VARCOUVER, B.C., May 31.—The overflow of the Fraser river is causing great
destruction and loss of life. The surrounding valleys have been submerged, houses
and outbuildings of ranches have been
swept away and herds of cattle and flocks
of sheep have been drowned. Whole
villages on the banks of the stream are
floating. So far eight lives are known to
have been lost.

Vancouver, B. C., June 1.—The Fraser
River is still rising, and the indications
are that the flood will be sven more diastrous than the memorable one of 1883.
The river has already risen within eight
inches of the high water mark of that
great inundation. The whole valley is
under water, the Fraser having spread out
