Almost Captured by Gen. Bruce Hamilton When Boers Were Given Alarm.

Kitchener Still Busily Engaged in Reducing Burgher Fighting Force.

London, Jan. 14-Lord Kitchener, in despatch from Johannesburg, dated Monday, Jan. 13, reports the narrow escape of Gon. Botha from capture by General Bruce Hamilton.

Hearing of a concentration of Boers at Knapdaar, Bruce Hamilton went to the spot, but only to find the Boers had been given the alarm and 400 of them were trekking three miles distant, with General Botha, in a Cape

Bruce Hamilton chased the Boers for seven miles, until his horses gave in, and captured 32 Boers and quantities of ammunition and stock.

London, Jan. 14. -Perhaps the most mportant point in Lord Kitchener's weekly report, dated Johanneshurg, Monday, Jan. 13, is the omission of all mention of General De Wet, from which it is deduced that the British under-in-chief is more than usually hopeful of effective results from his present efforts to surround De Wet. The British commander-in-chief reports that since Jan. 6, twenty Boers have been killed, nine have been wounded, 203 have been captured and minety have surrendered.

Those who have seen the late Rev. Dr. James Robertson, superintendent of Presbyterian Missions in Western Canada, and heard him preach, could not have failed to be impressed with for expecting St. Peter to honor press the personality of the man. In appearance and manner he was stern, rigid, reporter has ever come back to comimpassive, one might almost say forbidding. An artist would have selected him as a model for the portrait of one of those stern old fighting Covenanters who could make as good use of his sword or pike as his Bible-or, better still, of one of the fearless, unyielding Scotch reformers who helped John Knox to beat down and wear out civil and ecclesiastical officialism and establish Presbyterianism in Scotland on the ruins of the ancient church. One could easily imagine him fighting against enormous difficulties, dend for the expenditure of capital and even yielding up his life, through a sense of duty or for conscience sake; but it was hard to understand how any such man of granite could be moved by feelings of tenderness for others or could win the affections of his fellowmen, much as he might command their respect. His was the tenderness that expressed itself in wrath against the cruel, or the selfish, or the lazy. The tenderness that moved him to quick sympathy with the discouraged or beaten made him ready to forgive the erring or penitent, and wrought his whole soul into a noble passion to help the needy and to save the sin-burdened. I have heard him pour forth words of, indignant scarifying scorn upon a supine and worldly board of management seeking to repudiate debts and 'lean upon the funds,' and next day I have seen him stand in the midst of a little company of farmers, whose fields the frost had caught, and like a father comforting his children, I have heard him speak to them in words thrilling with a true man's sympathy, of the enduring things that no frost could take from them, till their hearts grew brave and hopeful, and they were ready to plow and sow and wait again. Stern he was, never with true and faithful doing their best. And how he loved his friends and made their joys and sorrows his own. And how they loved him. Ah! yes, we loved him. wonder if he knew how well."





TURKISH

Soldiers Pacified by Being Pro mised They Would Receive Arrears of Pay.

Constantinople, Jan. 14.-Two thou sand eight hundred soldiers, who have just returned from Yemen. Arabia, mutinied while in quarantine at Glazomene. They were pacified by being promised that they would received their arrears of pay.

Cairo, Jan. 14.—A serious military

affray took place at Beyrout. Several hundred half-starved troops from Asa Minor, who has served Yemen, for several years without pay, were promised their pay in Beyrout. Having received nothing they at-tacked the vali and the commandant

of the garrison, while those officials were driving near the quay.

They disarmed and ruthlessly beat the Vali's escort, flogged the commandant, and assaulted the Vali, who, however, escaped from his carriage. Some gendarmes and cavalry came to the rescue, but were repulsed, af-ter which the mutinous troops returned to their barracks.

TARTE WARNED MR. MULOCK OFF.

Toronto, Jan. 14.-Mr. Tarte is after his colleague, Mr. Mulock, the Postmaster-General, with a long stick, over the report that the latter was contemplating the establishment of a postal telegraph system. Mr Tarte's organ, the Patrie, to-night publishes an article, evidently inspired by the Minister, in which it is stated that up to the present time the Department of Public Works has had the control of all the State's telegraph

lines.
"It is impossible," adds the Patrie "to understand why the Postmaster General, whoever he may be, would desire to remove the control of the telegraphs from the Minister of Public Works. The Department of Public Works under former Administrations was despoided by several other Ministers, by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, by the Minister of Jus-tice, and the Minister of Railways.

"The Department of Public Works has for some time been confided to a French-Canadian Minister. It is the most important portfolio in the pos-session of the Province of Quebec. We will not allow it to be said, without an immediate and public protest, that the State's telegraph system can be transferred to the Postal Department. As long as Mr. Tarte occupies the post this despoilment will not take

London, Jan. 14.-Owing to grave differences with the Executive of the Salvation Army, General Booth's sonin-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Booth-Clibborn, have resigned their connection with the army. It is understood that the teaching of John Alexander Dowie, the "Zionist," is regarded by them with much sympathy.



COLLEGIATE QUESTION. J. C. Fleming, Thomas Scullard and White, a committee of the C. C. Board, met in Hrarison Hall this morning, to consider a letter from Hon. Richard Harcourt, Minister of education. Mr. Harcourt asked tha the C. C. I. Board consider the alleged injustice of the High School Act re specting the provisions pertaining to the responsibility of county councils toward High Schools, situated in municipalities separated from the jurisdic-tion of the county council, and schools n municipalities not so separated. It s regarded as unfair that while the separated municipalities are not required to contribute any part of the cost of maintenance for county pupils, the unseparated municipalities contribute their share of the total amount levied by the county council for maintenance of all county schools. The result of the committee's deliberations in this matter will be presented at the next meeting of the C. C. I.
