Measure for Acquiring Road Out of Committee Stage.

AMENDMENTS DEFEATED

Division in Upper Chamber.

Ottawa, Nov. 7 .- The fight in the Senate on the bill providing for the acquisition of the Grand Trunk Railway came to a close tonight, when the bill was reported from committee and given third reading without a division. At the morning sitting Sir James

Lougheed gave notice of an amendment providing for the arbitration of all the stocks to be acquired on the basis that a 4 per cent dividend should not yield a dividend in excess of five million dollars. At the afternoon session this amend At the afternoon session this amendment was changed, because the agreement with the Grand Trunk provides that the 4 per cent preference shares are to be treated as debenture stock, the Government becoming responsible for the interest amounting to about \$2,500,000 to be paid upon them. By this change it is provided that the dividends including this sum must not exceed \$5,000,000.

An amendment by Sanator Lynch.

An amendment by Senator Lynch-Staunton, providing that the award should not exceed \$4,372,263, the average dividend resident

should not exceed \$4.372,263, the average dividend paid on the stocks for ten years preceding 1914, was rejected.

Rapid Headway.

With these amendments disposed of, rapid headway was made with the remaining clauses of the bill at the evening sitting, and it was reported from committee and given third reading shortly after 9 o'clock.

An amendment was accepted from Senator Belque, providing that claims of the Grand Trunk and the Grand Trunk Pacific should not be extinguished by the bill.

Swift Raids Are Conducted in Many American Cities.

New York, Nov. 8 .- More than 350 alleged radicals who are said to have plotted violent demonstrations throughout the country today in commemoration of the second anniversary of the establishment of the Russian Soviet Government were in the hands of federal authorities this morning, awaiting deportation or such other action as may be ordered against them.

About 500 men and women suspected of having been implicated in the plot were seized late last night in a series of swift rails conducted in fourteen cities. Further arrests were promised by federal agents in some cities today. More than 150 persons were taken in a raid in New York which was personally conducted by William J. Flynn, chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice. All save 52 were released after examination.







OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—After having fulminated for two days on behalf of the returned soldiers, and after having advanced all sorts of proposals for an increase in the amount to be expended in civil re-establishment, Government members swallowed themselves whole this evening and voted in an almost solid block for the adoption of the report of the calder committee it stood. They did so after the minister of immigration had given a categorical of the calder committee it stood. They did so after the minister of immigration had given a categorical assurance that there would be no further cash or credit grants, and that whatever assistance was given to the returned men would be at the discretion of the Government.

In other words, they favored a scheme by which, on the eve of an election, the Government may pick out "deserving" individuals for consideration, and which leaves it in the hands of the Government to say who shall be helped, and who shall not. The Government managed to muster an even bigger vote to defeat the soldiers' demands for further consideration in committee of their proposals than it did to defend the proposition by which the country will be shouldered with a \$700,000,000 additional debt to help out the Grand Trunk shareholders. The majority for the report was 65.

An amendment by Hon, W. L. Mackenzie King, to refer the report back to the committee, was defeated by 100 to 35, a government majority of 65. Major Andrews of Centre Winnipeg had previously withdrawn his amendment to send the report back to the committee with instructions to accept the Great War Veterans' Association plan of reestablishment, and this withdrawal removed any chance of a close or adverse vote on the motion of Hon. J. A. Calder for the adoption of the report.

In the earlier part of the day Sir George Foster, discussing what Canada had done for the soldiers, said Canada stood at the back of her soldiers while they were in service. No soldiers in the field were better supported than were the Canadians. That was but the duty of the country.

Canada need never blush for the manner in which she cared for her disabled men, though it was not suggested that perfection had been reached. Canada had not been unmindful of those who returned fit. \$491,500,000 had been disbursed by Canada or committed for the care of her returned men. This was done, not by any Government or party, but by the people of Canada, who had also raised another \$100,000,000 in various way for the soldiers.

Sir George said he was not saying this to throw it in the teeth of the soldiers, but to place the facts before the country as a whole. It was an answer to those who foolishly said that Canada had done nothing for her soldiers, but Canada had done only a tithe of what she would like to have done.







THE HANDWRITING ON THE WALL. For a parallel to the manner in which the present Unionist Government is holding on to office long after it has become clear that it no longer has the confidence of the country, it would be necessary to go back to the period after 1891 and up till 1896 when the old Tory party, bereft of its leader and rent by internat disputes, persisted in attempting to govern the country until finally they were hurled out of office in 1896. When such strong supporters of Sir Robert Borden and his unionist ministry as the London Times and other English papers of similar leanings hint that Canada's Government has outlived its usefulness, the condition of things must be evident indeed. In Canada itself the Ontario election results, followed so soon after by reverses in federal by-elections, show that there is a determination in the minds of the people that Borden & Co. must go, as Hearst

& Co. have gone.

There is no doubt that the group who are closest to the premier believed that the war would give them a long hold on the country. It was counted upon to win them the election of 1917, and by a combination of circumstances, which included the infamous franchise act, it did win them that election. But that election had scarcely passed before the revulsion began. The administration seemed to believe that it had been given a mandate to do exactly as it pleased without respect to any rights of the individual and so there came in quick succession order-in-council after order-in-council, taking away from Parliament its functions and centralizing these powers in the hands of a small reactionary group who knew far more of the methods of autocracy than they will ever know of democracy. A deliberate policy of repression of free speech was begun, with subsequent prosecutions of labor men and other measures, of which we are reaping the harvest today in widespread industrial unrest. With a cabinet numbering a score of ministers, there was marked inability to cope with the rising cost of living and the very evident profiteering that was going on. To every charge of failure to deal with domestic problems the Government pleaded that the war must take first place. With that principle the country agreed, but not with the Borden interpretation, which was that as long as the war lasted the public would be left to the profiteers. Is there any reason why measures such as have been put forward in 1919 could not have been applied in 1916 or 1917? Is the board of commerce a heaven-born idea that was possible in 1919 and not in 1916? The truth is that until the administration found the public showing its teeth in 1919 it cared little what the profiteers did. They were good friends of the administration and opportunities for wartime profits are few and far between. The Unionist Government showed itself a neverfailing friend to the corporations and the ex-

ploiters of the public. The present session has simply served to aggravate the popular distrust of the Government. A session called together for one specific purpose that could have been disposed of in a week and then holding on week after week in order to earn an extra sessional indemnity of \$2,500 per member is a most unedifying spectacle, and has not escaped the attention of the country. If the Union Government went to the country tomorrow it would meet with defeat as disastrous as that which overtook its Tory ancestor in 1896, and the longer the election is deferred the worse will be the defeat that will be administered to the whole Borden aggregation.

THE GRATUITIES MATTER.

Hon. James Calder, who was chairman of the special committee of the soldiers' civil reestablishment bill, in a statement made in the House of Commons Thursday, said that in the event of Parliament ordering the Government to provide additional gratuities for returned men the Unionist ministry would be compelled! to resign and "pass the burden" to somebody else. If Mr. Calder considers this an impressive threat he entirely misreads the ccuatry's attitude towards its present Government. Mildew on Linen. Dear Miss Grey,-Do you know of any-

thing that will take mildew out of linen? It was caused by a decayed pear. NEWCOMER. Ans.-Several methods have been ad-Ans.—Several methods have been advised for the removal of mildew. One is to moisten both sides of the linen with lemon juice, cover with a paste of softened yellow soap and chalk; place in sunlight for half an hour, rinse and repeat if necessary. Or dip the spot mto a solution of chloride of lime, and expose to the sun a few minutes; repeat till stain disappears, then rinse theroughly in clean water. oughly in clean water.

FACTORY GIRLS AND DOMESTIC HELP ALWAYS IN DEMAND.

The women's branch of the Ontario Government Employment Bureau here reports a great demand for factory and domestic help in the city. No matter domestic help in the city. No matter how often vacancies are filled in either of these branches of employment, a great gaping void still presents itself ready to swallow up the next applicant and just as probably ready to return that same applicant to the ranks of the unemployed within the next few weeks. What is the reason for this constant shifting of the women who are employed in these two branches of service?

are employed in these two branches of service?

The reason can be only one of two, or perhaps a little of both. The women and girls applying for such positions are not fitted for the task, or the positions afforded them in this line of work are not satisfactory as conditions exist at the present time.

I am inclined to think that the difficulty lies in both directions, and that the positions, both financially and otherwise, will measure up according as the women and girls themselves measure up to a standard of efficiency. The employers will have to come to time if labor is efficient, because they won't have the excuse of inefficient labor for offering poor wages.

It really seems like trying to make the engine go without the gasoline (to translate into modern language the old saying "put the cart before the horse"), to complain about work conditions, without trying to improve the standard of the worker. And just as truly does it seem ridiculous to complain about the inefficiency of help, when nothing is being done to offer better working conditions.

RELATIONSHIP OF THE **DOMINIONS TO BRITAIN** CHANGED BY THE WAR

Plans of Imperial Federation Are Doomed.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECHES

British Press Says They Reflect the Great New Tendencies.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—(Canadian Associated Press).—The proposal is under consideration among the Canadian community here to give the Prince of Wales a formal welcome home in recognition of his remarkable tour of the Dominion. The English newspapers give the prince's speeches considerable promi-The Manchester Guardian editorially

says:

'The habit is growing for speeches by members of the British royal house to reflect accurately and dispassionately the great tendencies ideals and ambi-tions of the British peoples. It is a useful function and seldom more aptly exercised than in the address of the

exercised than in the address of the Prince of Wales in Toronto. The war has changed the whole relationship of the British dominions to Britiain and the whole world. The magnitude of the change has been better realized overseas than here. The Canadian prime minister has successfully asserted the right of his Parliament to debate the peace treaty. The Australian premier asserts that the developments to which the war has led speed the doom of all plans of imperial federation. If, as is possible, he is rejected by his country possible, he is rejected by his country at the general election in the December session, he will be succeeded by a government of yet more independent mind, for it is a plank in the official Australian labor platform the lian labor platform to reject the mandate for the Pacific islands and another rejects the naval program laid down by Lord Jellicoe."

Can Never Take Shape.

The Manchester Guardian also prints

a letter from Lord Sheffield regarding its Sydney correspondent's emphasis that Premier Hughes expresses Austraia's mind in such passages as "The dea of an imperial parliament is a

idea of an imperial parliament is a vision which can never take substantial shape, for it is incompatible with the status of sovereignty which the dominions jealously prize."

Lord Sheffield recalls General Smuts dictum that the future policy of the Empire must be on the lines of a free association of commonwealths, united by common tradition and mutual good will. Lord Sheffield says:

"I believe this will also be Can-

lieve this will also be Can ada's feeling, which must inevitably see a growth of its commercial and eco-nomic relations with the United States with a corresponding and proportionate shrinkage in the importance of comheroial relations with this the dominions, in fact, are republics, under relations with this country protectorate, but I doubt if at present they have the power by international law to remain neutral in the event of our being at war, though it follows

our being at war, though it follows from the present development of political life that the great dominions which have been made parties to peace treaties must also in future determine on their own initiative whether they will join us or not in future wars.

No Coercion.

"I do not like the word protectorate, as that will jar on the idea of adult autonomy, which is more and more the point of view of the great dominions, but so long as they desire our active support of their self-governing independence against foreign aggression I fancy we shall be prepared to give it to them. Should they desire to stand alone completely we shall raise no objection as the link, if no longer valued by them, could not be insisted on by us. But Premier Hughes and those who think with him must not seek for fiscal edvantages. seek for fiscal advantages at our ex-pense nor ask for concealed subsidies

in the shape of either preference or advantageous contracts."

Commenting on the above letter the Commenting on the above letter the Guardian wonders whether or not Lord Sheffield's conclusions are valid. It says that it is patent that the changes wrought in imperial relationship give rise to a host of international complexities that will have to be re-solved with deliberation that with deliberation, tact and care. The Prince of Wales does well to call attention to them. Their consequence will be fully explored by the imperial conference in the spring.



LIQUOR IMPORTATION MAY BECOME LEGAL FOR TIME AT LEAST

Declaration of Peace Will End Legislation.

DOHERTY'S OPINION

Individuals Would Then Be Able To Get It From Outside Sources.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—The Government at the present time is being pressed for an authoritative ruling as to when the existing prohibition legislation established by the federal order-in-council under the war measures act in 1918 will cease to have effect. The theory is advanced that the order will become invalid on Tuesday next, which is the first anniversary of armistice, and therefore one year after the war. In fact, it is stated that certain shippers in the West are willing to make a test case by openly importing liquor from another province for uses which are not declared to be illegal in the province into which it is imported. So far, the Government has not given an official opinion on the matter.

Interviewed this evening by the representative of The Advertiser on the matter, Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, expressed the opinion that the order would cease to have force just as soon as peace was proclaimed. He was indefinite, however, on the question as to whether such proclamation in Canada would immediately occur after the proclamation of peace by England.

When Peace Declared.

"My opinion is," he said, "that when peace is proclaimed in the Dominion we shall be back where we were before the present order-in-council was passed in 1918. That is to say, individuals will be able to import liquor from one province to which import is made. For instance, the province of Ontario does not hold it illegal for an individual to have liquor in his own home. For such a purpose, therefore, it will, on the expiry of the present federal orders-in-council, be legal for a man to import liquor into that province. As a matter of fact, no province of the Dominion has declared it to be illegal to have liquor for beverage purposes in one's own home."

Even should these bills pass during the present session, a considerable delay must elapse before either one of them could be invoked. In the case of Ontario, for instance, the holding of a plebiscite must first be preceded by a petition from the Legislature and the preparation of the folder.

of a plebiscite must first be preceded by a petition from the Legislature and the preparation of the federal machinery for taking the vote.

It is improbable that the preliminaries could be disposed of in less time than several months. In order to invoke the provisions of the other bill, on the other hand, Ontario would have to take another referendum to render it illegal to have liquor on a man's own property for his own personal use, since the Ontario temperance act, which was upheld at the last referendum, does not make that illegal.

Any act of the Legislature of Ontario to that end would necessarily involve confiscation of existing stocks in private celiars, and no government wants to undertake that task, especially as it might be necessary to subject some of its own members to the indignity of a search and seizure.

Strong pressure is being brought to bear upon the Government to shelve the bills before the House. The Dominion Alliance opposes them because they place the initiative upon the provinces and because, in the opinion of the alliance, it is the duty of the federal authorities to enact legislation which would be whiskey-tight. A large number of the Government's supporters oppose it for a different reason. They declare (and they point to the fate of the Hearst Government) that the less any government has to do with liquor legislation the better.

BUILDING AT VICTORIA IS BEING RENOVATED

During the month of September, 365 patients were admitted.


