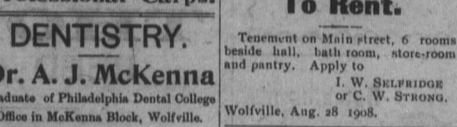

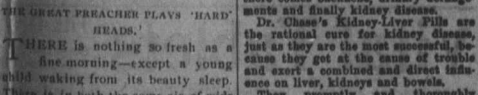

VENTILATION AND HEALTH.
It has long been realized that the
percentage of moisture in the air has
almost bearing upon health. The qual-
ity of the indoor air, through many
months of the year is chiefly depend-
ent upon the care of the individual
householder. If, indeed, it is not hope-
lessly uncontrollable under our pres-
ent systems of heating. We have all
noticed that the lighting of the furnace
fire in the autumn is likely to be
the signal for a regime of headaches
and sore throats, and also that a much
higher temperature than in summer
is required for comfort. The reason is
not hard to find. The average hu-
midity of the out of door air, in our
climate, lies between 60 and 75 de-
grees on a scale in which 100 degrees
is the point of complete saturation,
in a series of tests or the atmosphere
of various buildings heated by steam,
hot air, and hot water, it was found
that its average dampness was only
31 degrees, in other words, the air of
our homes is as dry as the desert of
Sahara. This is simply because the
heat dries out the natural moisture of
the air just as it dries a wet cloth
thrown over the register. Rapid evapora-
tion always chills the surface of a
body on which the heat acts in exactly
the same way, eagerly taking up the
moisture and chilling the surface.
Thus it is that sensitive people feel
chilly in a room heated to 70 degrees
in the winter, when a corresponding
heat in summer would be deemed op-
pressive. The effect of this unnatural
dryness of the atmosphere of our home
is to produce an inflamed and con-
gested condition of the breathing or-
gans, which leads to various catarrhal
affections. How to introduce an
adequate supply of moisture is a diffi-
cult problem. Dr. Barnes, under
whose direction the experiments just
described were made, found, on com-
puting the amount of air that passes

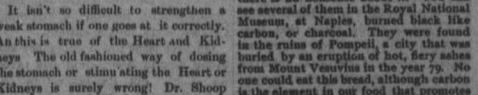

At the close of the public meeting on Wednesday evening the citizens present had a good-natured talk over the matter of better streets. A number of valuable suggestions were given, and it appeared to be the unanimous opinion of all present that the time had come when a move should be made in the direction of securing permanent and good streets for the town. Main street especially came in for a good amount of attention. It is likely that a petition will soon be presented to the town council asking that a public meeting be called to vote money for an energetic campaign of street improvement.

Notwithstanding the very disagreeable state of the weather on Wednesday evening there was a fair attendance of citizens at the public meeting in Temperance Hall. Mayor Harvey presided and explained the object of the meeting to be to authorize the Council to apply to the legislature at the next ensuing session for power to borrow or the credit of the town such sums as may from time to time be necessary to redress and pay water debtors falling due on the first day of January, in the years 1910, 1911 and 1913, the whole sum not to exceed \$38,000, which with the amount in hand as sinking fund, amounting to about \$5000, will be sufficient to meet the town's indebtedness on water account. A resolution to this effect was moved by Capt. J. B. Tingley, seconded by Mr. J. L. Franklin and unanimously passed.

Lord Milner on the Budget.

Viscount Milner addressed a crowded meeting in Halifax in connection with the Budget Protest League.

He reminded them that 24 years ago he had stood in a neighboring constituency as a Liberal. He was at that time a convinced Free Trader. 'In the twenty-four years which have elapsed since then,' he said, 'I have forgotten a great deal of my book learning, but I think I have learned something in the School of Life, and it is from my experience of the facts of life, from my contact with actual business, financial and administrative, from what I have seen of the way in which business actually is conducted in different countries, that I have come to reject, and reject absolutely, the doctrines, the fiscal doctrines, which I was taught in my youth, and to hold with an equal conviction but on a very much greater foundation, with knowledge and experience, a faith in a totally different view of what constitutes and contributes to the prosperity of the nations.

'That being the case, I am very glad to-night to have to move a resolution which puts Tariff Reform in the fore-front. That is as it ought to be. I know there has been a disposition lately in some quarters to let that subject drop into the background in the hope, as the phrase goes, of uniting all moderate men in opposition to the budget. But from my point of view the worst feature of all about the budget is that it is intended to side-track Tariff Reform. It is a bad solution of the financial difficulty expressly designed to preclude the adoption of a good one, and therefore, those who, like myself, are opposed to the budget, are bound to make it clear to the public that they are not merely negative critics, not merely cavillers, but that they have a better alternative of their own to propose.

Next to the question of the national security, which must always occupy the foremost place, I regard the question of the financial difficulty as the most important and the most urgent of all our political problems. It lies at the root of what, for want of a better term, we are all agreed in calling social reform. Social reform is not the peculiar possession of any political party. I suppose all good citizens must desire above everything to see that gradual amelioration in the conditions of the people which we designate by that term. But social reform, the fabric of social reform, is built upon the sand, it will fall to attain any of those objects which we desire, unless you at the same time adopt a commercial policy, a trade policy, which will defend the industry of this country and your great external markets against unfair, insidious and increasing attack.

Who was going to be taken in by the state clap-net that was laid? 'Is it a poor man's budget?' asked Lord Milner. 'It may make some rich men poorer, but it cannot possibly make any poor man richer. In that aspect it contrasts most unfavorably with the budget for which it is intended to be a substitute. I mean the budget based on the principle of Tariff Reform. That does hold out a prospect of work and wages to many a man who now lacks them.

'The main argument to Tariff Reform is that it is needed to give fair play, and therefore to give fresh life and vigor to our great basic industries, and to retain for us that foremost place in the markets of our own Empire which is still ours, but upon which rivals are casting hungry eyes, and from which we shall surely be displaced, as we are already being displaced, if we continue in our present policy of incessant spathy.

The breakdown of the budget through its rejection by the Lords would mean insupportable, but certainly not irreparable, chaos.

Who Shall Represent Kings County in Parliament?

DEAR EDITOR:—Will you permit a few thoughts in your columns in a brief attempt to answer the above inquiry. These views may not be acceptable to all your readers, but the writer promises to do the best he can with the data and space at his command.

The candidate gains his election by a majority of the votes cast. This is an expression of the prevailing sentiment of the constituency at the time. Personally he may stand upon a higher ethical plane than the majority of his supporters, and on the other hand, he may fall below the average standard recognized among the people. Party purposes and selfish interests may so blind the electorate that the higher motives cease to influence and they yield to the lower and baser. All this is wrong. In his choice the citizen should be influenced by considerations that relate to the public weal. Private and personal interests should not prevail in the casting of his vote. The candidate for legislative honors has also responsibilities and obligations. His qualifications should guide the elector in his choice.

HE SHOULD HAVE A CAPACITY FOR BUSINESS.

He is not fit to be entrusted with another man's business who cannot look after his own. He is not elected for holiday excursions to the capital. The business of the country involves, not a few hundred paltry dollars, but hundreds of thousands or of millions. There are many and diversified interests to be cared for, that require for their management a clear intellect and a sound judgment. It does not matter much whether he be a lawyer, physician, merchant, editor, or farmer. In every profession he will find ample opportunities for the development of those qualities that are necessary to success. A prosperous business career may vindicate his claim for the opportunity to serve in the larger sphere that opens in the political arena.

HE SHOULD HAVE A GOOD REPUTATION.

One may bear the title of Honorable, or Lord or any other lofty title, and yet be unworthy of respect. He may be learned and stand high in his profession and be scorned by those who know him best. Even a Lord Bacon may be described as the basest of mankind.

The best of men may suffer in reputation, but as a rule it is in his own hands. A virtuous life has its rewards in the respect and honor which it achieves.

OUR REPRESENTATIVE SHOULD BE A MORAL MAN.

He who wishes to enter public life should wear unsullied robes as his only armor. The party is discounted that supports a man of impure morals. Diogenes carried a lantern in his search for an honest man. Such men are not so scarce in this fair country of ours that we have need to seek out for the doubtful or need be chosen for representative who cannot stand before the people in the pure white light of an upright life.

AS FAR AS THE COUNTRY IS CONCERNED THE CAMPAIGN FOR A GENERAL ELECTION IS ALREADY ON AND IT WILL BE A BITTER CONTEST.

If the principle point in the government program be as we are led to believe it will, an attack on the House of Lords, the government can do nothing better to play the game for their opponents.

The Second Quarter of ten weeks will begin on Monday, November 15th, and end on February 4th—49 teaching days.

The First Half School Year will have 103 teaching days.

Christmas Vacation (eleven teaching days) begins on December 24th, 1909.

Schools re-opens on January 10th, 1910.

Football has claimed a toll of thirty lives and 216 injured during the present season, according to the Chicago Herald. This is the largest number of deaths recorded in nine years, according to the Record Herald figures which have been kept since 1901. The thirty deaths include eight college players, twenty high school boys, and two members of athletic clubs. The injuries were divided among 171 college men, 40 high school players and 5 from athletic clubs.

In Lunenburg county Attorney General MacLean was returned by a good majority in spite of the spirited fight put up by Mr. Margeson. The introduction of a labor candidate in Cumberland resulted in saving the seat for the government standard-bearer, in Hans Mr. Parsons, a worthy successor to the late Mr. Wilcox, who was endorsed by the Hans County Temperance Alliance, won out in spite of an even greater than usual majority for the government at Windsor Forks.

Keeping Potatoes Over Winter.

The bins in which potatoes are stored should be of slat construction so as to admit the air from the sides and should be raised about six inches away from the wall. The bin should not be over five feet wide and preferable not over five feet deep. It is highly to use larger bins when the potatoes are to be kept for any length of time. Continuous ventilation from the potato cellar should be provided for by means of an air shaft to the roof.

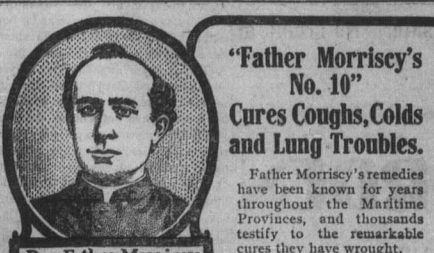

Those Who Drank Are Dead.

The result of observation by the Hon. Chas. M. Dewey, president of the New York Central Railroad Co., in a talk to railroad men:

'Twenty-five years ago, I knew every man, woman and child in Peekskill, and it has been a study with me to mark boys who started in every grade of life with myself, to see what had become of them.'

'I was up last fall and began to count them over, and it was an instructive exhibit.'

'Some of them became clerks, merchants, manufacturers, lawyers and doctors. It is remarkable that every one of those that drank is dead, not one living of my age. Barring a few, who were taken off by sickness, every one that proved a wreck or wrecked his family, did it from rum and no other cause.'

'Of those who are church-going people, who are steady, industrious, and hard working men, who were frugal and thrifty, every single one of them, without an exception, owes the house in which he lives, and has something laid by, the interest on which, with his house, would carry him through many a rainy day.'

'When a man becomes debased with gambling or drink, he doesn't care and all his finer feelings are crowded out.—Normal Instructor.

There is no freedom in serving our own will. 'I usually carry a cigar with me,' said a man who smokes but little, 'as a sort of declaration of independence.'
