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

PRAYER,

TO BE USED

On Friday, the fourth of May 1832, being the day appointed by Proclamation for a General FAST and Humiliation before Almighty God, to be observed in the most Devout and Solemn Manner, by sending up our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty:

For obtaining Pardon of our Sins, and for averting those heavy Judgements which our manifold Provocations have most justly deserved.

By Authority.

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The Order for Morning Prayer.

- I The Service shall be the same with the usual Office for Holydays, except where it is in this Office otherwise appointed.
- I Let him that ministereth read with a loud voice these Sentences of Scriture; and after them the Exhortation, Dearly beloved Brethren, &c.

To the Lord our God belong mercies and forgivenesses, though we have rebelled against him: neither have we obeyed the voice of the Lord our God, to walk in his laws, which he set before us.

In my trouble I will call upon the Lord, and complain unto my God. So shall he hear my voice out of his holy temple; my complaint shall come before him.

EAR our Prayer, O God: and hide not Thyself from our Petition.

Take heed unto us and hear us: how we mourn in our Prayer and are vexed.

Unto Thee will I cry, O Lord, my strength: think no scorn of me, lest if Thou make as though Thou hearest not, I become like them that go down into the Pit.

Turn Thee, O Lord, and deliver my soul: O save me for Thy mercies sake.

Morning Prayer.

Nevertheless though I am sometime afraid: yet put I my trust in God

He verily is our strength and our salvation: He is our defence, so that we shall not greatly fall.

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O put your trust in Him alway, ye people: pour out your hearts before Him, for God is our hope.

As for the children of men they are but vanity: the children of men are deceitful upon the weights, they are

altogether lighter than vanity itself.

Be merciful unto me, O God, be merciful unto me: for my soul trusteth in Thee: yea, in the shadow of thy wings will I make my refuge, until these calamities be overpast,

Be Thou, O God, our help in trouble: for vain is the help of man.

Deliver, Thou, our souls from death, and our feet from falling: that we may walk before Thee in the light of the living.

Go not far from me, O God: my God, haste Thee to help me.

O Lord, rebuke me not in thine anger, neither chasten me in thy hot displeasure.

Look upon mine afflictions and my pain: and forgive all my sins.

Our fathers trusted in thee: they trusted, and thou didst deliver them.

They cried unto Thee, and were delivered: they trusted in Thee and were not confounded.

Thou hast made the earth to tremble; Thou hast broken it; heal the breaches thereof; for it shaketh.

Great plagues remain for the ungodly: but whose putteth his trust in the Lord, mercy embraceth him on every side.

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whoso th him Why art thou so full of heaviness, O my soul: and why art thou so disquicted within me?

O put thy trust in God : for I will yet thank him, which

is the help of my countenance and my God. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy

I After the First Lesson, shall follow Te Deum laudamus. Second Lesson, Luke 21. I Then Benedictus, the Creed, &c.

I This, and the two following Collects, to be used instead of the First Collect for Morning Prayer.

LORD, most good and powerful, we, Thy sinful people, here assembled before Thee, acknowledge it to be of Thine unspeakable mercy, that for our manifold and heinous provocations, we are not utterly consumed, and given over for a prey to the pestilence or other scourge of Thine avenging hand. We confess, with sorrow and confusion, our long unfruitfulness, under the means of grace, the light of Thy Gospel, and the many blessings and deliverances, which Thou, in thy great goodness, hast vouchsafed unto us. O Lord, shouldst Thou enter into judgement with us for our sins, for our profaneness and infidelity, our heresies and schisms, our exclusive pursuit of the business, or inordinate love of the pleasures of the world, and our other

numberless offences, Thou mightest justly inflict upon us the severity of Thy wrath, and visit us with the suffering which have been experienced in other lands, and which we have no less deserved. But there is mercy with Thee, therefore shalt Thou be feared: Thou art the Lord God, tender, and full of compassion, not willing that any should perish, but that all should repent and live. Look down therefore, we beseech Thee, with an eye of pity, and loving kindness, upon Thy servants, who with contrite hearts, here bewail their transgressions, and their wretchedness. Let us, in this time of trouble, still enjoy the light of Thy countenance, and the blessing of Thy bountiful hand; and so work upon our hearts and minds, by the influences of Thy Holy Spirit, that being turned from the error of our ways, and created to newness of life, we may walk before Thee, in righteousness and holiness, in this world, and inherit thine everlasting Kingdom, in that which is to come, through the merits of Jesus Christ, our only Mediator, and Advocate. Amen.

Almighty God, who rulest over all the Nations of the Earth, and on whose gracious Providence they depend evermore for preservation and prosperity; extend, we beseech Thee, thine accustomed goodness to the people of these Provinces; who, looking up to Thee, as the Author of all Blessings, and their sure Safeguard and mighty Deliverer in all dangers and difficulties, do now implore Thy watchful care and protection. Vouchsafe to guide us continually with Thy counsel, to strengthen us with Thy powerful arm, and to avert from us Thy Judgements which are

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abroad in the earth. But if in Thy wisdom Thou hast ordained that they should visit us, give us grace that we may humbly and patiently submit to thy correction, and, after having been exercised thereby, may bring forth the peaceable fruits of rightcousness, to the praise and glory of Thy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

MERCIFUL GOD, our only aid, succour, and strength at all times: grant unto us, O Lord, that in the time of prosperity we be not proud, and so forget Thee, but that with our whole heart and strength we may cleave unto Thee; and in the time of adversity, that we fall not into infidelity and desperation, but that always with constant faith, we may call for help unto Thee: grant this, O Lord, for our Advocate sake, and Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

Then shall follow the Second and Third Collects at Morning Prayer, and after these the Litany.

Immediately before the General Thanksgiving, the People shall say this that followeth, after the Minister:

URN Thou us, O good Lord, and so shall we be turned. Be favourable, O Lord, be favourable to Thy People, who turn to Thee in weeping, fasting, and praying. For Thou art a merciful God, full of compassion, long suffering, and of great pity. Thou sparest, when we deserve punishment; And, in Thy wrath thinkest upon Mercy. Spare Thy People, good Lord, spare them, And let not thine heritage be brought to confusion. Hear us, O Lord, for Thy mercy is great, And after the multitude

of Thy mercies look upon us, through the merits and mediation of Thy blessed Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then the following prayer: good portal plan

ALMIGHTY GOD, King of Kings, and Lord of Lords, the blessed and only Potentate, who doest what thou wilt in the armies of Heaven, and among the inhabitants of earth, and to whom none may say, what doest Thou? We thy sinful servants confess thy judgements to be right, -Thy wisdom infinite, Thy love unbounded. And we beseech Thee mercifully enable, us to stand in the evil day, and to conquer in thy strength, made perfect in our weakness. More especially we intreat Thee, in this hour of anxiety and danger, to endue us plenteously with the manifold gifts of thy Holy Spirit, and to impart to us that faith in thy dear Son which may save us from fearfulness, and support us in actual trial. We have made our humble confession before Thee, and have resolved by thy grace to walk henceforth in newness of life. Suffer us not, we pray Thee, to return to our former sinfulness and disobedience, or again to live in forgetfulness of Thee, our God and Saviour. Keep us, O Lord both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; continue to us, Thy merciful protection, and shield us from the arms of the destroyer. And in all seasons, whether of success or adversity, prosperity or tribulation, give us hearts to be truly thankful for

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Thy goodness, fearful of Thy displeasure, and sensible of Thy presence; that at all times, putting our whole trust and confidence in Thee, we may so pass through things temporal, that we finally lose not the things eternal. And grant to us such a denial of ungodliness and worldly affections, that we may be able to look forward with hope to the consummation of all things, and to the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; to whom with Thee O Father, and Thee, O Holy Ghost, be honour and glory, world without end. Amen.

The Communion Service.

After the Prayer for the King [Almighty God, whose Kingdom is Everlasting] shall be read the Three Collects of the Day, as in the Morning Prayer, [O Lord, most good and powerful, &c. O Almighty God, who rulest, &c. and O Merciful God, &c.] and then shall follow:

For the Epistle. Rev. Chap. III. Ver. 14. to 19.

A ND unto the angel of the church of the Laodiceans, write; These things saith the Amen, the faithful and true witness, the beginning of the creation of God; I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would thou wert cold or hot. So then, because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spue thee out of my mouth. Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked: I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white raiment,

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that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eye-salve, that thou mayest see. As many as I love, I rebuke, and chasten: be zealous therefore and repent.
