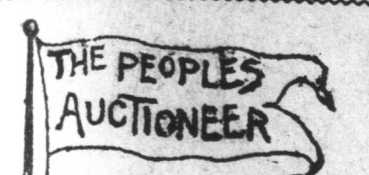

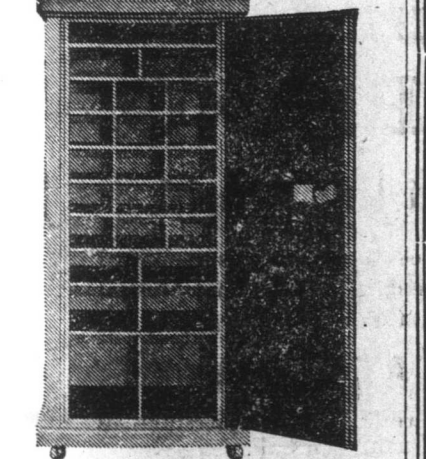

His wife approves. They sell their furniture and with \$100 clear start life anew in one of Murphy's tenements—rent \$3.00 a week. The next day he secures work as a labourer with a subway construction gang at \$1.50 a day. He has emigrated to America and they begin the new life by looking about them to find what opportunities and possibilities are open to them. flow, with this new point of view.

he works back to prosperity again how his wife helps him, and how they save on \$9 a week where they hadn't been able to on \$30, is the rest of the tale. It is a thoroughly original, thought provoking little story, but it is particularly because of the part that Ruth, his wife, takes, that I want you middle class women to read it. Her studies in economy—the economy of thrifty buying, not merely of doing without, ought to be suggestive to every woman who is appalled by the high cost of living. Here are one or two samples of this: "Now for breakfast we must have oatmeal every morning. And we'll get it in bulk. I've priced it and it's only a little over three cents a pound at some of the stores." "And the kind we've always had?" "About twelve when it's done up in packages." They visited the wholesale meat shops and familiarized themselves with the possibilities there. "Every stall in the market had its bargains of meat—wholesale bits unattractive to the careless customer. We bought here for 50 cents enough round steak for several good meals of hash. "We couldn't have bought it for less than a dollar in the suburbs, and even at that we wouldn't have known anything about it, for the store was too far for Ruth to make a personal visit and the butcher himself would never have mentioned such an odd end to a member of our neighbourhood." These are one or two suggestions of the way in which Ruth made it possible to save on nine dollars a week. I wish there were room for more, but I hope I've given enough to impel you to go to your library for the book. To the average housewife who gives her orders to a boy at the door or over the telephone, and who buys with no idea at all of nutriment values, it seems to me that Ruth's studies in true economy can't fail to be a thought provoking lesson.

Household Notes. When ironing an embroidered article see how much better it will look if ironed on a Turkish towel. Place the right side of the article on the towel and iron on the wrong side. The pattern will stand out remarkably well if treated this way. An almost infallible remedy for choking is to throw the arms straight up. When a cake of soap is worn nearly thin enough to break, stick it to the new cake by putting both in quite warm water, then press firmly together. When cold it will be one solid cake. This does away with small pieces of soap, and there is no waste. To test drinking water put one teaspoonful of granulated sugar in a pint of the water you want to test. Cork tightly, place on the kitchen mantelshelf. If pure, the water will remain clear, if not it will cloud densely, and ought to be analyzed. Before washing ebony brushes smear a little good vaseline over the backs. This prevents the ammonia or soda water in which they are washed from injuring the ebony. The vaseline should afterward be carefully rubbed off and the backs polished with dry cloths. For Vienna steak sauce three-quarters of a pound of raw steak season with salt, paprika and minced chives, roll out on a lightly floured board, form into small flat cakes and fry in butter. Place in a sand bath or near a fire till the wax is dissolved. Apply white warm with a soft camel-hair brush before a fire or in the sunshine. In cooking vegetables, all those grown under ground should be cooked in cold water, adding the salt before they are done, and they should be kept covered while cooking. All of the fresh or green vegetables should be put on in boiling water and left uncovered so that they keep their color. To clean carpets after the carpet has been thoroughly beaten and re-laid wash it with the following mixture: Three parts of hot water to one of bullock's gall, using a clean, fine flannel and rubbing it well in. Brush it with a soft brush and then rub again with a flannel and leave it to dry.

Labrador Unprotected.

Last year the Game and Inland Fisheries Board had in their service some 90 wardens. This service cost nearly \$6,000, and this charge together with the Secretary's salary of \$800 per annum, not to speak of other charges, cannot be met by an income on the scale of that of last year, derived from the Red Tax, Deer Licenses and fines and forfeitures. Moreover, the Board reports that the service is far from adequate. It is by no means complete on the Island of Newfoundland and altogether absent from the great dependency of the Labrador. As to the latter, the members "recognize the fact that it has many splendid salmon streams, and that it is rich in game and in fur bearing animals. There seems no doubt that over this large territory there has prevailed almost universal violation of all the protective laws, and that this mischief calls for a remedy."

"Before inaugurating any system of protection, it will be necessary to have a survey made and a report as to the streams and localities where protection should be afforded."

Such is the opinion of the Board.

MONTREAL, To-day.
By a vote of 139 to 54, the Methodist Conference in session here approved of the proposed basis of union between the Methodist, Congregational and Presbyterian churches.

COLON, Noon.
Mistaking for a school of sardines some breakers ahead, a pilot ran the steamer Tabago on a reef on the coast of St. Pantas. Twenty three lives were lost and eighty lives saved.

LONDON, To-day.
Officials of the Sailors' Union persist in the statement that a strike is imminent and that preparations are complete. Signs of activity in the dock districts are absent, however, although placards are posted everywhere to enjoin seamen to await the signal. Other unions, closely connected with the maritime trades, have no intimation of the Sailors' intentions.

WINNIPEG, To-day.
The fuel famine has become so acute in the West that the Government Arbitration Committee left hurriedly for the West last night at the request of the Minister of Labor. The arbitrators who failed a month ago to settle the strike will meet at Coleman today for a final effort to pacify the warring factions. Many big industrial firms are in most serious straits as an effect of the long tie-up of the mines.

LONDON, To-day.
If an important situation is developing at all it is outside rather than inside parliament. Sir Edward Grey's admission to the National Liberal Club on Thursday—that if the Equitable scheme of the Lords for the reconstruction of their House had been known earlier, the present conflict might have been avoided—has caused lively comment. It is believed that the problem gains a new complexion by this speech, which is regarded as indicative of development in the direction of peace. There is a general impression also that Home Rule has been "betrayed," i.e. that a compromise may be reached between the Veto Bill and the Reform Bill, on the understanding that Home Rule be postponed. It is believed that Mr. Balfour's bitter hatred of Home Rule alone made the famous conference abortive and that he will agree to much if that is abandoned.

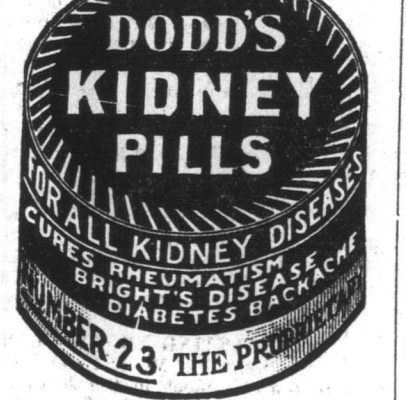

BANK INSPECTORS HERE.—Messrs. Clarke and Skill, inspectors of the Bank of Montreal, arrived in town by the express yesterday to inspect the branch here. They are making a tour through the Maritime Provinces, visiting all the Bank's branches.

He hit him in the face several times with his fist and then knocked him down into the cut. He went to Mrs. Brien's nearby and had the blood washed off his face and plaster put on.

SALONICA, Turkey, June 6.
A \$75,000 ransom was demanded today by Turkish bandits, who last week kidnapped Professor Richter, the German explorer, and are now holding him prisoner on Mount Olympus. With the demand came a letter, written by Richter, in which he implores the Turkish Government or his friends to meet the demands of the bandits. The Turkish troops have advised the Government against paying any ransom, and are trying to force the inhabitants at the bottom of Mount Olympus to reveal the hiding place of the bandits, and are subjecting them to cruellest tortures. The Professor's friends are raising a fund for the ransom.

King George has cabled Earl Grey his thanks for Canada's birthday congratulations. The cable says: "My sincerest thanks for your telegram expressing loyal congratulations from my subjects in Canada."

NEW-YORK, June 6.
A Washington dispatch to the "Tribune" says, the Reciprocity agreement will be adopted in the Senate without amendment, with thirty votes to spare. It is the prediction based on a careful poll of the Senate. This poll shows a remarkable change of sentiment, due in a large measure to the fight made by Taft for its legislation, and the overwhelming public sentiment in favor of the agreement. At present the vote of the Senate stands as follows: For Reciprocity—Republicans, 23; Democrats, 35. Total, 58. Against—Republicans, 25; Democrats, 3. Total, 28. Doubtful, 4. In view of the large majority in favor of the agreement, the impres-

sion prevails that it will prove impossible to amend the Bill. If such be the case, several Senators now opposed to the measure may find it expedient to vote for it.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, B.W.I., June 6.
Instructions were issued to the Customs police department to-day not to allow Castro, the exiled ex-president of Venezuela, to land, should he arrive at any Jamaican ports. It is feared by the authorities, if Castro be permitted to land here, he would use the Island as a base of operations against the present Government of Venezuela.

Another Enthusiastic Meeting.
The Coronation Concert Committee meeting in the Chief Justice's Chambers last night was a full and enthusiastic one. Sir William Horwood occupied the chair, and his remarks at the opening had a ring about them that gave a patriotic tone and temper to the whole proceedings.

All the sub-committees were well represented, and, as the different Chairmen made their reports, it was easy to see that the success of the movement had already been assured. Messrs. J. A. Clift and F. J. Morris, from the Finance Committee, handed in a long list of additional subscriptions, most of which were un solicited, and thus placed the matter of "ways and means" beyond the realm of apprehension.

Messrs. Bennett, Slattery and Howell reported very satisfactory progress in the work of preparation at the Prince's Rink for the accommodation of choirs and bands. The huge platform will be so constructed as to admit of all the performers being in full view of the audience all the time. It is now regarded as pretty certain that the vocalists will number about 250 (as a great many good singers who are not identified with any of the city choirs have volunteered services) and the instrumentalists between 75 and 100. It will thus be seen that the "volume of harmonious sound" promised to be the greatest and grandest ever heard here.

Mr. Hutton, the Conductor, reported very favourably of his arrangements preparatory to the first vocal recital, which takes place to-morrow (Thursday) evening. Later on he will be a grand practice of all the "Bible" Bands, and then a united rehearsal of the whole programme. On motion of Mr. Clift, seconded by Mr. Shea, a committee was appointed to ascertain what flags, banners and bunting are obtainable for decorating purposes, and to report at the next meeting, which takes place on Monday evening, the 12th instant. Before the meeting closed His Lordship, the Chief Justice announced that His Excellency the Governor would be present and open the Concert with a short and appropriate speech; and those who had the pleasure of listening to Sir Ralph last year during the Accession functions, will, it is needless to say, be more than pleased to hear him again on the 23rd instant.

After Mass the coffin was borne in procession to the Nun's Cemetery where the final prayers were recited and the departed Sister laid to rest. The deceased Nun was a native of St. John's. She was in the 39th year of her Religious Profession.—R. I. P.

Boats Doing Well.

From passengers who arrived here by last night's train from Argentina we learn of very good accounts of the work of the Placentia Bay boats fishing at Cape St. Mary's. The Placentia boats have from 70 to 80 otter under sail, and some have as high as 100 ft. The Argentina boats also average from 80 to 100 qts. Mr. Mat. Murphy is top notcher with 100 qts. to his credit. At 10:30 three boats owned by Griffin Bros. arrived a couple of days ago with full fares. The boats on the shore get from 2 to 3 qts. per day with hook and line and the fish are exceptionally large and well fed. Good work is also being done at Red Island. Bad weather for a while impeded the fishery; but now that it is propitious, good prospects of a paying voyage are ahead.

At Gower St. Church.

A Coronation service will be held at Gower St. Methodist Church, on Thursday, June 22nd, at 9:30 a.m. Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite will preside. Rev. T. B. Darby, President of the Conference, will deliver the sermon of the occasion. The service will be representative of all the Methodist Churches in Newfoundland. Other leading ministers of the church will also participate in the service. The music for the occasion will be under the direction of Mr. F. J. King, who will be assisted by the several Methodist choirs of the city. As an official expression of the loyalty of many thousands of His Majesty's subjects in this Colony and as an act of united intercession for the blessing of God on his reign, this service will be one of great importance.

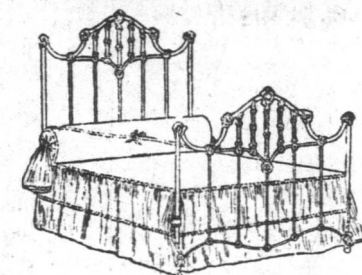

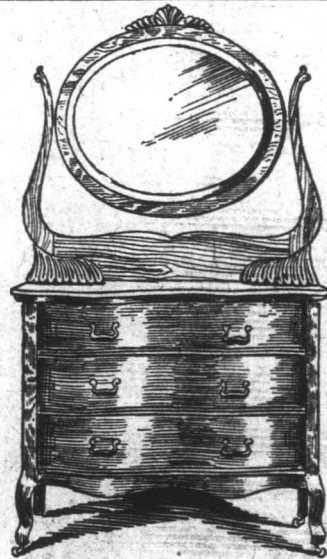
