

Second Race To-Day.

Shamrock Damaged Bowsprit on Thursday --- More Measuring Technicalities---Betting Drops to Even Money---Greek Army Resting on Its Successes --- Irish Republican Army Ordered to Close Court Houses.

GREEK OPERATIONS TEMPORARILY ENDED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 16. Mustafa Kemal Yasha, the nationalist leader, has moved his headquarters at Afun Karahisar, seventy miles south of Eskişehir, where the Nationalist General Staff is developing plans to check further advances by the Greeks. The Greeks announced today that their operations had temporarily ended with Greek outposts in the line from Elassas to Kermash, fifteen miles east of Alashert, to eight miles east of Nazilly, to Menerez River.

VILNA OCCUPIED BY LITHUANIANS.

WARSAW, July 16. (By A.P.)—Polaris has agreed to the occupation of Vilna with Lithuanian troops, according to information received in military quarters.

ALONG THE POLISH FRONT.

WARSAW, July 16. The Bolsheviks have occupied Mergon, southeast of Vilna, and are advancing south and west to occupy Smilana, says a communication issued by Army Headquarters to-day. The battle is still continuing along the Smilana River, the communication states. The enemy attack has been repulsed at several points, the communication adds, and the chief attacks are being delivered incessantly south of Dubno.

RUSSIAN-BOLSHEVIST OFFENSIVE HELD UP.

BERNE, July 16. The Russian-Bolshevik offensive in Ukraine is at a standstill, according to advices from Bucharest.

A DARING ORDER.

DUBLIN, July 16. The West Meath County Council ordered all Court Houses in the county closed and Government officials ordered to direct the Irish Republican Army to prevent Government officials from entering the buildings.

IRISH COURTHOUSE BURNED.

BELFAST, July 16. A burning Court House, County Donegal, where the case of Joseph O'Donoghue, Sinn Féin member of Parliament on a charge of soliciting subscriptions for the Irish Republican Army was to be heard, was burned to the ground at Burnfoot.

of England, defeated Tommy Burns, French-Canadian pugilist, in the seventh round of a twenty round bout at the Albert Hall here to-night.

MAY CANCEL CONTRACT.

NEW YORK, July 16. The Russian Soviet Bureau here sent notification to-day to Boyer Sloan and Company of Montreal that in the event of the reported deportation of Santerio Inuorteva from England proving true the contract entered into between the Soviet Agency and the Montreal firm for six million dollars worth of supplies for Russia will have to be cancelled.

IN AUSTRALIA TOO.

LONDON, July 16. Schools, Savings Banks and Law Courts have laid idle in west Australia through the strike of civil servants for increased pay. The newspapers blame the State authorities and General Ministers for having begun the game by raising their own salaries.

SHAMROCK HAD ACCIDENT ALSO.

SANDY HOOK, July 16. The Resolute and Shamrock IV, with repairs made to-night, were ready to race again to-morrow for the America's cup. The crew of the defender had renewed the broken hal-yards and gaff which caused their sloop to withdraw yesterday, giving the first contest to Sir Thomas Lip-ton, and the Irish baronet's yachting forces had replaced the weakened bowsprit with which, unbeknown to thousands who watched her, the Shamrock had slipped across the finish line. The bowsprit iron had worked in board on the Shamrock so that if the Resolute had not been forced out of the race by an accident, the Shamrock, deprived of head sails, would doubtless have been left hopelessly astern. This became known only to-day when a new bowsprit was stepped. Betting odds in Wall Street to-day on the America's cup yacht races were, on the series even money, on to-morrow's race six to five on the Resolute.

Choir Outing at Donovan's.





At the City Hall.

The regular weekly session of the Municipal Council took place on Thursday evening, July 15th. The Chairman and all the Commissioners were present.

After the preliminary business was gone through, it was decided to ask the Chief of Police if he would send some men down to put out the fire in the dump, head of Quidi Vidi Pond.

The following letter was received from the Minister of Shipping and it was decided that it be published with the statement that the Commissioners strongly advise the people of St. John's to avail of the suggestions contained in said letter:

Messrs. St. John's Municipal Council.

Dear Sirs,—I am instructed by the Minister of Shipping to bring under your notice the following facts in relation to the supply of coal to the city of St. John's.

1. For the past three years a shortage of coal in stock has occurred in the first four months of the year. It is very difficult to provide coal at such a time owing to ice and weather conditions, and freights are consequently high.
2. When cold weather sets in in November and December, those who are well to do make a raid on the stocks, and would deprive those who are poor of the coal necessary to prevent the acquisition and hoarding of coal, which, if allowed, would result in the depletion of stocks, and would deprive those, who can only buy their requirements from week to week, of the coal necessary for heating and cooking.
3. When restrictions are in force the greatest strain upon stocks is caused by the requirements of Industrial Plants, which it is incumbent upon this Department to keep in operation in the public interest.
4. It is impossible for the regular coal merchants to store sufficient stocks in December to meet all requirements during the following four months, and it is unreasonable to expect them to invest the necessary capital required with coal prices and freights so high as they are now.
5. Conditions of supply are now normal, and tonnage is at present lying idle in the harbor which could be used to import coal.
6. Under these circumstances, the Minister of Shipping sees no reason why any stringency should take place in the winter if Industrial firms and those able to take in their winter supply of coal, would now do so.

I am, therefore, to suggest to you the advisability of making provision at an early date for your winter requirements and have the coal stored on your own premises so that the sheds of the coal merchants will not be blocked up with your stocks to the exclusion of those required for the small consumer.

If this suggestion is not taken in good part and acted upon, you may find your plant short of the coal necessary to run it during the winter, as the Minister will not feel himself bound to make provision for your needs after the issue of this advisory letter.

The Health Officer and Plumbing Inspectors sent in their weekly reports.

The applications for drivers of the motor dump truck and roller were considered, and action stood over.

Decided to have fountain erected at Wood's Range.

Also to have side drains, Freshwater Road, attended to.

In the matter of Hon. P. Templeman's small erection, it was ordered he be asked to cover same with Asphalt shingles and the City Engineer to be consulted about same.

Plans of houses for Messrs. Skiffington, Franklin Avenue; H. R. Larson, off Robinson's Hill; Mr. Elliott, Quidi Vidi Road, were approved, provided water and sewerage were installed, the latter to build septic tank and pay cost of pipe.

WASTED ENERGY.



For many, many weeks to come the orators, brave souls, will knock the welkin out of plumb, and shoot it full of holes. Wherever there's a stump or keg some orator will rise, and talk until he breaks a leg, dispensing truth and lies. The men with messages will spoil the picnic in the dell, and when we'd fain go forth to toil, they'll bind us with a spell. If all their energy and prospects would be good. We need strong men to guide the plow and see the pumpkins binned, but all the husky fellows now are busy dishing wind. If every man who speaks a piece would grow some wheat instead, one profiteering graft would cease, and we'd have cheaper bread. If every man who takes the stump, our bulwarks to defend, would grab a hoe and blithely hump, another graft would end. For weeks, and weeks the ancient tunes will in our ears be dinned, and when we plead for wholesome prunes, they'll merely hand us wind. The energy that's thrown away by orators, oh, cheer! If it were put to baling hay, where would our problems be?

Burglary Doesn't Pay.

When the man in the street reads that "the thieves got away with jewels valued at \$5,000," he often thinks that crime is probably worth the risk, for one good burglary like that would satisfy a reasonable man for some time.

Now if there is one thing certain in this hard world it is this: Crime doesn't pay. It's only the big and spectacular burglaries and thefts which get reported. The average criminal is like the average man in the street. He earns little, and he runs a greater risk than if he were honest.

Here are a few figures by a well-known prison chaplain, who gained the confidence of many hundreds of prisoners.

Out of 488 burglars the average gain from their burglary was \$12 18s. 8d., and it mustn't be forgotten that for this paltry sum every single one was serving a sentence.

One man, who had the reputation of being particularly daring and expert, averaged less than thirty shillings a week from his crimes.

It mustn't be forgotten that jewels valued at £100 by the owner won't fetch more than £20 or £30 for the burglar, unless he's exceptionally lucky in disposing of his stolen goods. There is more profiteering among "fences" than among any other class.

Out of 448 pickpockets the average amount for which they had been sentenced was £4 11s. 9d., and yet most of them confessed they would gladly give up the game for a certain £1 10s. a week!

The average earnings of criminals throughout the country, despite the dazzling hauls they are supposed to make, do not average £1 a week year in and year out.

And take the case of criminals who have made big hauls.

Ned Lyons, the bank burglar who got away with over half a million in his career, died in a charity hospital in New York; Goudie, who robbed the Liverpool Bank of £170,000, died in prison; Johnnie Irving, who with some companions robbed a Northampton bank of £140,000, was shot by a fellow burglar, who died in prison.

It can be taken as a certainty that the average man can earn more by honest work, even of the humblest nature, nowadays, than he can hope to by crime.

Invidious Distinction

Much elation was caused in city sporting circles when the words "Shamrock Wins" were flashed over the wires yesterday, but there was a general feeling of expectancy all through the day that this brief announcement would be supplemented by fuller and more complete particulars. But all were disappointed, for beyond a few scrappy sentences the winning of the first race by the Lipton boat was dismissed as a matter which did not necessitate any detailed description. According to the meagre advices received—and until further particulars are forthcoming, all observations must be based on the news to hand—Shamrock IV won by a fluke, an accident to the Resolute giving the first win to the challenger. After all, such accidents to sails, running gear or rigging are part of the fortunes, or misfortunes, of the contest, and if not brought about by the rival yachts colliding or fouling each other, do not militate against the chances of the craft fortunate enough to escape damage from crossing the finish line and being declared the winner. Every true sportsman will regret—as Lipton did—the accident to the cup defender and feel sorry that the first race was not sailed boat for boat, quality against quality and seamanship and skill pitted against each other from beginning to end. The victory, though official, is but a technical gain, yet it counts in the series, but it was a pity that through some weak strand in the throat halcyons of Resolute's mainsail, the boat was obliged to withdraw, leaving Shamrock to sail the homeward course alone.

The race for America's Cup holds far more interest, even to Newfoundlanders, than any event for the moment on the international carpet, and the press service which supplies the foreign news to the daily papers of St. John's cannot be complimented upon the paucity of despatches covering the first sailing. Newfoundlanders are not one single whit concerned with the news that a million people have signed a petition asking for the commutation of the death sentence imposed on an inhuman stepmother for the doing to death of her step-daughter in some back woods settlement of Canada, nor yet in the statement that during this lady's term in prison, waiting for the day of execution she was responsible for the giving of two hostages to fortune. Neither does the fact that the English Railway Companies propose to double their travelling fares arouse in us any feeling of interest. We have passed through all these phases and are therefore hardened to increased freight and passenger rates on our steamships and railway lines. The cabled tidings that a reduction in the price of bituminous coal in New York, followed by the intelligence that six thousand Pennsylvania miners are going on strike against the contract mining system, does not move us to enthusiasm.

While the Cup Races are on, we want news of the events—all the news all the time, and though loath to say it, we are nevertheless of the opinion that had the Resolute won over the Shamrock under similar circumstances as those which gave the Irish yacht the opening victory, we should not have had to complain of the skeleton sentences announcing it. Not much. Our grievance then would have been based upon the superfluity of particulars and details, which would have given very precise data of everything in connection with the winner, from the spread of canvas, down to the color of the eyes and hair of the youngest sailor on board her. The second race is to be sailed to-day, weather permitting, over a triangular course. Should the American craft carry off this, it will be interesting to note the enlarged and amplified form of the descriptive part of the contest as cabled to the press here, and elsewhere.

Vice-Regal Entertainments.

At 10.30 to-day Admiral Everett of H.M.S. Light Cruiser Calcutta, paid an official visit to Government House. Shortly afterward His Excellency, accompanied by Capt. Saitmarsh, drove to the King's Wharf and boarded the launch from the British, paid an official visit to the "Calcutta." After a brief inspection the party returned to shore and received the vice-regal salute of 17 guns. The Calcutta will sail on Tuesday for the North, visiting ports in White Bay and on the Labrador, His Excellency the Governor and party taking the cruise on the warship. Last night an informal dinner was held at Government House, at which the guests were: Admiral Everett, Capt. Nobbs of the ship, Premier Squires and wife, Sir Joseph Outerbridge and wife, R. B. Job and wife, R. G. Rendell and daughter, J. A. Faddon and wife. Invitations for a ball to be held to-night, have been sent out.

Homeless Family.

Since Tuesday last the man Collins and his family, who had their home on Stephen's Street sold and themselves evicted, are still existing in a field on the Higher Levels. This morning it was a pitiable spectacle to see the family, father, mother and four small children, huddled together with absolutely no shelter from the rain. Appeals have been made to the Government, but assistance has not been given. The man's wife is not in the best of health and a tragedy will be the result if a shelter is not found.

Police Court.

A young man pleaded guilty of a criminal offence and was sent down for 12 months. A negro for the larceny of a trunk, containing money and goods, including a surgical outfit, total value \$1200, was sent to jail for 6 months. Two young men for obtaining money under false pretences were sent down on remand. Two boys arrested last evening for stealing money from small stores on the higher levels were before Court and pleaded guilty. One of the youths was allowed out on bonds of \$50.00. The other, more hardened, will receive 5 cuts of a birch gad. 15 Truckmen were summoned for breaches of the Street Regulations. The charges against 2 were withdrawn as they were hauling at the time "top loads". 4 pleaded not guilty and giving satisfactory explanations were allowed to go. Nine pleading guilty had to pay costs.

FRENCH MILITARY OPERATIONS.

LONDON, July 16. French forces have begun operations in Syria, moving toward Aleppo and Damascus, according to a report printed in the London Times this morning.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS.

LOS ANGELES, July 16. Three severe earthquake shocks created excitement through Los Angeles and its suburbs and caused damage, of a minor nature, to a number of buildings, and inflicted physical injuries upon several men, women and children. This morning a tremble shook the mortar from brick walls, and plaster from walls and ceilings, sending four persons to the receiving hospital with minor injuries, and frightening the majority of the population. Business in many establishments came practically to a standstill after the third shock, and thirty minutes later crowds were still gathered in the streets, either fearful of returning to work, or interested in learning the extent of the damage.

ARMENIANS FEARFUL.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 16. Eight thousand Armenian refugees, concentrated in Smyrna, have enlisted in the Greek army. Reports say that Kinzing Karabokir, commanding the Nationalists in Erzerum, has begun a movement against the Armenians which is causing great uneasiness to Armenians, who fear that the massacres and deportations of the last four years will be repeated.

WORTH BEING JAILED.

VICTORIA, B.C., July 17. Griffith R. Hughes, proprietor of the Victoria Times, was yesterday committed for trial in the higher court on a charge of stealing two hundred and sixty-eight thousand, and ninety-five dollars from David Spencer Ltd. and was later granted bail. W. B. Montech, chartered accountant, now in charge of the Spencer firm's books, testified regarding alleged defalcations, and stated Mr. Hughes had intimated his desire to make restitution. It was also stated in the evidence that Mr. Hughes had written letters saying he considered his crime had been forgotten later by reading Mrs. Eddy's books.

PERSIA AND RUSSIA.

LONDON, July 17. A dispatch to the Times from Teheran states that Persian Minister at Rome has been instructed to open direct negotiations with the Soviet Government.

JOINT BOARD.

WINNIPEG, July 17. The Joint Board of Management for the Canadian National Lines in the West and the Grand Trunk Pacific, will be appointed shortly. Hon. Mr. Reid, Minister of Railways, announced yesterday.

CANADA'S DEPUTY GOVERNOR.

Mr. Justice Ilderton has been appointed Deputy to His Excellency the Governor General.

ROUNDED UP.

VIENNA, July 17. Bela Kun, former dictator of Hungary and all-Communists, whose extradition has been demanded by Hungary, have left Vienna for Russia, via Germany, in a prisoners van.

LIGHT AIRS.

SANDY HOOK, July 17. A three knot strength wind from the Northeast was blowing at eight o'clock this morning, when crews began preparations for to-day's race.

COULDN'T HELP THEMSELVES.

BERLIN, July 17. A semi official statement, relative to German negotiations decision to deliver two million tons of coal monthly to Allies, was issued last night. "No other decision was possible after Marshal Foch had been summoned." The Kreuz Zeitung, organ of the Pan Germans, declares that "Germany has again accepted terms, which she cannot carry out." Approval of the action of Germany's representatives is voiced by the Freiheit, organ of independent Socialists. An indignant protest was voiced in the manifesto published by the League of Independent Trade Unions, representing two million workers. This organization is separate and distinct from the German Federation of Labor.

Regatta Committee Meeting.

The Regatta Committee met last night, there being a very large attendance, with President Hiscock in the chair. Sir Edgar regretted that the Blue Peter and other boats were left on the bank this year, and stated to the President if any movement was on foot to have them placed on the lake Regatta Day, he was willing to take part. Sir Edgar being an old Amateur oarsman, his medals will be presented to the winners of the Amateur race.

It was decided that when more than four crews enter for a race it shall be rowed in heats and in no case will more than four boats be allowed to contest. The heats shall be rowed at such times as the Committee may decide. The first and second boats in each heat will contest in the final, and all the contests will be held on Regatta Day if possible. To meet this contingency it was decided to have the first race start at 9.30 sharp, and that the interval be not longer than half an hour.

As the programme will have to be finally arranged next Friday night, all amateur crews, Juvenile crews and football crews are obliged to enter entries to be made at 9.30 in the T. A. Armoury. The Committee will not accept entries after Friday night next, nor will they permit substitutes to be named. Crews participating in the races mentioned are therefore asked to go themselves accordingly. All other crews will probably be asked to enter the following Tuesday night.

Messrs. Martin and Andrews reported on the matter of certain amateurs. His report was adopted.

Collectors were asked to get busy, not half enough of funds is yet in the treasurer's hands.

Messrs. P. F. Moore and N. J. Vinnambe will begin collections along Backworth Street to-day and Messrs. Robin and Hunt along Gower and intersecting streets.

Before the meeting closed it was decided to cut out silk programmes and also cut from the Committee a number of "slackers" who have attended a meeting since some one other placed their names there. These gentlemen have till Friday night to make good.

An adjournment was taken at 10.15 and Friday night next at 8.30.

Shamrock IV. the Biggest Yacht.

LIPTON'S BOAT IS FAST AND WEATHERLY.

In many ways the Shamrock IV. carries with her the impression that she is fast and weatherly. That conclusion, she may not be speedy enough to beat her opponent on corrected time for the challenger must allow considerable time over the 30-mile course to the Resolute. She's a big boat, this Shamrock, and C. E. Nicholson, who designed her, frankly admits he built the biggest boat possible under the rules governing the International series, doing so because he believed his chance of success thus would be better and, on his own admission, not daring to do otherwise because he had no precedent.

On the other hand, Capt. N. G. Herreshoff, creator of the Resolute, favored a small boat as the most satisfactory proposition. Both are under 75 feet waterline, the Resolute being of a wholesome type with considerable deadrise and, duty performed as defender, might be converted readily into a comfortable cruising vessel. She carries something like 8300 square feet of sail, while the Shamrock IV. is clothed with an expanse of spinnaker estimated to be fully 3000 square feet greater.

Designer Nicholson planned a boat that would be very fast so long as she could carry her sail in a moderate sea, depending on summer conditions ordinarily prevailing off Sandy Hook to aid Sir Thomas in attaining his long-cherished dream of lifting the coveted cup and taking it across sea to the Royal Belfast Yacht Club, which challenged in his behalf.

Experts who were present when the Resolute and Shamrock IV. were measured last week in a Brooklyn dry dock pointed out that the Resolute would be dangerous in a rough chance and could give a good performance under weather conditions that might inferfer seriously with the Shamrock IV.—another her to deriment of speed. Designer Nicholson may have staked his reputation on chance of a breeze of just the right weight for the challenger to do her best. If facts in the case were known, it might be stridled atmospheric conditions off Sandy Hook through a series of years to ascertain the average strength of wind during the cup race period and the lines of the yacht were drawn to make the most of conditions that might be expected.

Refused to Take Bath.

ITALIAN CREW DONT LIKE SOAP AND WATER.

Members of the crew of the White Star steamship Cretic refused to allow officials of the United States public health service to give them a bath at Gallupe Island, and the vessel will be kept at quarantine until they are persuaded by the steamship officials that it is necessary. The health officials have no authority over the crew. The Cretic came into port from Naples without a clean bill of health and before it will be permitted to come up from quarantine every one aboard must have a disinfecting bath and the vessel must be fumigated.

There are 250 members of the crew. Most of them went aboard the steamer Nantasket which was chartered to take them to Gallupe Island, but when a few refused to take a bath at Uncle Sam's official bathhouse, the others jumped back on the Cretic and could not be induced to go ashore. The White Star line has sought aid from the Italian consul so that the vessel may dock and discharge its cargo.

And Reminiscences of a Pleasant Tour.

CHAPTER XXX.
AT PLYMOUTH ROCK.

The history of the Pilgrim Fathers is so well known that there is not anything new to be said about them from a general standpoint; but as it is our privilege to visit the scene of their landing, we will write a few lines in reference to what we really saw. The town of Plymouth itself is one of the many of the colonial settlements in New England, and it still bears the impress of colonial life, and is more an English town than an American city. The commercial character of the town is noted for its great rope industry; but in the realm of romance and religious sentiment, it is renowned for its associations with the Pilgrim Fathers (three hundred years ago). These associations have always lent to Plymouth, and whenever the name of the Pilgrim Fathers is mentioned, the harbour of Plymouth, and Plymouth Rock are usually the first of debate.

We have always been taught that the Pilgrim Fathers were a band of God-fearing people, who, for the sake of their principles, sacrificed their all in the home-land, and came to New England, and colonized Cape Cod, and founded the town of Plymouth. This was our faith, and this we believed. Our faith received a rude shock when talking to a man during our visit to the place. The man was standing near the Rock, and we thought that he held a common interest in the associations, entered into conversation with him. But we found ourselves at sea. The man did not believe in the story of the Pilgrim Fathers as we had been taught it. He had sympathy whatever with the history of the "Mayflower," and said that what was written as history about her arrival and landing in Plymouth Harbour, was like a good deal of other history—unauthentic and incorrect. (This did not belong to the place.)

For such a set back as this we were fully prepared; but about the time of our visit to Plymouth, we happened to pick up a copy of Munsey's Magazine among the contributions we saw very lengthy, and quite an exhaustive article on the Pilgrim Fathers. Our further surprise the author of the article dealt hard blows at the history of the Pilgrim Fathers, and very

Dublin Denounces American Law.

"The Minister of Foreign Affairs for the Irish Republic" does not seem to have made much progress in securing the release of Jim Larkin, now imprisoned in the United States, following his conviction on a charge of inciting anarchy. We do not know just who the Minister in question is, but unless he hurries up and does something he is likely to lose his job. In the meantime the high judicial authorities of the United States should tremble because the Dublin (Ireland) Corporation has ordered this great though anonymous statesman to get on their trail.

Jim Larkin, as most readers are aware, was formerly a strike agitator in Dublin, but for reasons best known to himself transferred his residence to New York. Not content with twisting the lion's tail, he commenced to try and pull the tail feathers out of the eagle, whereat the eagle picked him up in its talons and dropped him into the penitentiary under an indeterminate sentence of not less than five years. The occurrence seems to have been a shock to the Dublin Corporation, which apparently assumed that in the United States aliens were above the law, and tried to advocate the overthrow of existing institutions to their heart's content. It therefore framed a resolution expressing grave doubts as to the impartiality of Larkin's trial, and instructing the President of the Irish Republic, Citizen Eamonn de Valera, to exercise his influence with the American authorities and his authority with the Irish race in America to secure Larkin's release. It will be interesting news to many Americans to learn that Citizen de Valera exercises an extra-territorial authority on the soil of the United States.

The possibility that some Americans might even be rather annoyed by the suggestion seems to have occurred to certain members of the Dublin Corporation; for it subsequently amended the resolution by eliminating the instructions against the impartiality of Larkin's trial and expressing "dismay and regret" at a prison sentence being imposed on "a fellow Irishman of such considerable influence." Further, the town clerk was instructed to apply to the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Irish Republic to obtain from our American Ambassador a full report on the whole question. When that report is forthcoming, the American authorities had best look out for squalls, for it is quite evident that they have taxed the patience of the Dublin Corporation. The latter organization is likely to demand a Foreign Minister who can really wield the big stick over the American republic.—Saturday Night.

A Determined Chinaman

Within the confines of Melrose, a mere gathering of buildings in the suburbs of the City of Oakland, Alameda County, California, there existed, previous to July the 19th, 1898, a factory known to the people of the Western States as the Western Fuse Works. From this factory fuse was shipped to all parts of the world, and on account of the recent gold excitement in Alaska, its machinery had hardly ceased its hum for a period of four months. On July 18th, however, a deadly silence reigned. Gong Ung Chung, the Chinese foreman of the works, quarrelled with a fellow countryman, Hun Hi Sing, over a ten-cent lottery ticket, saying that a prize had been won, but that Sing had kept the money. Sing was an honest man, but his denial was not heeded. Chung first assaulted him with a hatchet, and then shot him dead. Chung then barricaded himself in the powder magazine, where there were stored 5,000 rounds of powder, threatening to explode the lot if anyone attempted to enter. The Sheriff and his posse were sent for, and a Chinese interpreter told Chung that if he would surrender, he should have the services of the best attorney in the State of California, while the superintendent of the works (where Chung had worked for fifteen years) said he would do all in his power to save him from the gallows. Chung asked him, as a friend to leave the premises, for he would not surrender. He sat there without food or drink throughout the long day. Twilight gave place to darkness, and darkness to the light of dawn, when one of the Sheriff's men, thinking that Chung was asleep, proposed an attack upon his stronghold. One of the officers, rifle in hand, advanced cautiously towards the door, followed by a dozen more. But as he entered, the murderer sprang forward and was heard to shout in a fiendish manner, "You come, me shoot!" What followed will never be known, but it was evident that Chung had fired the dynamite. The first seven men were blown to bits, five others were maimed for life. Thus, the lives of nine men, including Chung and Hi Sing, were lost for the sake of a ten-cent ticket in a game of chance. In addition, he maimed five other persons, destroyed an entire factory worth thousands of dollars, completely wrecked over thirty homes, and shattered hundreds of panes of glass within a radius of five miles around his deadly abode.

The Law of Diminishing Returns.

When you come up against a law of nature you might just as well surrender. You cannot parley with Gravitation nor circumvent Chemical Affinity. And there is one Natural Law that gives us a deal of comfort, because it assures us that figures do lie, trends and tendencies do not keep on until everything is smashed, and, no matter how badly things are progressing, after a while they ball up, stop, fall and lose their power.

This law is known as the Law of Diminishing Returns. For instance, Cholera breaks out; there are 30 cases one day, 60 the next, 90 the next. Statisticians, scientists and pessimists point out that in a certain number of days the whole population will be wiped out. This never happens, however. For some reason the pest ceases, weakens, passes.

A merchant conducts his business so that it increases so much every year; but after a while that increase always stops. If it did not, he would by and by own the whole earth. German efficiency and power rapidly grew—to a certain point. Then it crashed.

No matter what is going on, cheer up, there will come a time when it will cease going on. No law is unlimited. If Gravitation were unchecked, the universe would speedily coagulate into one lump. Other laws, fortunately, constantly contravene and balance it; hence we have the swinging stars, and life and motion on earth.

Just now the force that is threatening civilization is the new found power of organized labor. What is to prevent it, we asked alarmed, from going ahead until representative government is overthrown, capital destroyed, and brain everywhere enslaved to brawn? What is to prevent the absolute carism of the organized workers? Answer: The Law of Diminishing Returns.

After a while labor autocracy will get so top-heavy it will fall. Already it shows signs. The printing unions of New York bitterly quarreled among themselves. There has been rebellion against the leaders of some of the railway brotherhoods.

There are in every movement a vigorous incipency, a point of maturity, then decay. Rome reached a certain point and crumbled. The medieval church broke and scattered at its period of greatest temporal power. The slave oligarchy in the United States went just so far. The magnificence of the Bourbons in France vanished in Revolution. The Kaiser went up and up, like a rocket, to a certain height; there was a shower of stars, and he came down like a stick.

Sooner or later the arbitrary, high-woman, autocratic rule of this country by organizations of combines or of labor will break and fall. The thing that will break it will be the Law of Diminishing Returns.—Current Opinion.

An Evil Precedent.

The most crafty and unscrupulous game ever crowned with complete success ended on July 17, 1870, when the Imperial Government of France was led on by Bismarck's manipulation of events to declare war against Prussia. The story of the alteration of the Enns telegrams is too familiar for repetition. Probably it was the masterpiece of Bismarck's diplomatic career, and he himself seems to have been of that opinion, since in his later years he was not unwilling to boast of the

Though Napoleon III. long had been credited in popular estimation, particularly in England, with Machiavellian craft, in reality he was outclassed hopelessly in this line by his Prussian antagonist, who forced him into a struggle for which he was wholly unprepared, and in a way calculated to cause him to forfeit the sympathies of Europe. "Our good old German god," unctuously exclaimed Moltke, when the alteration was effected in the telegram, "is not willing to let us perish in distraze." But, in truth, the success attendant upon the incredible plot has proved in the end disastrous to Germany. The weapons wielded with such dexterity by Bismarck have proved to be double-edged in hands less able; while the methods of Berlin, ever since have been viewed with distrust and scrutinized with anxious care. Although in 1914 the Bismarckian precedents were followed with fidelity as far as circumstances permitted, they were far, indeed, from achieving equal success. In 1870, it is safe to say that Germany had the sympathies of the great majority of the neutral world; while Bismarck's successors in 1914 contrived hopelessly to compromise her at the outset.

Teachers' Convention.

As the special lectures, etc., arranged for Convention Week had been previously delivered, all of yesterday's sessions were devoted entirely to the business of the N.T.A. In the morning session the schedule of standardized salaries which was drawn up by the committee on Tuesday night, was discussed section by section, and after some amendments had been made to the latter parts of the scale, it was decided that a deputation from the N.T.A. executive endeavour to get in touch with the Minister of Education for the purpose of placing the salaries of teachers on a remodelled basis at the next session of the Legislature, and it was further moved and carried that if it be impossible, through financial obligations to standardize salaries on a decent basis, that a thirty per cent. increase on the whole Educational Grant be requested. At the evening session the growth and extension of the N.T.A. formed the chief topic of discussion, and it was shown that the teachers of Newfoundland have not rallied as they should to the advancement of their own interests. However, Mr. Butt, the present salaried secretary, has been encouraged by the increase in membership during the past year, and feels optimistic about the immediate future. It is indeed to the teachers' interests to enroll themselves as speedily as possible under their own banner. The records of educational doings in our midst prove conclusively the importance of the N.T.A., and all teachers should back it. In this connection it was unanimously passed by the teachers present that any teacher not a member of the N.T.A. was retarding its growth and his own advantage. The most important work of the evening was the appointment of a new Executive and the following were chosen: Messrs. R. R. Wood, I. J. Samson, Jas. Norman, A. G. Godland, W. E. Bradbury; Miss Stirling; R. Dwyer, W. J. Gullfoyle, P. J. Griffin; Rev. Bros. J. E. Ryan, J. B. Ryan, P. V. Strapp; Whiteway, Harrington, W. E. King, Serrick, the Principal of Carbonear Grammar School; Miss Bradbury; the Principals of the Presbyterian and S. A. Colleges, and Mr. W. M. Butt, Secretary. After the passing of votes of thanks to the Reid Nfld. Co., the F. Ellis Co., the Government, the different lecturers, the press, convention reporters and others who helped to make the convention the success it was, the proceedings closed with the singing of the National Anthem. The results of the convention are not as yet fully revealed. From the material standpoint only we have the 40% increase on augmentation retroactive to the 1st of January, 1920; and an assurance that at the next session of the Legislature, salaries will, if possible, be standardized. Judged from other standpoints, the convention has done much through the daily discussions to bring about better understanding and renewed zeal to all present. May we not live in the hope that at our next convention the teaching profession may have experienced revolutionary changes in Newfoundland and be in that position where

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

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
