SHOULD BE UNITED ACTION.

There is substantial encouragement in the announcement of Acting Commissioner Wood that active preliminary steps are being taken in the direction of supplying the mining districts with water. In the estimation of this paper and we believe in the opinion of a vast majority of the territory's inhabitants the salvation of the district rests upon carrying some such plan into practical effect.

As a measure of self defense to prevent the territory from suffering severe loss of population, it is absolutely necessary that facilities be provided for working the placer deposits of the district upon a safer and more economical basis than is afforded at the present time.

The situation , may as well be understood first as last. There is no need to disguise the truth. The facts speak for themselves and speak in no uncertain language. The aid of parliament must be sought and secured or the interests of the territory will receive a serious set back. To this end it is necessary that every influence in the territory be concentrated upon the one purpose and discussion of rancorous political questions be dropped. The people have no interest in politics at the present time. Every political question likely to arise within two years has been settled:

What is wanted now is to have this country opened up and developed so rhat men who are looking for wors may be given employment and men who have mining properties may develop them in a prontable manner. All the political talk now in progress, including charges and counter arges, will not open a tunnel sink a single shaft, now will it hinder men from leaving on wild goose chases to distant districts.

Practical efforts to better conditions, directed along practical lines, must be put forward and it is mos. desirable that there shall be no division among the peopre.

It must be apparent to every one that relief, if it is obtained, must come through the agency of the party in power at the federal capital. It cannot and will not be derived from any other source, and if all the stalwarts in the opposition ranks went down to Ottawa and harangueu themselves hoarse there would be no results of a nature beneficial to the general community. It is time, therefore, that useless and inenective fault finding designed only to proselish personal ambitions should give way to common sense and | thorities.

There is no government official in this territory who does not earnestly desire to see federal aid extended to the Yukon and there is not one who will refuse his influence in helping the good work along.

If there is any man whose efforts in securing such aid are likely to prove successful, that man is the Hon-James Hamilton Ross, the territory's representative at Ottawa.

No one has ever contended that Mr. Ross' rival for the office would possess the slightest weight at Ottawa even had he been successful, and that personage himself, has publicly stated his belief that the interests of the territory could be better served by Mr. Ross than by himself

### AGAINST INJUNCTIONS

Mine Workers Formulate a Demand for a New Law

Indianapolis, Feb. 14.—The feature Workers of America today was the congress to legislate on the subject of ncrease in the salaries of the national and district officers, the salaries of the former being nearly doubled. The request for legislation on the

part of congress came up in the form of a resolution from the Ohio delegation. Congress is requested to put al aberration and accordingly are the following requirements in a law relating to injunctions in labor dis-

First-That federal judges can issue injunctions in labor troubles only on the application or approval of two or nore elective judges.

Second-That a reasonable fixed by the court when the defendant shall answer to an injunction issued against him, but in no case shall the time exceed thirty days.

Third-That the applicant for an in unction in labor troubles must submit reasonable proof in support of his application for an injunction, un der penalty of being imprisoned for

Fourth-That persons arrested for alleged contempt of court shall not be tried by the judge who issued the restraining order.

Fifth-That persons arrested for contempt of court shall be tried by

The resolution was adopted and the national officers were instructed to se every possible means to call the attention of individual congressmen to the demand and get them to vote or such a law

There was some opposition to an ncrease in the salaries of the officers of the organization and numerous ef orts were made to amend the committee's report, but these were voted lown one after another and the salaries fixed practically as the commit-

Ross, one of the mail contractors of the route between Nome and Unalaklik, received an interesting letter last Saturday from Hart Humber, the carrier between Unalaklik and Isaac's Point. Humber writes that the mail will leave Unalaklik on Fridays instead of We inesdays, as heretofore, and that he fully expects overland mail in the next mail. This change of date of Starting the mail from Unalaklik will cause it to arrive in Nome on Wed nesdays or Thursdays.

The wires between Unalaklik, Old Woman's Mountain, Kaltag and Tanana are down. December 15 Humber broke through the ice of Norton bay. The thermometer was 45 degrees below zero, and he had to travel 14 miles in frozen clothes. He says that with one exception he is the only white man who has been on the trail between Isaac's Point and Unalaklik this winter. As yet he cannot go traight across the bay to Shakto-

Two mail carriers on the Yukon have been badly frozen. One of them had frozen feet and the other frozen nees. Private Webb, who was frozen to death on the Yukon, was taken to St. Michael for burial.

## **SALARIES**

Mayor \$3,000 and the Aldermen \$1,500

Finance Committee Makes Estimates Covering the Balance of Year to 1904.

About the most important thing that transpired at the council meeting last night was the report of the finance committee containing the estimates of the balance of the year and the recommendation as to the appropriations for the ensuing eight months together with the salaries of the mayor and aldermen. They are sufficient to give food for thought for the next few weeks.

There were , but two communica tions presented. One was the regular monthly report of the chief of police which shows that during the month of February there were seventeen cases of various kinds tried before Police Magistrate Macaulay for infractions of the city bylaws\_ Fourteen convictions were secured and three were dismissed with a caution, the latter including two offenses, of running a dog team on the sidewalk and one of a sleigh. Nine were up drunk and disorderly conduct, one for riding, a bike on the sidewalk and four for being inmates of a disorderly house. The total fines collected amounted to \$116. W. P. O'Connor was given a month at hard labor for being drunk and disorderly but was allowed to

go on suspended sentence. The second communication was in the nature of a letter from Hitt Bros., of Victoria, containing quota tions on fireworks and soliciting order from the city for the 24th of May, 4th of July or any other day of celebration that may be observed It is the same firm from which an order was purchased last year for the coronation day celebration.

The finance committee was the only one of the standing committees to make a report. There were no bills to pay, but the report contained a number of recommendations relative to the future including the estimates for the balance of the year, which are
