the Governor in Council has been pleased to order that the following Regulations respecting Lights shall come into effect as and from this W. W. HALFYARD, Colonial Secretary. Dep't of Colonial Secretary,

July 16th, 1918. 1. Measures shall be taken so that the glare or upward reflection from street or other outdoor lights in the City of St. John's shall be reduced to

fifty per cent. of the normal. This Regulation will also apply to Bell Island, Conception Bay.

2. No light shall be lit in any public building, shop or private residence in the City of St. John's, except the windows in such public building shop. windows in such public building, shop or residence are covered by suitable or residence are covered by suitable blinds or shades, so that the glare or reflection upon the heavens is reduced to fifty per cent. of the normal.

3. Head lights used on any motor cars or motor cycles in or near the City of St. John's, or in or near any tlement in the Districts of St John's East or West, or on any road approaching St. John's or any of the said settlements, upon which lights may be visible at sea, shall be so obscured that the glare or upward reflection upon the heavens shall be reduced to fifty per cent of the normal Side lights on motor cars, motor cycles, or vehicles of any description must be obscured, and shall not be of greater strength than ten candle

4. It will be the duty of the members of the Constabulary to see that these Regulations are strictly enforced and all orders issued by them for their better observance shall be forthwith carried out. 5. Every person convicted of a violation of these Rules and Regulations before a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$100, or in default of payment, to imprisonment 5. 



"On the night of the 9th October, 1917, the transport officer and four of his men were killed on their way to Battalion Headquarters with rations. Immediately upon receipt of the news, Sergt. Aitken volunteered to attempt to reach Headquarters with a fresh supply of water. Taking four men with him he started for transport lines at 1.30 a.m. on the 10th and after meeting with considerable amount of shell fire, safely delivered supplies at Brigade Head-

quarters." I wish to congratulate you on the conduct of your son, which reflects redit, not only on himself, but on his Regiment.

Coal Operations.

(Western Star.)

Coal mining operations continue at the Howley-Grand Lake areas, under the direction of Capt. McCuish, for the A.N.D. Co. of Grand Falls. A drift of 500 feet has been driven. In this drift are three coal seams. The upper seam runs from two to three inches, the middle seam averages about six inches, while the bottom seam, which dips, runs from 18 to 20 inches of the finest kind of bituminous coal, which burns with a blue flame leaving a white ash and no clinkers. The coal is being used at the works, and is giving excellent results as a steam as well as domestic article. A shaft will now be sunk from the end of the drift, which is on the east or opposite side of the brook to the old workings, and about two miles from Howley station. Twelve men are employed there, working two eight-hour shifts daily.

The World's Holldays.

According to statistics drawn up by the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, during the present year there are only eighty-four days on which banks are open everywhere in the world. On every one of the other two hundred and eighty-one days some nation somewhere it will be celebrating a civil or religious holiday, or observing the Sabbath. Only one of these holidays is universal. This is New Year's Day, and eleven different dates are observed by various countries as the beginning of a new year. Some countries observe more than one during the calendar year. Five Christian countries do not observe Christmast as a legal holiday. Brazil leads the nations in the number of its holidays. It has eightyfour, and the United States is second with fifty-four. Although such days as New Year's Day, Washinugton's Birthday, Independence Day, Christmas, and others are generally celebrated throughout the United States, there is no national legal holiday. The fixing of holidays in the United States is a matter determined by the

individual States. France observes eighteen formal holidays during the year, and Italy twenty-three. Among the other belligerents. Germany, it is presumed will observe twenty days; Great Britain sixteen, Japan fifteen, and Russia seventeen. In most of these countries numerous local holidays ordinarily observed have been abandoned during the war.

November-Holiday Month. Among the favourite months for holidays the world over, November leads, with twenty-six out of its possible thirty days. May comes next with twenty-five. Christmas Day is not so generally

observed as New Year's Day. It has, however, only three different dates. The only country whose holidays reveal little of its political, racial, or religious origin is Portugal. This is its calendar: January 1st, dedicated to universal brotherhood; January 31st, dedicated to the memory of all those who fought and died to establish the republic of Portugal; May 3rd, in memory of the discovery of Brazil by the Portuguese; June 19th. municipal holiday at Lisbon: June 24th, municipal holiday at Oporto; 5th, the date of the establishment of the Portuguese frepublic; December 1st, Flag Day, to commemorate the independence of the country; December 25th, family day.



of Shipping and under the provisions of the War Measures Act, 1914, and Acts in amendment thereof, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following regulations respecting the sale of household (Soft) Coal.

W. W. HALFYARD, Colonial Secretary Colonial Secretary's Department,

18th July, 1918.

(1) Because of the present serious condition in the Coal producing centres and the limited stocks held here, it is hereby ordered that no Coal Vendor in the City of St. John's shall sell or deliver to any person more than One-half Ton (1120 lbs.) of Soft Coal per fortnight until further notice, without a written order from the Department of Shipping.

Such order may in the discretion of the Department of Shipping be given to any person who, being a householder, shall satisfy the Department that the allowance herein provided is insufficient for his needs, or to any owner of a factory or industrial plant who shall satisfy it that the said allowance is insufficient to carry on his ordinary trade or business. Any such order may be revoked, cancelled or varied from time, to time as the Department of Ship-

ping may determine.) Any person receiving a supply of Coal under these Regulations shall not transfer it or any part

thereof to any other person. Any person obtaining or attempting to obtain a larger supply of Coal than he is entitled to under these Regulations shall be guilty

of a breach of the same. Every Coal Vendor shall furnish on Monday morning of each week to the Department of Shipping a full list duly certified by him in

writing of the names and addresses of all persons to whom he has sold or delivered Coal during the previous week, and the quantity sold or delivered.

(6) Every Carter of Coal shall be supplied by the Vendor with a delivery note for each lot of Coal stating the name and address of the person to whom the Coal is to be delivered. No Carter shall deliver Coal to any person other than the person named on his delivery note.

(7) No person having a supply of Coal on hand or in stock shall be entitled to or shall purchase or obtain a further supply until his stock is less than one quarter of

(8) The penalty for a breach of any of these Regulations shall not exceed \$500.00, with or without imprisonment not exceeding Three months, and may be imposed and recovered upon summary conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace in the name of the Minister of Ship-

(9) The Minister of Shipping may from time to time suspend the operation of these Regulations or any of them and for such periods as he may think fit by notice in two daily papers, and may from time to time revive and bring the same again into force by notice in the manner hereinbefore set

10) During the suspension of any regulation as provided in Section 9, the Department of Shipping may permit any Coal Dealer tosell or deliver, or any person to receive, a quantity of Soft Coal not exceeding ten tons, and if such person shall satisfy the Department of Shipping that ten tons is insufficient for his needs the Department may, by written order to that effect, allow such persons to receive a larger quan-

(11) The provision of Chapter 1 of Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) relating to the construction of Statutes shall so far as the same are applicable apply to these Regulations.



Public Notice!

Regarding Household Coal.

The Minister of Shipping requests those able and desirous of laying in their winter supply of coal to do so at once as stocks are now sufficiently large to permit the removal for a limited period of the present restrictions of half ton per fortnight.

Accordingly it is ordered under the powers conferred upon the Minister of Shipping by clause 9 of the Coal Order dated 18th July, 1918, that clause 1 of that order be suspended until further notice, and that the following clause be substituted for same:-

"No Coal Vendor in the City of St. John's shall sell or deliver to any person more than ten (10) tons of soft coal until further notice without a written order from the Department of the Minister of Shipping."

In all other respects the coal order of the 18th July, 1918, made under the War Measures Act, 1914,

shall remain in force. It is hoped that the Public will stock as much coal as is possible under existing circumstances and thus

assist the Department in dealing with the coal problem.



The Home Office and the Huns

Our failure to deal in an energetic and statesmanlike manner with the enemy alien question constitutes a danger to the State in more ways than one. The danger of allowing enemy subjects to live in prohibited areas simply because the people in question have not been discovered in any "overt act" is, of course, plain to everyone but a Home Office official. But there is another aspect of Hun coddling which is, in its way, even more important.

The whole attitude of our rulers towards alien enemies, enemy alien banks, prisoners of war, and so forth, is distinctly antagonistic to that of the nation, and the result is a loss of that confidence without which no Government can carry on. The permanent officials by whose advice Ministers allow themselves to be swayed care nothing for the public or what it thinks, but Ministers cannot afford to adopt this Olympian pose. They are the servants of the people, and to disregard the intense and growing irritation which results from a failure to deal with our enemies in a common sense fashion is a very serious blunder.

If we look back, we find that practically every step in the right direction has been taken as the result of popular pressure. It may suit the official apologists to represent the agitation as "Press manufactured" and "Press organized." It is nothing of the kind. It is the expression, frequently through the Press, of a nation's anxiety and growing anger, and though we believe that official stupidity and failure to realise facts is at the bottom of the trouble, there are many who are being driven into accepting a less pleasant explanation

The nation is satisfied—and it has abundant evidence to back its belief -that our uninterned Huns constitute a grave danger to the State. It is, to put it mildly, growing more and more unsympathetic to those Ministers who persist in taking an opposite view. We have suffered too much in this war to allow us to treat this aspect of it lightly.-Daily Mail.

Will Finland Declare War.

What has Finland to gain by declaring war, as rumor says she will, against the Allies? Absolutely nothing. If, however, the question be asked as to what Germany stands to gain thereby, the answer is different.

by way of Sweden would be cut off and the opportunity to exert an influence over the Russian chaos would be correspondingly lessened. The fewer Allied emissaries at Petrograd or Moscow just at present, the better Berlin will be pleased.

Another and more important point, is that such a declaration of war might give Germany a sea base on the northern coast at the head of the Murmansk railway. The port which the Kaiser covets is now occupied by a small Allied force for the protection of the supplies landed there for Russia.

The presence of this force, in fact, is the excuse Finland is giving for getting on) her dignity. She has already demanded its withdrawal and has been told in diplomatic language that there is "nothing doing" unless she can give satisfactory guarantees that the supplies would not find their way to Germany.

As this Allied force can be supported from the sea, the job of turning it out may easily prove tedious. But the attitude of Finland in the matter, throws a bright light on the real character of her "independence."-Vancouver Daily Sun.

War Shipping Marvels.

Steamers built on the Great Lakes are to carry to the Atlantic fabricated material sufficient to increase their length by thirty-six feet after passing through the Welland Canal. That plan has been adopted so that large steamers can be built on the great lakes for ocean service. Measuring 4,200 tons in size when they leave the yard at Great Lake ports, the vessels will go into service on the Atlantic measuring 6,200 tons. The lake yards are to complete the ships to a length of 260 feet. At the Welland Canal they will be cut in two and at the Atlantic coast a new section, 96 feet long, will be inserted in their middle, giving them an ocean-going length of 356 feet. Each vessel is to carry its own fabricated material for the additional 96 feet.

A German helmet brought \$100,000 when it was auctioned off at the Liberty Loan meeting on the steps of the Custom House, New York. Charles E.
