where women did not always vote long to carry lady voters to the polls to vote the other ticket. One man, where Dr.

Shaw was staying found his wife to be doing that, but instead of the expected family quarrel the cld man only laughed and felt proud of her. "That old girl," he said, "got ahead of me the day I popped the question and she has kept it ever since." (Laughter and applause.) If husband and wife were true husband and wife, the speaker said that they would no more quarrel over politics than they would over anything else. "But," said the doctor, "if men are so quarrelsome, then in the name of justice disfranchise the quarrelsome husband and enfranchise the peaceable wife." wife."
The speaker went on to tell of the argu

wife."

The speaker went on to tell of the argument used by Dr. Hammond and others, that men's heads measured more around than woman's. "Well, what if they do?" asked Miss Shaw, "the head of a donkey measures more around than the head of a man." (Laughter.) Dr. Hammond had also claimed that the brains of men weighed more than the brains of women, therefore men are superior to women. But when the women took this matter up they found they were weighing the brains of distinguished men like Daniel Webster, Goethe and others, and they had to admit that they had never weighed the brain of any woman who had not died a pauper or on the scaffold. The man who had invented the brain weighing scheme, she said, had laid down a set rule that a learned man's brain should weigh so much, an ordinary man's brain so much, and a fool's brain so much, but when he died and they went to weigh his brain they found his brain corresponding exactly in weight with the fool's. This set Dr. Hammond thinking again, and two years later he took his first article all back by saying that it had been discovered that the intellect depended not on the size of the brain, but on the quality; and then the speaker urged that all that was necessary

saying that it had been discovered that the intellect depended not on the size of the brain, but on the quality; and then the speaker urged that all that was necessary to show the quality of woman's brain was to throw open the colleges to her and her brain would speak for itself. (Applause greeted this remark.) The contentions held by some that women should not toote because they could not invent anything and that the life insurance companies would not insure them, were ably handled by the speaker. In the first place she showed that women were not only inventors, but good inventors too; but leaving that out of the question, when a man was given a vote he did not have to pass an examination relative to his inventing powers, then why should women? While the life insurance companies would not insure their lives except on a death policy, they charged women just as much for that sure their lives except on a death policy, they charged women just as much for that as they charged a man for both a life and a death policy. But when it came down to paying the bills there was never anything said about woman's incompetency; oh, no.

The speaker claimed that there should be nothing in a government that would harm women in taking part in the affairs of a nation, and there was nothing in woman that would harm the government by reason of her taking part. Women, she claimed, were as interested as the men in the protection of person and property; especially

of her taking part. Women, she claimed, were as interested as the men in the protection of person and property; especially the latter, when the law allowed women so little to protect. "Why, we build our court houses and put our statue of Justice on top, and there she sits and reigns and rules. There are two places in a court house where women have perfect freedom and liberty—on the peak of the roof and in the prisoner's box. So, of course, we are interested in justice. I have always wondered why even a marble Justice could hold the scales so evenly when women had so little justice, but I found out one day that in order to get her to hold them straight you men had to bandage her eyes. If her eyes were opened she would drop the sgales quicker than lightning. (Laughter.) In the harbor of New York we have the statue of Liberty, a woman, and she has her back turned to the United States, and no wonder she is ashamed of a country where women have so little liberty.

Women are interested in the administra-Women are interested in the administration of justice and in the changes of laws. Why I heard the other day, that in this land of Canada, in such a land as this, in a city not 100 miles from here, a judge decided, in a case where a man beat his wife, that a man had a right to beat his wife. And we are living in the nineteenth century, in a Christian land and where the sovereign head is a woman. I don't wonder that the Moslems sent over a missionary to America to convert the missionary to America to convert the Christians to heathendom. (Laughter.) You put a premium on your widows here in Canada. They know better than that on the other side. Why, you give your wid-ows votes, and it is a wonder to me that ows votes, and it is a wonder to me that you men are not scared out of your lives around election time for fear that your wives would want to become widows in order to vote."

The marrying question then occupied the speaker's attention. The \$1,000 woman, she said, thought several times before marring the 10 cent man. (Laughter.) It had come to such a pass in woman, she said, thought several times before marring the 10 cent man. (Laughter.) It had come to such a pass in the United States now that if a woman refuses to marry a man he kills her, and, she continued, if she does marry him he kills her anyhow. (Laughter.) The speaker calculated that there were 3,000 women murdered in the United States last year and only 329 of the murderers suffered the penalty of their crime In haif the States of the Union the speake. claimed that the women did not own their own clothes, and they were virtually wearing their husband's clothes, for they belonged to him. (Laughter and applause.) In some States a woman could not own a part of the family burying ground and could not be buried at the side of her husband if an officious mother-in-law wanted to serve an injunction and stay proceedings. In five States of the Union a woman did not own her own child, and the vivid word picture of the scene of distress that a court house presented when a judge awarded a mother-in-law the baby that was willed to her by her son when it was yet unborn, brought tears to many eyes. "Have you'justice like that in Canada?" she asked as she left the subject.

"Then, are women interested in the development of society? The large majority of the philanthropic work of the world is done by women and the large majority of church members in the world are the women. When the 7 o'clock movement was advocated in your city was it not a question that caused the women to arise; and why? Because it affected the women, and it affected society and the development of the race is of the highest interest to women. Therefore I claim that women are as interested as men in the work of protecting personal property, in the administration of justice and in the protection of society."

"Since government cannot injure women and women cannot injure the government, then the disfranchisement of women is without the least possible excuse, and the greatest wrong of the nineteenth century. No government shall ever exist in the highest and truest sense until the voice of the people shall be heard and the voice of the people is the voice of God, and, as the voice of the people comprise the whole range from soprano to bass, and all humanity, when it is heard in its true sense, then shall a nation know what the voice of God is, and then the voice of God will be crystallized in the laws of our land."

then the voice of God will be crystallized in the laws of our land."

At the close of the lecture, a resolution was moved. In proposing it, Mr. John Comeron said he was entirely against withholding any franchise from women. Men should promote this enfranchisement, for the highest good of the whole community. He quoted Lady Henry Somerset, who recently said: "Those who oppose women voting may be right or they may be wrong on general principles, but to do so as temperance reformers would be about as sane as for soldiers to throw away their bullets before going into battle. Men are powerless to win the battle. Hence overy advocate of prohibition is bound to be an out-and-out advocate of the citizenship of women." Mr. Cameron then moved the following resolution: in the laws of our land.

" RESOLVED, That in tendering as we do our hearty thanks to the lecturer of the evening, this meeting of citizens desires to be placed on record as advocating full and equal rights for women, as regards the franchise, feeling persuaded that to every moral reform woman's vote would powerfully contribute, and we take this position not alone on the ground of equal personal rights, nor alone because so many thoughtful women desire the franchise, but for the sake of the highest interests of society; and further resolved, that the chairman of this meeting be requested to forward a copy of this resolution to the Premierr of the Dominion and of the Province respectively."

The resolution was seconded by Rev. W. The resolution was seconded by Rev. W.J. Clark, who said he did so on the ground of equal rights and fair play. He had been led to this view largely also by developments in the line of social reform in this city, and from having had opportunity of observing the noble work in London of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, under the leadership of its judicious and consecrated president, Mrs. Thornley. Mr. Clark also paid a graceful compliment to

The resolution was then put by the chairman. A forest of hands went up affirmatively. The call for "those opposed" did not reveal one dissentient. The motion was thereupon declared unanimously carried.

The doxology and benediction concluded one of the most successful and educative meetings ever held in London.

And Withdraws All Opposition to the Railway Bill.

An Agreement Satisfactory to Both Sides.

The Forest City Now Sole Possessor the Road-\$18,76 the Price Paid-Public-Spirited Citizens Deposit \$10,000 and Guarantee the Balance—The City Council to Take Over the Bonds from

The city of London is the sole owner of the London and Port Stanley Railway!

Their Hands.

This is the effect of an important deal which was consummated in this city yesterday afternoon, the consenting parties thereto being practically the city of London on the one hand and the city of St. Thomas on the other. The former was represented in making the deal by a number of leading citizens, the latter by Mayor Oill. Line

PARTICULARS OF THE DEAL. As a result the weeks of aggravating delay and unexpected difficulties in con-nection with the London and Port Stanley

nection with the London and Port Stanley Railway Bill are at an end. By an arrangement, mutually satisfactory, St. Thomas withdraws its opposition to the bill, which, it is hoped, will receive the sanction of the railway committee of the House of Commons to-day.

The agreement arrived at yesterday, already foreshadowed in the ADVERTISER, is as follows: The citizens of London mentioned below agree to purchase from St. Thomas the first mortgage bonds held by that city of the face value of \$38,276, the third mortgage bonds of \$10,637 and the interest of that city in the 328 shares held by it. The entire sum to be paid is \$38,276—the face value of the first mortgage bonds. The purchasers have deposited \$10,000 cash in the Molsons Bank to the credit of the city of St. Thomas and guarantee to pay the balance, \$28,276, in 90 days. This will give London absolute ownership and control of the road. The following are the relative values of the bonds owned by London and St. Thomas:

MR. M'CARTHY'S RESOLUTION. Mr. D'Alton McCarthy's resolution denouncing the high tax policy, and calling for an immediate reduction in the tariff, was voted down by the followers of Sir John Thompson in the House of Commons.

No other result was expected. Anyone who has sat in the galleries of the House knows how difficult it is to change votes on the floor of the chamber.

The Liberals, agreeing almost entirely with every declaration in Mr. McCarthy's resolution, voted for it; but the Conservative members, with the exception of Messrs. McCarthy, O'Brien and Hodgins, voted in favor of the programme that meets with favor by the combines. In fact, members of Parliament who have themselves large interests in the cotton, sugar, and other rings by which this country is cursed, were the chief speakers in opposition to Mr. Mc-Carthy. Their principal plea was the fact that in its early stages the member for North Simcoe was himself a supporter of the National Policy, and that his judgment was not to be trusted now. As if it were the duty of a public man to live a life of deseption, to lie that party interests might be served, while the majority of the people suffered—all because at one time had thought differently from what the logic of events compels him to think now !

Though the resolution was voted down,

we are satisfied that its main features meet with the approval of the large majority of Canadians. Its defeat gives no discouragement to tariff reformers. They know that the present majority does not represent the sentiments of the country, and are confident that when the time does come for s general election they will have the assistance of thousands of men like D'Alton Mc-Carthy and Mr. Hodgins, who have discovered the fallacy of attempting to make people prosperous and contented by taxing the many for the benefit of a few already rich.

A CORRESPONDENT of the Detroit News who has just visited Ottawa, suggests that the mace be used to kill dull and prolix erators. Is the motion seconded by Dr.

SOUTH MIDDLESEX ELECTION. On Wednesday next the election of a member of Parliament, to take the seat occupied by the late James Armstrong, will

be held in South Middlesex. The constituency is a Liberal one. The majority of the electors have always been in favor of tariff reform and progressive legislation. There have been occasions, however, when relying on the knowledge that the normal Liberal majority was large, many Liberals did not take the trouble to go to the polls.

In a bye-election the tendency is to take things easy.

But in view of the important issue at stake it is the privilege, nay, it is the duty, of every elector to go to the polls and register his vote for those principles which he believes will most effectively tend to his individual welfare and to the prosperity of the whole community.

There are two candidates in the field. Reeve Boston, of Lobo, is the candidate of the Liberals of the riding, as chosen in convention.

Mr. Gray is the candidate of the Conservtive party, chosen in the same manner.

Mr. Boston's platform cannot be mis taken. It is for a radical reduction of the present tariff. He takes the ground that even so strong a Conservative as Mr. Mc-Carthy has been denounced by the Conservative leaders for holding: that no Government can help the farmer or wageearner by adding to his taxation. The only way in which the farmer can be helped is by reducing his taxes, by combatting the combines, by giving him new markets in which to sell his products. The wageearner will prosper just as the farmer prospers. "The farmer feeds us all" is a

true saying. Mr. Gray, on the other hand, professes to repudiate the party which brought him out. Off the platform, in the side lines, he is a no-party man-if his hearer is a Liberal. On the platform, he would fain ask for votes as a man who would go to Ottawa unallied with parties. Mr. Gray undoubtedly is the Conservative candidate, and as such he must stand or fall by the determination of the leaders of that party to uphold a "protective" tariff which presses most heavily upon the farmers and wage-earners. Even were he to go to Parliament pledged to tariff reduction, as Dr. Roome, as Mr. Ingram, as Mr. Marshall were, what guarantee have the electors that he would not succumb to the seductive wiles of Sir John Thompson and the combine agents, as did these men. Dr. Roome pledged himself to support the Patrons of Industry platform. Is it not notorious that when tax reduction, called for by the Patrons, came before the House, he joined Sir John Thompson in opposing it every time? The other Conservative M.Ps. mentioned also went back on their pre-election promises to the farmers and wage-earners the moment that the bosses at

Ottawa demanded that humiliation. With these examples before them, how can the electors of South Middlesex take stock in the protestations of the candidate who is daily groomed by so proounced high tariff advocates as Messrs. Chisholm and Thomas?

As it is, the only tax which Mr. Gray would consent to have reduced is that on binder twine, as if there were not a hundred and one taxes on other necessaries to life and happiness in this Dominion that

are altogether too excessive. If the electors of South Middlesex desire to promote genuine tariff reform, and thus take from their backs a portion of the burden they are now called upon to bear, that millionaires may profit and may help political adventurers in return for opportunity to tax the many, they can best secure the reform by defeating the Conservative and high tax candidate by an overwhelming

majority. Let every elector go to the polls.

IT IS said that Senator Tasse and Mr. Adam Brown, postmaster of Hamilton, will be the paid commissioners of the Dominion Government to the Chicago Exhibition. Doesn't Mr. Carling come in anywhere?

THE CENSUS.

The Opposition are not satisfied with the last census, neither were they with the one before that. It is impossible to please them.—[London Free Press.

If our contemporary will turn to the debates in Parliament, and to every independent newspaper in Canada, it will find that not the Opposition alone, but a wide section of the Conservative party hold that the census is neither satisfactory nor com-

pleted with honesty.

Mr. McCarthy is not a member of the Opposition, yet he holds that the census, so far as it relates to manufacturing in-dustries is absolutely worthless.

Mr. Hodgins, member for Carleton

represents probably the most Conservative constituency in Ontario-one that returned Sir John Macdonald himself-and he, too, has voted want of confidence in the census and the Government under which it was compiled.

We have Col. O'Brien, the stalwart Muskoka representative, speaking out boldly on the same line. In the debate on

boldly en the same line. In the debate on Thursday night the colonel declared:

"As one who had supported the N. P. since 1878, he now denounced it as having given rise to many evils. He would give the farmers relief by decreasing their expenditure and increasing their purchasing power. He condemned a protection system. He did not think the country was prosperous, and the figures of the census intended to bolster up such a belief were simply rubbish. The figures made him lose confidence in the infallibility of the Minister of Finance. Dealing with Mr. Foster's speech he said that the Government evidently thought itself a little providence. One would think they were gods sitting on Olympus instead of twelve ordinary mortals—very ordinary."

This is the opinion of a pronounced Conservative. It is suppressed in the Free

Conservative. It is suppressed in the Free Press report of Parliament, but nevertheless it stands unanswered.

Our contemporary's denunciation is thus altogether too restricted. If it means to see Sir John Thompson through whensoever he gets into a hole, it will have to widen its condemnation to include a large number of persons in and out of Parliament who have up till recently sailed in the same boat as itself, but who, in view of recent revelations regarding the padding of the census, the partnership of the Adminis-tration in the combines, and the determination, for party interests, to ignore the public welfare, are like Col. O'Brien heartily sick of the present regime.

ROBERT BOSTON, Liberal, and Alexander Gray, Conservative, were nominated as can-didates for the Commons in South Middle-sex yesterday. The only question is Mr. Boston's majority.—[Hamilton Times.

That is so. But nothing must be taken for granted. Every tariff reformer, every man who favors a radical reduction in the tax burdens of the people must see to it that he records his vote for Mr. Boston bright and early next Wednesday.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

Is a grocer liable under the Ontario Act respecting the sale of tobacco to minors when filling a verbal order given by a minor for groceries for parents in which tobacco is included, no written order from parent for tobacco having at any time been given requesting the grocer to give the child tobacco when sent for it, but it being customary for the children of said parents to give verbal orders for groceries (tobacco included) and carry the goods home, the groceries and tobacco being charged to parents' account? And secondly, would the grocer be any more liable, providing the child pays for the goods (tobacco included) when ordered, the goods being carried away by the child, who is under 18 years of age? An answer will oblige An Interested Parent.

[Note. - The statute is intended to cover both cases presented by you, but in our opinion the grocer would not be liable upon the facts firstly stated because the tobacco is not sold, given or furnished to the minor, but to his parents. When, however, the sale is to the minor, who pays for it, and there is no written request or order of the parent or guardian as secondly stated by you, we are clearly of opinion that the second section of the act applies and that the grocer is liable to the penalty. The statute only came into force on July 1 last, and has not yet been judicially interpreted. -EDITOR ADVERTISER.]

This afternoon, the bill incorporating the London and Port Stanley syndicate and the bill ratifying the agreement between the syndicate and the city passed the railway committee of the Dominion Parliament. Only a few minor amendments were deemed necessary, and in all probability the two measures will pass through the House without further alteration.

The efforts of Mr Joseph Jeffery and J. W. Little, supplemented by the indorsation of the City Council, resulted in the withdrawal of all opposition by the St. Thomas authorities. It was a wise step for those gentlemen to acquire control of the small quantity of stock held by St. Thomas. By acquiring full control of all the resources of the road, St. Thomas could offer no further opposition to the bargain. It was doubly necessary to adopt this course, after the mayor and council had been informed that Mr. Haggart, Minister of Public Works, insisted on recognizing the claim of the neighboring city.

As a business transaction, the ac-quirement of the St. Thomas stock is perfectly defensible, and as a precaution it was absolutely necessary.

Citizens generally will rejoice to find all obstacles to the bargain now withdrawn, and will hope that the syndicate will be able to proceed with the full development of the traffic. The members of the syndicate appear to be energetic gentlemen, bent on making the most of their possessions, and they deserve success.


