STILL AT IT.

Montreal, June 2.—Bishop Lafleche, Conservative bishop of Three Rivers, Que., speaking at Champlain a few days ago, repeated to a large extent his Three Rivers sermon against Mr. Laurier and the Liberal party. called upon the people to defeat Mr. Laurier's candidates, and declared that though he was 78 years old he would make his whole diocese against Mr. Laurier before he died. He also denounced certain Liberal papers, without, however, naming them, saying that he did not want to get into any legal trouble. He has also ordered the priests of his diocese to denounce

Liberal candidates. When Bishop Conroy, the Papal delegate, came to Three Rivers a few years ago, it is well known that the chief object of his visit to that diocese was in consequence of complaints made to Rome to the effect that the bishop and many priests of the diocese use of the pulpit to speak against the Liberal party. Bishop Con-roy gave strict orders that politics should not be alluded to in the pulpit in future, and stated plainly that every elector had the right to vote according to his conscience, without any clerical

The famous suspension bridge at Niagara Falls, built in 1855, is to be superseded by a new steel structure, with an arch 550 feet long and 260 zeet above the water level. Since 1867, when the Dominion was confederated, there have been nine Dominion elections in this city-seven general and two bye. The first contest was between Messrs. The English bicycling world is deeply excited over the Simpson versus plain chain competitions, to take place at the Catford track, near London, next Saturday. Simpson has wagered \$5,000 to \$500 that bicycles fitted with his lever chain will beat any others at any distance. By way of rendering assurance doubly sure, however, he has retained the fastest professional riders— Linton, who holds the mile record of the world; Michael, the preceding holder of the record, and several others. The editor of the Irish Field, a physician who has gone cycle mad, and has made a fortune out of Dunlop tires, took up the challenge, but has been left with second-grade men to ride for him. He promises, however, that when the race takes place there will be a sensational revelation. This is taken to mean that he has some new frictionsaving chain which he has seized for advertising at this unexampled oppor-

A. A. Chase, the London racing man, in a trial at Wood Green on May 14, lowered the 50 mile world's track record by 2 minutes 59 4-5 seconds, his time being 1:45:38 3-5. He was ahead of previous figures from the 45th mile. The record from York to London, in England, was beaten a fortnight ago by George Hunt, by more than 41 minutes. He covered the 169 3-4 miles in 10 hours 48 minutes.

Thousands of people watched the race of horseless carriages which began at noon on Saturday in New York. There were six machines in line, the course being about 30 miles to Irving-ton-on-the Hudson and back. The contest ended 7 hours and 13 minutes after the start, with one wagon alone in the race, finishing in a walk, and the others not heard from. Lavigne won in eighteen rounds. The fight was to be limited to twenty rounds. ROASTED TO DEATH.

Five Pennsylvania Miners Meet Terrible Pate.

Shamokin, Pa., June 2.—Five miners were horribly roasted by an explosion at the Buck Ridge colliery yesterday. Two of them are dying from their injuries, and there is but slight hope of the recovery of the others. 


