

What ever may be the correct figure, this has been demonstrated beyond doubt, namely that 10 per cent of the milk in churns sent into the cities of Liverpool, Manchester, Birmingham, Leeds and Sheffield contains the "living infection of tuberculosis." Further, there is plenty of evidence that meat affected with tubercle is also disposed of for human food to a considerable extent. In connec tion with my duties as medical officer of health to Portsmouth I have become possessed of direct evidence that milch cows in advanced stages staid days: of tuberculosis are systematically sold in open market for human con-sumption. AUCKLAND DINES THE U.S. TARS

Pacific Fleet by New Zealand's Capital.

Auckland, N. Z., Aug. 10 .- The Government gave a banquet to Rear Ad-American battleship fleet now anchored in this harbor, at the drill hall tonight. There were 750 persons in attendance, and the affair was carried out on a magnificent scale. The Prime Minister of New Zealand, Sir Joseph George Ward, proposed a toast to King Edward and President Roosevelt, during the course of which he said: "Each is a born ruler, richly endow-

ed with common sense and a great ardent lover of his country and people Each is a peacemaker. The American navy is one of the greatest and most efficient forces in the world.

"We are proud of Admiral Sperry's visit, and no fleet save a British one is so welcome."

When Rear Admiral Sperry rose to reply to the Prime Minister's toast he received a tremendous ovation. He he could safely say there was nothing nearer to the heart of President Roosevelt than the cordial welcome extended by New Zealanders to the fleet, and he was confident that it was also agreeable to the King.

After the sun went down a fireworks display was held on shore in conjunction with the illuminations, and searchlights of the ships in the harbor. 




