LIBERTY LOAN HAS FIVE BILLION MARK

Washington, D. C., Oct. 29.—Returns from the second liberty loan campaign reaching the treasury department early today give no efinite indication as to the amount say forbled. The full measure of the nation's response probably will not be known definitely before the latter part of the week.

Treasury officials, on the basis of returns at hand, were unable to say whether subscriptions to the loan had passed the \$5,000,000,000 mark, although they were agreed the chances are that the figures approximate this amount. Reports to the department said that reserve bank officials and local loan committees, after yesterday's breathing spell, were hand at work in an effort to complete their tabulations of returns. They have until Thursday to make final reports.

He admitted there had been great anxiety in regard to Triest, which had now been removed.

Paris, Oct. 29 .- An attack was made by the Germans last night on the Verdun front near Chaume Wood. The war office reports that they gained a footing in advanced French positions but that the greater part of the ground was regained in a counter-attack. Heavy artillery fighting continues on the Aisne front and in Flanders. The

"South of St. Quentin we made an attack which enabled us to bring back a machine gun and prisoners.

"On the Aisne front spirited artillery fighting occurred near Hurtebise and in the sector north of Vaudesson.

"Our detachments penetrated German trenches in the Argonne and on the left bank of the Meuse, bringing back ten prisoners. On the right bank of the Meuse, the German artillery violently bombarded our positions on the front between Chaume Wood and Bezonvaux.

CANNERS' PRODUCTS TAKEN-UNDER CARE OF FOOD CONTROLLER

No Future Sales Before February 1 in U.S.A.

Washington, Oct. 29.—Special regulations to prevent speculation in canned goods will be put into operation November 1 by the food administration. All canners will be placed under license and forbidden to make future sales of canned corn, peas, tematoes, salmon and sardines before February 1. This date later may be extended, depending on the needs of the Allies and the American military forces.

As in other industries controlled by the food administration, canners will be required to sell their products at a reasonable margin of profit, regardless of market conditions or replacement values.

U. S. SECRETARY OF WAR IS EXPECTING A GERMAN RETREAT

Foresces Some Important Developments Soon.

HAS GREAT FAITH IN ITALY

Points Out She Stemmed the Former Teutonic Rush In Quick Time.

Washington, Oct. 29.—Important developments are impending in the great war, Secretary Baker indicates in his official review of last week's operations on all front, which concludes with the brief statement that certain units of the American forces in France have taken their places on the battlefront to complete their training. This is the war department's first mention of the fact that Gen. Pershing's men are on the firing line.

It is the wave of activity during the week on nearly every front, however, that caugh the secretary's attention. Significant operations are in progress, be says, both east and west, on the Italian fronts, in Macedonia, Rumania, Mesopotamia and even in East Africe On the western front, he said, a new strate. gic retreat of the German forces appears to be the next move expected, and they must move back under critical conditions from between the two wedges, those of Flanders and the Aisne, which have been driven relentlessly into their line by the British and French.

Italy is passing through a difficult moment, Mr. Baker says. The Austro-German drive is being pressed forward by imposing forces. But once before Italy stemmed the tide of an Austrian rush, under less favorable conditions for the defenders, he points out, and hurled the enemy back with only a taste of victory during the first days of his terrific onslaught. "The story of how the Canadians captured the important vantage point on Passchenhaele Ridge adds another epic to the Canadians' great records. Their objective was a little moss-colored spurcurying around U-shaped from the man ridge. Its capture was the principal achievement in a day of heroic struggling against the overpowering elements.

Strongest of Defences.

The Canadians attacked from two directions, their right pressing along the main ridge and the left working round towards the Believue spur. These positions lay in a broad gully which heavy rains had made impassable, preventing the attacks from attacking frontally. Progress was slow, as the whole face of the spur was thick with blockhouses spitting forth deadly salvos. Prisoners taken are unanimous in the belief that the defences were regarded as the strongest organization of resistance on this front. It had been ordered that the place must be held until the entire garrison was killed, because the enemy regarded it as a vital link in the ridge system.

Withdrew Bu' Returned.

The right struggled forward, gradually overcoming obstacles. The left was frequently checked by fire from the network of bockhouses. While pressing up the slope the men were frequently hipdeep in the mire. With their rifles balanced on their shoulders horizontally they struggled onwards thus for six hours, until in view of the impossibility of the task they were ordered to withdraw and returned to their original assembly line, where they were refreshed with hot fare. Then reinforcements were brought up, the waves reorganized, and the Canadians advanced again to face the driving rain.

Victory at Last.

Unless the present labor shortage is relieved without delay, officials claim, it will be necessary to consider drastic methods of conscription of workmen.





Some pledged to support the candidate, provided he was for conscription and a union government, but the majority wanted some evidence of independence in the candidate. That has not been secured, and it looks as if the fight will be on straight party lines here.

QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

Question-1. Will locomotive firemen be exempt under the military service act?

2. Would they require to be in the service as firemen any length of simple to be exempt?

Answer—I. They are not exempt as a whole class, but they may apply for it, and if their services are considered essential to their employer, and if it is impossible to replace them by anyone who is not liable or fit for military service, it will likely be granted. They will probably be asked to support their claim by an affidavit from their employer, stating that the above conditions exist. The whole question rests with the tribunal, and it is impossible to state definitely without an inquiry into each man's case. into each man's case.

2. Men of long experience would probably stand a better chance of having their claims allowed.

moral reform worker in the United States, and R. A. Waite of Chicago, Ill., associate, superintendent of the International Sunday School Association, were the most popular. Not only because of their gift of oratory, but also because of the many new ideas and methods, which their extensive and thorough study of child life and its needs, enabled them to bring forth.

In an address entitled, "The Spiritual Aim of the Graded Lessons," she pointed out how God meant that the lives of children should gradually unfold, and that, therefore they passed through various stages of life, and should be given spiritual instruction in a way which would best appeal at each separate stage. All the stories of the Bible are not suited to children, and Mrs. Bryner would chose only those suitable. In a talk on "The Child and His Lessons," she traced the Uniform International Lesson from early in this century and on to 1921, to which time the plan for these lessons has been laid out, showing what a dearth of material there was in this series for children up to the junior age. She followed up this with an appeal on behalf of the Sunday schools.



R. A. Waite in speaking on "The Stronger Sunday School for the Greater Demands," told of his investigation in the matter of why boys and girls do and do not go to Sunday school, and gave the reasons which he had deduced from his investigations. TOUTHER BOOK AND THE STATE OF T Employer's Course The Proclamation issued under the Military Service Act calls Class One men—bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th Oct., 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before Jan. 1st, 1917. The claim for exemption may be made by the man himself, by his employer or by a near relative. So far as

practicable, not more than one claim should be made in respect of any man. For reasone stated in the next paragraph, the claim is often best made by the employer. When Employer Should Make Claim for Exemption

Where claim for exemption is based on the assumption that it is in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged, it is usually preferable that the claim be made by the EMPLOYER, inasmuch as the decision of the claim will involve amongst other things, a consideration of the nature of the business, the number of men employed, etc.

Medical Examination

It will simplify the employer's problem if all Class One men in his employ present themselves for Medical Examination at the nearest Medical Board Centre.

Upon examination they will be placed in Medical Categories-A, B, C, or E. Class One men placed in Categories B, C, or E satisfy immediate requirements if they attach the medical report they will receive to their

claim for exemption. Where an employer claims exemption for an employee on the ground that it is expedient in the national interest that the man should continue in the work in which he is habitually engaged, he should attach to the claim for exemption a statement and a schedule as follows:

The Employer's Statement

Total number of employees, grouping them according to their respective occupations and qualifications, and stating the number in each group. Indicate the possibility or otherwise of replacing the labor of Class One men with the labor of those not in the statutory class called up, or of women; also the extent to which the withdrawal of men in the statutory class would affect the business, the reason for considering that the carrying on of the business is in the national interest, and such other facts and circumstances as may appear to be relevant.

The Employer's Schedule

This should state the names, ages and occupations of all Class One men employed, noting against each name whether or not claim for exemption is being made, and whether in the employer's opinion, exemption, if granted, should be conditional on the man's continuing his present occupation, or whether it would suffice if exemption were granted for one, two, or more months, as the case may be.

England or at the front, The Advertiser publishes the rates of postage: To England, the rate is 12 cents a pound or any fraction thereof; limit weight on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for par-cels any weight up to three pounds; from three pounds to sever pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents-not 32 cents per pound. but 32 cents for any weight from three to seven pounds. Any letter or parcel for any soldler in the hospital (even if this hospital is not known to the sender)., having the word "hospital" marked across it will be delivered. A customs declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the stamp window of the postoffice.

But the essential thing is to send to he men something that will be useful to them, something that they can easily carry, for the modern soldier is like the snail, he carries everything he possesses on his back. He has his regulation equipment to carry in his pack, and has not much room for other things. And it must be remembered, too, that an infantryman already has to carry just under half a hundredweight about with him, of which nearly twelve pounds is clothing, nearly eleven pounds his riff and bayonet, and over sixteen pounds his accourrements. In his pack he al-ready has 9% pounds weight of articles, and as the weight of the pack hangs on the supporting straps that go over the shoulders, the soldier is going to express his emphatic thanks all the more sincerely if the presents he gets at Christmas are such that they do not very materially increase his load. Don't forget to put in a number o

soup and vegetable tablets, a tin or so of the condensed milk and coffee powder, cocoa, tea or ground coffee Liquid things are dangerous to send, owing to the mass of packages that will pile up at every depot, and to the speed with which they have to be handled, with consequent diminution of the care that can be exercised. If one desires to send jam, don't let it be plum or apple. The soldier gets tons of that in his rations; and c'on't let the pots be too big—if they are, it means waste, for Tommy cannot carry an open pot of jam around with him, nor can he and his friends eat it all at one sitting. Let the jam pots be small ones, and they will be the more appreciated. Also send





Same Cheery Answer Given, No Matter What Condition.

NO DEATH IN TRENCHES

Only Those Who Will Not Go Dead, Says Famous Woman Recruiter.

Pictures, the stories of the men who have been through it all, the affectionate imagination which pieces together these and all the wealth of informa tion that comes through the press could never give the clear and comprehensive nderstanding of the actual conditions

tion that comes through the press could never give the clear and couprehensive understanding of the actual conditions surrounding the Canadian soldier in France that Captain Julia Henshaw gave to those wise enough and fortunate enough to hear her lecture under the auspices of Janey Canuck Chapter, I. O. D. E., last Sunday night in the Majestic Theatre. No description of the casualty clearing stations, the ambulances, the hospital trams and ships, the filled hospitals under canvas or roof, the base hospitals, the treatment of the wounded, the work of the Red Cross has ever been given with such thrilling appeal in this city.

Our Chivalrous Men.

Capt. Henshaw took her audience by picture and vivid impression from "Blighty" to the front line in France, to the British bases, rest camps and field hospitals, the headquarters of the Canadian army medical corps and to the trenches themselves.

Sent by the Canadian authorities to study conditions and to devote special attention to the subject of auxiliary supplies and the re-education of soldiers who, through physical disability, cannot follow their pre-war vocation, Captain Henshaw has allowed no detail to pass unnoticed and returns to Canada with a message to her country-women—and men—that is definite, practical and, withal, appealing to all the finest emotions of which humanity is capable.

Vivid Pictures.

Perhaps because she is a woman this gifted officer of the C. E. F. tells the story of life at the front more vividly than the soldier sons who have returned. Her woman's instinct discovers to her audience that fine chivalry, the consummate courage of the British, Canadian and French fighting man which, being men, our returned soldiers and even returned war correspondents, also being men, take for granted.

"They are not dead who die out there," she said, "only they who could, and should and would not fight are the dead. Everywhere in the hospitals one sees the eager eyes that watch each recurring dawn that brings the soldier with the one gold stripe on his sleeve

many a soldier with the same old grin on his face, the same old grit in his soul, and the second gold stripe on his sleeve, goes back to meet the foe and has surely earned the Victoria Cross. Such men 'as these are calling for reinforcements." She quotes the irresistible appeal that came from the lips of a battered Canadian lad who said to his nurse: "Sister, if the men at home only knew how badly they are needed they would come running."

An English medical officer in one of the hospitals told the captain that he always knew a Canadian soldier by his "Fine!" when asked how he is. Though he may be scarcely able to whisper it, it is always his answer. "And he meets the great advanture with a song," he continued. "His passing soul is a lamp iit by the hand of God. We need say no prayers for our men who go that way. Each carries with him his charter to heaven."


