## "Neptune's Mails."

isherics has recently liberated from tations in the North Sea, a number "drift bottles" containing a request to the finder to post back an enclosed card recording on it the date and place as which the bottle was picked up. From the date thus obtained, valuable information concerning ocean drifts may be gathered. Bottle messengers have served for

seamen as a simple method of communication with the outer world ever since ships sailed below the horizon. Another of "Neptune's Mails" covered 6000 miles in four years, and a third, sent off near Sierra Leone, under the influence of the current setting eastward on the African coast, reached the Shetland Isles, after a drift of 8000 miles, in just over 1000 days.

Tarnished Silver.

Silver that is badly tarnished should, before it is cleaned, be washed in soapy water to which one or two teaspoonfuls of methylated spirits have been added. Remove all stains, such as egg stains, first by as the smooth, soft surface does not scratch the silver. As each article is washed place it in a jug of boiling water, then dry with a clean cloth.

Wash in a Jug. Fish or dessert knives and forks with ivory, mother-o'-pearl, or bone handles must not be immersed in water, but should be placed in a jug containing sufficient hot scapy water to reach nearly to the handles.


Mix some precipitated whiting with a sufficient quantity of ammonia or methylated spirits to form a paste, rub the paste on the articles to cleaned with a soft cloth, leave it to dry, then rub off with another cloth and polish with a chamois leather. Brush the polish out of chaste or engraved stiver with a soft brush. If, however, table silver he wash-

ory of Lourdes was practically the istory of the rather grim old castle which stands on a peak overlooking he city. Centuries ago the imperial eagle of the Roman Empire floated its battlements. The Visigoths drove the Romans out, and held it The Mohammedans drove the barbarans out, and held it. Charlemagne esieged the Moors behind its walls. Napoleon sent political prisoners to rot in its dungeons. For centuries en fought and slew under its shadow. Peace came. Lourdes slumbered and as almost forgotten. It was awakned ,and its name blazed forth once nore when little Bernadette Soubirous valked out of her parents' home on Pebruary 11th, 1858, with the intention of gathering firewood. On that day the story of Lourdes Castle gave place to the story of an ignorant little peasant girl.

Bernadette Soubirous, claimed to have seen, as she stood on the left bank of the Gave de Pau, which tumbes past the rock of Massabeille, a vision of a lady standing in a small Frotto, less than twenty feet from the ground. One need not enter here into every detail of the stories of visions of the lady which followed the first one but it is necessary to out mostly within a few days of each other. Bernadette returned to the river bank and saw the vision. It was on the sixteenth appearance that the lady, in reply to the repeated questioning of the child, made the ancouncement, "I am the Immaculate

nadette was followed by many townspeople. Her story had at first been received with scenticism, ever her parents disbelieved it, but all observers admitted that while in front of the Grotto the girl was wrapped in

February 25th came and found Bernadette once more at the Grotto. Thoset who watched her stood some distance away. They neither saw the apparition nor heard voices, but Bernadette stated that she was told by the lady to "wash herself in the spring." There was no spring near at hand, only the flowing Gave. The girl walked toward the river, but returned and, bending down, scraped away some earth. Water began to flow out of the ground. Bernadette had found a

By the afternoon the tiny leakage of water had tickled half-way down towards the Gave. By the next morning practically the entire population of Lourdes came to see the wonder. A steady stream was flowing clear and bright. This was the first miracle of the Grotto.

In a way there was perhaps nothing "miragulous" in the incident of a child finding a spring, for the Pyrenees are rich in springs. There are many grottos, too, in the district. The wonder was the method of her finding it, and in her finding it at the Rock of





of a further grant. UNSUITABLE FOR HOUSEMAIDS. "How difficult it would be to take unemployed women without training into an ordinary house and expect them to grasp in a moment its work and its routine can perhaps be realized from a few particulars regarding London's unemployed women," says a correspondent of the Times. "Many of them have never lived in a house; one room has been the circuit of their lives eating, drinking, resting and sleeping; they know nothing of the amenities of family life, of the laying of table-cloths, the meal of several courses, or of the preparation of other than coarse foods. Their ideas of bedmaking are often most primitive, and the care of many possessions is unknown to them. The trades in which they have been employed are often rough. In the East End there are at present 800 unemployed women ropemakers, as many rope firms are only working one week in three. There are 300 women makers of upholstery buttons who have been out of work for two years; many of them are widows with children dependent on them; and some have been in the trade for thirty years. They have exhausted their unemployment benefit and are existing as best they can on Poor Law Relief. In Deptford and Shadwell there are many tin-box makers out of work. In the North and Northwest districts of London thousands of women who were employed in the engineering trades during the war have been unable to get work for months past. Recently women have been turned away from the canteens for post-office employees, and women who have worked in these canteens for eight years or more are being dismissed in order to cut down expenses. Things are as bad, or even worse, in the country, and the case of out-of-workers or home-workers who do not come under the Unemployment Insurance Act and who have had long periods of unemployment is particularly hard. Many young women chain-makers at Cradley Heath and lacemakers at Nottingham and women formerly employed in putting hooks and eyes on cards in the Birmingham district who have been out of work for more than a year have had a desperate struggle to live.
