Almost any seeds man can give the proportions in which they should be mixed, which must vary according to the number of kinds of these seeds that can be found, as many seedsnen do not have them all, and the haracter of the land may make it desirable to drop some of them and substitute others, as using oat grass or rye grass and the crested dog-tail grass upon very dry soils, or where sheep are to be pastured, instead of some of those named above for moist soils. SOIL FOR HOUSE PLANTS. The first few inches of soil under the sod of an old pasture, says Vick's Magazine, will supply the basis of a good potting soil. Experience has shown that the addition of some leaf mold — more or less - will improve the character of the soil The leaf mold is the vegetable soil or mold found on the surface of the ground in woods and is formed by the decay of the leaves which fall from year to year. A general rule which gardeners sometimes observe is to increase the quantity of leaf mold for fine-rooted plants and to se less, or none of it, for those which DYSENTERY

CHILDREN OF A DULTS make strong, coarse roots. The nice proportions, if worthy of notice, are to be earned only by experience. As soil which will suit a great variety of plants may be composed of three parts loam from an old pasture, as described, and one part leaf mold, and another part of sand to make the soil porous and ensure free drainage. Now to this mixture may be added more or less manure, according to what is desired to be accomplished with the plants. For ordinary house plants one part of well-rotted cow manure may be used and the whole compost will be suitable for most purposes. When fuchsias are wanted to be pushed into a strong growth in the spring, add more manure so, also, with chrysanthenums when a **M**yrtle Navy strong, vigorous growth is wanted. A Queer and Amusing Letter From the Consular Agent at Casablanca

U. S. CONSULAR AGENT. CASABLANCA, MOROCCO, July 19, 1892. MESSES: Your favor of June 22 to hand and contents noted; and in reply I am sorry to say that nothing can be done in in this locality with the class of goods you speak of. Native butter is too plenty and too cheap to undertake to compete

with it at the distance you are writing. And, again, you give your goods a very You say it won't turn rancid; by that the Moors would imagine they could get no stink out of it, in which case it would be quite tasteless to them. They say of but-

ter: No stink, no good? The Moors never put salt in butter, and to prepare it for use they press it into coarse stone jars, containing from ten to forty pounds, the aperture just large enough to pass their fist through; when full, or nearly so, they plaster the top over with soft cow manure, then bury it in the ground, and when it has been there from three to five years it is taken out all ready for use. It then contains all the colors of the rainbow, and has many different tastes and scents. Butter is of no use to the Moor until it is toned up to that pitch and unless you can conjure up an article that will outstink the Moorish butter when prepared for use, don't write me any more on that subject.
