The Quebec Upper Chamber. The "lords" of the Upper Chamber, who sit in solemn conclave in Quebec, have thrown out the bill for abolishing dual representation in that Province. The Provincial Government would gladly have opposed the meas, ure, but they found that the popular feeling against the maintenance of such representation was too strong in the Legislative Assembly and they prudently left it an open question. The measure was carried in the Assembly, but when sent up to the Legislative Council, that body twenty-four all told--took on themselves the responsibility of throwing out a measure which the popular branch of the Legislaturerepresenting the views and feelings representing the views and teerings of the people—had pronounced to be right and just. It strikes us that these old fogies, in thus thwarting and obstructing judicious legislation, which the people demand, are bring-ing on themselves such notoriety and ing on themselves such notoriety and condemnation as may eventually lead to the abolishing of the Upper Chamber altogether. It is at the best but a useless appendage to the governmental machinery, but so long as it did not pursue a policy of obstruction and thereby court criticism its members were allowed to remain unnoticed, to pursue the even tenor of their dignified life. But when they thurst their effete conservatism before the public gaze, they must expect to have their old foggyism assailed, and will have to thank themselves if they are the cause of starting a move-

to have their old foggyism assailed, and will have to thank themselves if they are the cause of starting a movement which may end in their Chamber being wiped out of existence altogether.

We notice that the Leader has in to day's issue one of the stupidest of its many stupid articles, in which among other ridculous assertions it maintains that had there been an Upper Chamber in Ontario, the Sandfield Macdonald Government would not have been defeated. It also gives currency to an equally ridiculous story, viz: that Mr. Mowat contemplates establishing such a chamber in this Province, and that this is the real secret of the delay in calling the Legislature together. It furthermore states that the Globe is now beginning to see that a great mistake was made in not providing for an Upper Chamber for Ontario. This is a purely imaginary assumption, for in an article in the Globe of the same day, in adverting to the foolish course of the Quebec "lords," and to the question whether such a Chamber is necessary, it gives no uncertain sound.
