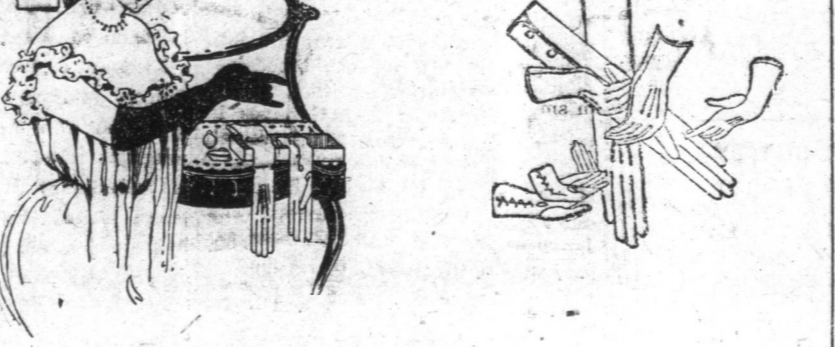

CRISIS IN FRANCE

Paris, Dec. 9.—France tonight seems to face an alarming religious crisis. Last night's report of the pope's rejection at the eleventh hour of the government's final offer, under which Catholic worship was to be continued under the common law, turned out to be true. The deadlock is now apparently complete. According to the pope's orders, declarations made by the law of 1881 were prohibited, but the parish priests must remain in their churches until driven out by violence.

The official confirmation of this communication has created a sensation both in government and Catholic circles. Cardinal Lecocq, the Archbishop of Bordeaux, Archbishop Germain and others who advised compliance with the law have hastily instructed the parish priests in their dioceses that their former advice is null and void.

During the past week, the Manchester House has changed hands. Mr. Metz of the Victoria Restaurant, and Mr. Langhousen, are now the proprietors. Mr. Percy Elias and family have gone to reside in Edmonton. Mr. Asher, a student in the Alberta College, preached at both services in the Presbyterian church on Sabbath last.

EDMONTON STREET RAILWAY

Steadily the idea of municipal ownership of street railway grows. A few years ago there were no examples of municipal street railway operation and ownership in Canada, good or bad, but when the franchise of the Toronto Railway Company runs out in 1921 many of the smaller cities will have had considerable experience in this respect.

TO IMPROVE WELLAND CANAL

The enlargement and improvement of the Welland Canal was a subject of discussion at the board of trade on Tuesday. The question arose from a request from the Kingston board of trade asking that the Edmonton board co-operate with the boards of trade in western Canada in urging upon the Dominion government the necessity of the scheme.

STOCK JUDGING SCHOOL

Mr. H. A. Craig, superintendent of Farmers' Institutes in Alberta, has just returned from a trip to the south country and towns along the C. & E., arranging for a series of stock judging schools to be held during the coming winter season.

ALBERTA CIVIC ELECTIONS

Initial, Alberta Dec. 11.—The election in municipal resulted in the election of P. L. Constance as mayor and A. B. McCrae, J. E. Fawcett and F. Thompson for councillors. The school trustees are G. E. Kilty and G. S. Kirkham.

LAND GRANTS FOR AFRICAN VETERANS

Ottawa, Dec. 10.—Sir Frederick Borden, on behalf of the Dominion Government, accepted a resolution moved by Col. Hughes in the House this afternoon that grants of Dominion land should be set apart for those who took part in the South African war of 1898-1902, residing in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta at the time of enlistment.

Mr. Turriff and other western members had been calling the government's attention to this important matter. The resolution was unanimously adopted. Sir Wilfrid Laurier accepted the following resolution which was also proposed by Colonel Hughes.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this House the best interests of Canada and the Empire would be served by the settling in Canada of honorably discharged British soldiers and their families." This resolution was also carried unanimously.

Mr. Herron (S. Alberta) moved that coal lands owned by the government of Canada should only be allotted under such conditions and subject to such control and regulations as will provide for an immediate supply of coal adequate at all times to the requirements of the people.

Mr. Oliver said he had no fault to find with the speeches, but they were not in accord with the resolution. The C. P. R. had twenty-five million acres in Alberta carrying coal rights.

Marie, who had contracted a severe cold from the long exposure.
