Reports brought in by the con-venors of various committees showed the wide spread work of the double organization.

Representing the Committee on Conservation, Miss Carlyle pointed out that the vital, imperative need of the hour is farm labour, and it was suggested that young men of military age unfit for active service be drafted for agricultural work. The importance of city gardening was also emphasized and reference made to the Food Controller's request that fish be consumed at the rate of one pound per capita weekly.

The Ruying Committee/ reported through Mrs Adams, a month of great activity, wool, shirting, supplies for comfort bags, etc., being purchased in huge quantities.

Mrs. T. W. Second brought in the report of the Citizenship Committee. Mrs. Geo. Watt, who had represented Brantford at the recent Excouncil of Won.en, at Ottawa, stat-ed that the National Council had much pleasure in accepting the invitation to hold its annual conterence here in June, and reported oa the resolutions which the Council will bring before the Government. Mrs. Tilley was delighted to I able to report that one hundred per cent of the candidates had passed the examination in Home Nursing. It is hoped that a class in First Ald

will be formed early in April. As Convenor of the committee for the Protection of women and children, Mrs. A. Shultis reported that the local Bible Society was willing to pay a deaconess to work among the foreign women. This offer was gladly accepted.

Upon Farm Implements Urged by Dr. Clark

REMOVAL

Mr. W. F. Cockshutt, M.P., Makes Cogent Reply.

, In the Dominion House yesterday, Dr. Michael Clark of Red Deer, made a strong appeal for the removal of duties on farm implements and foodduties on farm implements and food-stuffs. He said that there was a bet-ter way to handle the food situation than that of controlling prices. He was in favor of the liberty rather than control. "Why not," said Dr. Clark, "sweep all duties off food sup-plies? Germany did it at the begin plies? Germany did it at the begin-ning of the war."

ning of the war." In order to increase production, Dr. Clark believed that the duty should be removed from all agricul-tural implements. "Why stop at removing the duty on farm tract-ors?" he said. "Gave the farmers free implements and they will do their part. If you want increased free implements and they will do their part. If you want increased production it is the logical thing to do. Appeals to farmers to produce more will fall on deaf ears unless the government does its part." Dr. Clark said that, speaking as a farmer, he was not afraid to face any competition which might devel-on as the result of the removal of

op as the result of the removal of duties from food. Cockshutt Opposed W. F. Cockshutt, Brantford, strongly differed from Dr. Clark in regard to free agricultural imple-ments. Mr. Cockshutt expressed the hope that the Union Government would not follow Dr. Clark's ad-vice. would vice.

vice. "Perfect union," laughingly inter-rupted an Opposition member. "I understood," Mr. Cockshutt went on, "that the Union Govern-ment was to allow all such questions to stand in abeyance during the war. We are united so far as winning the war is concerned. If the Union Government proposes to meddle seri-ously with the tariff, it is breaking what we understood in our section of the country was an agreement

ously with the tariff, it is breaking what we understood in our section of the country was an agreement that these matters should stand in abovance during the war. That is what we declared from the plat-forms and what we now believe." Would Mean Tearing Tariff to Pleces The duties on agricultural imple-ments, Mr. Cockshuit argued, could not be removed unless the Govern-ment was also prepared to take off the duties on raw materials that went into the manufacture of the implements. That would mean tear-ing the tariff to pieces. The ques-tion was not one merely affecting a few manufacturers. It affected tens of thousands of workmen who relied on manufacturers for their daily bread. — "I ask the Union Government to take no such foolish step." Mr. Cock-shutt added, amid much Opposition laughter. "For the peace and har-mony of this splendid party I ad-vise the government to go very slow-ly in abolishing duties."

America Has So Large an Area Suitable for Apple Growing as Has

Many people think of commercial ap-ple orchards as being necessarily con-aned to the milder parts of the pro-vince, and to the lake districts, but

vince, and to the lake districts, that the fact is worth emphasizing that we have varieties of apples suitable for commercial culture in every county of old Ontario. The winter hardiness of the many varieties grown throughout Ontario is now very well established, and it is possible to se-lect varieties which will be hardy for any dis

any district. The most serious climatic difficult in the Province of Ontario is the occurrence of late frost in spring, and early frost in fail. Other difficulties of a climatic nature can be largely overcome by the selection of suitable varieties, or by careful discrimination with regard to soil, elevation, aspect, etc. It may be pointed out, however, that frosts are more common- and more severe over large areas of flat country, than where the topography is rolling and hilly. Large areas of some of the southern counties of Ontario are, therefore, more or less un-suited to commercial apple orchard-ing because of their flat character.

Well-sifted coal ashes, unlike ood ishes, have no fertilizing A more rolling country is much to be preferred, so that orchards can be made safer from frost by the better air drainage afforded. The choice of varieties for various districts will be made the subject of value, but are useful in lightening the soil. Line will lighten soil and

Suitable Soil In Every County. So far as soils are concerned, it may be stated that there is an abun-

may be stated that there is an abun-dance of land in every county suitable for apple growing. Well drained land is essential for successful orcharding, and there is plenty of soil of this type to be had in almost every dis-triat

trict. Summing up Soil and Climate, it may be said that no province or state in North America has so large an area so favorable in soil and climate for apple growing as has the Province of Ontario. If this statement is true it becomes obvious that the present distribution of apple growing in Ondistribution of apple orchards in On-tario is dependent on other factors Most Profitable Near Cities. Transportation is the most import-ant factor having to do with the disal apple orc DALLEY rds the commercial apple orchards are locat-ed within reach of transportation facilities, and the better facilities have been with relation to large cities and to the develop ties and to the developing markets of the prairies, the more rapid has been the development of commercial orcharding. A location near a large city may be desirable, but if better soil and climate are to be found at a distance, the more distant location is likely to be preferred, provided transportation facilities are good. transportation facilities are good. Some districts in Ontario possers excellent conditions of soil and (clj-male, but are lacking in transpers-tion facilities, and until facilities are available little development can take place in commercial orcharding. Labor Situation Very Acute, Labor Situation Very Acute. At the present time the labor sit-uation is acute, and is rendered more so from the standpoint of the apple grower by virtue of the emphasis which, very correctly, is being placed upon the production of exportable food stuffs. The labor shortage will result in the majority of small orch-ards being more or less neglected. But the large commercial grower of apples has been in difficulty for years over the matter of labor supply. For over the matter of labor sup commercial orchard operations on a sizable basis, it is necessary to be within reach of a temporary supply of labor for apple picking. Otherwise it becomes necessary to build dwell-ings for men and their families so that a supply of labor may be always available. available. The difficulties of the labor situa-tion at picking time can be lessened considerably by the planting of varie-ties which ripen in succession, and by taking care to get the right pro-portion of each. A large area of one variety ripening at one time is ex-tremely difficult to handle. — Prof. J. W. Crow, Ontario Agricuttural College, Guelph. The Forehanded Beekceper. 




