Jin Jitsu Killed Her.

Evidence Resulted in Warrant for Arrest of Lawyer Gibson, Who Was Taken Into Custody in New York.

The warrant was based on evidence given before Judge Royce by Dr. Shultz, coroner's physician, that there were tricks of jiu jitsu whereby Mrs. Szabo could have suffered sharp blow in the throat which so affected the nerve as to close her air passage, thereby making it impossible to breathe. There was no water in her lungs. He demonstrated to the judge to prove this.

Last night Gibson's house was sur rounded by detectives who used auto search lights to illumine the surroundings. Gibson came to this city this morning trailed by private de tectives and a squad of newspape As he walked through the streets to his office a crowd of sev eral hundred people followed him.
