Then a French doctor, by name Calmette, discovered that small doses of attenuated cobra poison, heated to about 212 degrees, rendered rabbits so perfectly immunized that a tions that Russia has paid to her dose of pure cobra poison sufficient to kill eighty rabbits could be introduced into the blood of one of them without

any danger to its health. The serum blood of such rabbits applied, to other animals. It was tried on donkeys, and a cure was invariably recorded. To use the serum in the case of men bitten by snakes was the next step, and the best results have been obtained. The serum was prepared, bottled and sent to India, and it maintained its properties for a relatively long period. Serumtheraphy for snake bites thus seems to be thoroughly vindicated. As in India alone upwards of 20,000 persons lose their lives every year by the bites of deadly reptiles, it will be a great achievement


