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





The third in the series of Lenten sermons was preached by His Grace Archbishop Howley at the R. C. Cathedral last night in presence of a large congregation. The text was: "Come Unto Me all you who Labor and are Heavily Burdened and I will Refresh you." These words of our Divine Lord, said the Archbishop, were addressed to the people living at the present time as well as to the Jew and the Gentiles of the day on which they were uttered. The invitation was intended for sinners to whom special graces and privileges are open during the season of Lent. 



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
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
