The Guilty Party.

One hears a great deal of protest from time to time against the owners of houses and apartments and the hostesses of boarding houses and lodging houses who bar children. Now it surely must be pretty trying to find one's self shut out of a home which one is perfectly willing to pay for, simply because he has dared to help keep the race alive. But I wonder if the landlords and hostesses deserve all our blame. It seems to me that the ill-bred children and the careless parents who bring down odium on all children deserve at least half the blame. Surely he who abuses a privilege is just as much at fault when the privilege is withdrawn, as he who withdraws it.

A beautiful apartment house was recently put up in our town. Families with children were not excluded and two moved in. One family had three children; they were well brought up and did not cause any trouble. This child was an inveterate tease and one of her most pleasing tricks was to get out on the lawn in front of the house and then argue at the top of her lungs with her mother at the third floor window.

Dialogues like this were frequently howled into the ears of the other tenants:

"What are you doing down there? I told you to stay in the house."
"I want to go down to Ruth's."
"I told you that you couldn't. Come right back up here."
"I don't want to. Can't I go down to Ruth's for just a little while?"
"No, Margery. Come right upstairs. I'll tell your father if you don't."
"Can I have some candy if I come up?"
"Perhaps so. You come in and I'll see."

I have cut this dialogue rather short on account of limited space, but some of the tenants assured me that Margery and her mother were troubled by no limits, and that such dialogues frequently lasted fifteen minutes at a time, interrupting naps, rendering concentration on work or play totally impossible, and generally making things miserable.

The result of this and other displeasing habits of the youngster, quite too numerous to mention, was that the two tenants gave notice and the landlord finally had to ask the offenders to leave. The rule has now been made that no families with children will be accepted in that apartment house.

"It isn't that I don't like children. I love them," said the hostess of a boarding house in reference to her refusal to take a family with two children who will drive away the rest of my guests."

Tea.

Tea is a placid, untroubled beverage which is served to people who wish to become thoroughly heated through before retiring. For cups of vigorous green tea, swallowed in a molten state, will bring a man's temperature up to 104 degrees in the shade and allow him to crawl in between cold sheets without throwing a relay of chills.

Tea is made in Japan by barefooted hired men, who beat it into a state of insensibility with their feet, after which it is shipped to this country and served to the accompaniment of a high handshake.

Tea growers are used as horrible examples of foreign pauper labor and become very effective in bolstering a high protective tariff, as they seldom pay over 15 cents a day gross.

Owing to the scarcity of men and women in this country who go about barefooted, the tea industry has never secured much of a hold here.

Tea is a favorite drink of the bird of prey known as the social butterfly and has taken the place of frappe as an incentive to small talk. Some of the smallest talk we ever heard in our life came from a garrulous guest who was flooded with native eloquence and Oolong tea.

The best way to prepare tea for the table is to catch it when it is ripe, mix a few strands with boiling water and pour without straining. This will cause the tea to rise to the surface so that people can tell it from plain hot water at the first glance.

While the guests are picking out the tea and depositing it upon their butter plates they will be too busy to empty the olive dish, thus effecting quite a saving.

The English people drink tea nine times a day and then perspire in broad, Anglo-Saxon accents.

Women drink more tea than men and prefer black tea to any other variety, as it will keep them awake longer and allow them to finish something they started to say the day before. Men seldom drink tea to excess, and never without crossing their fingers.

The Housing Problem and Householders.

The problems which Morris has refused to 'tackle' are those which affect the homes of the people. He has failed absolutely to carry out the pre-election pledges which make for the comfort and well-being of the home, and what he is doing is adding hardships and discomforts to those same homes. He promised to see that there was a proper housing of workmen at mines and other industrial centres. He has made absolutely no provision whatever to carry out this pledge. On the contrary, the problem is much more acute to-day than it was four years ago, when the pledge was given. Moreover, the problem is also more difficult of solution owing to the higher prices which prevail and the consequent increase in cost of building. Morris will get a black eye when he goes to the country next time. His principal legislation has been to provide for Branch Railway building. When he made that contract and when he put it through the Legislature, why did he not embody in that contract and enact in that legislation provisions for carrying out this promise?

He also propose the enactment of Legislation requiring the proper housing of workmen at mines and other industrial centres, and the provision of adequate measures of sanitation?

His railway building is likely to prove a boomerang and is calculated to hit him hard next election. Instead of proving a vote winner it will work out a vote loser. The workmen and their friends will want to know why he forgot a housing clause in the contract and act, and remembered to put in the clause about paying the Contractor in cash instead of bonds.

Another broken pledge of Morris relates to the comfort of the home. He promised to cheapen coal. He said the high price of coal had created a serious situation in 1908. He declared the situation affected every fire-side and that it had become a national grievance. Four years have passed

since that promise was made and the price of coal has been rising all the time. To-day it is much higher than it was in September 1908. Instead of the grievance being redressed, it is more afflicting to-day than it was then, and the outlook for warm homes during the coming winter at a reasonable cost is more gloomy than it ever was.

Thus far, we have shown that Morris has failed absolutely to keep his promise to enact legislation requiring proper housing. We have shown also that he has failed to keep his promise to take steps to cheapen coal. We shall see also that he has failed to signal to cheapen the other creature comforts of the home. He promised to put on the free list tea, sugar, pork and other prime necessities of life on which heavy taxes are imposed. He has failed to do so. The buoyant revenue has afforded him full opportunity of doing this. Instead of this he has thrown away that opportunity by frittering away public moneys on all kinds of devices to catch votes. He has not only failed to carry out his promise to reduce taxation, but he is exacting more money from taxpayers than ever a Premier did in the history of the Colony. He is taking advantage of increased prices on imported goods to take more money out of the people. In the case of a manufacturer's price going up a dollar on an article on which there is an ad valorem duty of 40 per cent, he is exacting an extra 40 cents. Not only is the consumer called to pay the old price and the old tax, he has to pay the extra dollar, the extra duty, and the extra profits on the extra out of pocket expenditure of the importers.

No wonder is it that merchants are growing anxious about the piling up of the public moneys. No wonder is it that householders are getting concerned about the increasing cost of living. No wonder is it that the public view with disgust timber scandals, new jobs for heesters, picnics for politicians, grabs for supporters and general wanton waste of public money. No wonder is it that voters have determined to oust the Administration which has failed to insist on proper housing to cheapen coal and to reduce taxation as they promised, but have carried on a policy which is calculated to bleed the country white.

Jiu Jitsu Killed Her.

Evidence Resulted in Warrant for Arrest of Lawyer Gibson, Who Was Taken Into Custody in New York.

New York, Sept. 12.—Burton W. Gibson, lawyer, whose client, Rose Menschik Szabo, lost her life, supposedly from drowning, while boating with him on Greenwood Lake, N. Y., on July 16th, was taken into custody to-day in his office here charged with murder. He issued a statement asserting his innocence and declared there had been no struggle.

The warrant was based on evidence given before Judge Royce by Dr. Shultz, coroner's physician, that there were tricks of jiu jitsu whereby Mrs. Szabo could have suffered a sharp blow in the throat which so affected the nerve as to close her air passage, thereby making it impossible to breathe. There was no water in her lungs. He demonstrated to the judge to prove this.

Last night Gibson's house was surrounded by detectives who used search lights to illumine the surroundings. Gibson came to this city this morning trailed by private detectives and a squad of newspaper men. As he walked through the streets to his office a crowd of several hundred people followed him.

Archbishop McDonald Dead at Montreal.

Montreal, Sept. 17.—The Most Rev. Ronald McDonald, Archbishop of Cortyna, (in partibus infidelium), formerly Bishop of Harbour Grace, Nfld., died at the infirmary of the Nunery here at 3 p.m. The late Archbishop was born at Maryvale, Antigonish, in 1835. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1859, and was a professor in the St. Francis Xavier College for two years. In 1862 he became pastor of the newly organized parish of Pictou, and there he remained until his consecration as Bishop of Harbour Grace in 1881. On his retirement from the diocese of Harbour Grace on account of ill health six years ago, he was made Archbishop of Cortyna. Since then he resided at Pictou. On last Wednesday he arrived in Montreal for special nursing and surgical treatment, and was admitted to the infirmary of the Grey Nunery, where he passed away. Father Roderick MacDonald of Westville, N. S., is a brother of the late Archbishop.

Across Greenland From West to East

Copenhagen, Sept. 13.—Greenland has been crossed for the first time from west to east over the barren ice by the Swiss Expedition under Dr. Deuervain, joint director of the Swiss central Meteorological Institute, who is now at Reykjavik, the capital of Iceland. All the members of the party are well.

Members of the expedition started from Jakobshavn in Danish North-west Greenland, and marched for three months over the ice wastes. They made the east coast on August 2nd, ten miles from Angnagsalik, which was their goal. Many valuable scientific results were achieved.

The greatest height of the inland measured 2,500 metres, but the party saw higher peaks and discovered mountains on Christian IX Land, nearer the east coast.

Dr. Deuervain will hold the material he has collected until he is able to make comparisons with the results of the Danish expedition under Capt. J. P. Koch, which will cross from west to east in 1913, but by a more northerly route.

Teachers' Union Dissolved

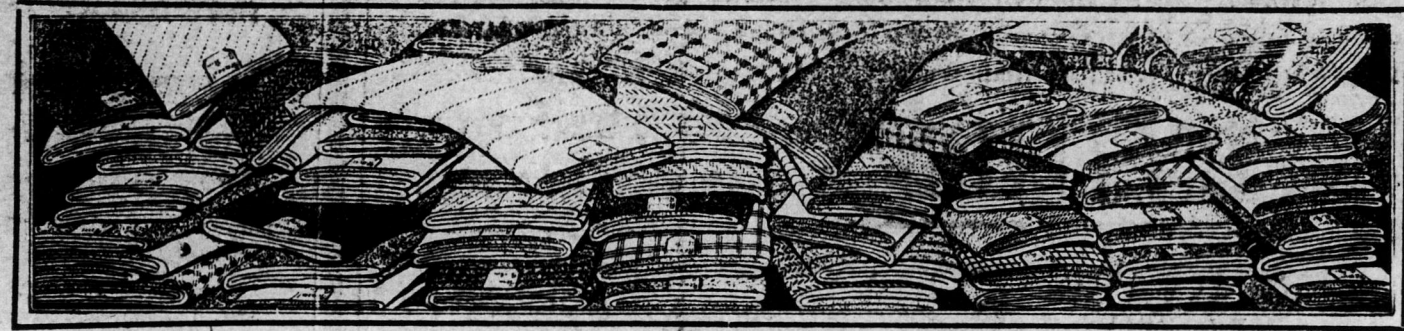
French Government Compels Dissolution Because of Anti-Militarism.

Nearly a Marine Disaster.

Schr. Industri Cut Down by a Steamer in Mid-Ocean.

This morning J. S. Munn, Esq., of Bowring Bros., had a message from the head office in Liverpool stating in effect that the schooner Industri had been cut down by an unknown steamer in mid-ocean, was a total loss and that the crew were brought into Liverpool safe. The Industri was owned by Norwegian people from whom she was chartered by Messrs. Bowring Bros. to take a cargo of Newfoundland fish to foreign markets. The craft loaded at Buri, on the Southwest Coast, a few weeks ago, taking 2,800 qts. of fish. She then left for Oporto and after being a week at sea was run down. The steamer that did the damage was going full speed and struck the fish carrier amidships, almost cutting her in two. Very soon after the vessel filled with water and sank. The captain and crew had a narrow escape with their lives, but lost all their belongings. They put out in boats and were picked up and brought into Liverpool by a steamer which was bound on that place. It was fortunate that this ship passed in the neighbourhood of the shipwreck or another marine tragedy would have to be told. The Industri carried a crew of ten all told, and though owned in Norway most of her seamen were Newfoundlanders. The vessel and cargo are covered by insurance.

Americans Were Underbid

WASHINGTON, To-day. The Hatfield Steel Co., Hatfield, England, underbid the nearest American competitor \$200,000 on \$10,000,000 contract for two thousand fourteen inch shells. The American concern called upon the Navy Department to decide if it intends to violate the unwritten policy not to award to a foreign company a contract for ammunition for American warships.

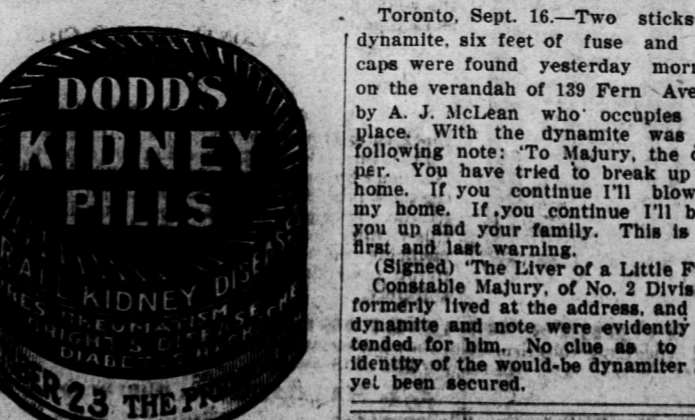
