Their Majesties Enter the Durbar City and Take Up Residence in Camp, Following Impressive and Magnificent Procession of Four Miles-A Bodyguard of Native Princes.

Telhi, India Dec. 7.—The roar of an imperial salute of 101 guns welcomed ihe King-Emperor and Queen-Empress on their arrival here today from Bombay. The railroad station in the Selingarh bastion of the fort had been the mecca since dawn for everybody in the city and the coronation camp. Equipages which vied with each other in splendor passed along roads crowded with Indian princes, military officers and Government officials, and streams of natives went the same way. The route to the camp was lined alternately by British and Indian regiments under the command of Lieut. Gen. Sir J. Wilcocks, and Gen. Sir E. G. Barrow. In providing guards of honor and escorts, native troops were also given an equal share with British soldiers.

The King-Emperor and Queen-Empress were received on the elaborately-decorated platform by the Viceroy and Vicereine, the governors and heads of provinces, the commander-in-chief and a number of high military and civil officials.





POWER SAYS ST. MARYS SPEAKER

Has Become Arrogant and High-Handed and Needs To Be Checked Before the Country Suffers—Hon. Mackenzie

[Special to The Advertiser.]

St. Marfs, Dec. 6.—Hon. W. L. Mackensie King and Mr. Valentin Stock addressed one of the largest meetings held in St. Marys at the opera house this evening. Mayor Sanderson presided.

Mr. G. H. McIntyre gave a fine address, in which he declared that the menaco in Ontario today was that the Whitney Government had become so intoxicated with power that it was arrogant and high-handed. The country needed men like Mr. Stock, and more of them, as a check on such acts of arrogance.
