Yesterday Leave no Doubt as to This Fact—What His Townspeople Lave to Say About the Sad Affair—The cause of The exclusive statement published in

World yesterday that George S. Herchme ex-manager of the Central Bank at Brampto was the unknown man found dead last Thursday morning at Andalusia, Pa., is fully borne out by the investigations of our reporters

The Waltham watch found on the deceased was sold to Mr. Herehmer in October, 1873, by P. L. Woods, a jeweler on Main-street, Brampton. An invoice was shown The World by Mr. Woods, which disclosed the fact that watch was bought from R. Wilkes, Toonto, Aug. 28, 1873, and a reference to the

books showed that its purchase was made by
Herchmer in the following October.

"Here is the entry," said Mr. Woods: Waltham watch, William Ellery, 659,559. When I saw Monday's World I recognized the description, and upon looking over my books all doubts were removed. I know the watch well, and it is one I sold Mr.

The ring found in Mr. Herchmer's posses ion is what is known as a plain wedding ring, which he purchased two years ago from W. A. Mitchell, also a Main-street jeweler. firm in this country has business stamp as mine, which same business stamp as mine, which I invariably engrave upon every article I manufacture," said Mr. Mitchell to the reporter." "The stamp comprises my initials, "W. A. M.: 'the lotter 'B' for Brampton, and 18k. The Philadelphia papers do not mention the letter 'B,' which I account for on the supposition that it was not legible, from long use. I am positive the ring is the one Mr. Herchmer purchased from me."

Still Another Proof. Another article of jewelry worn by Mr. Herchmer was a topaz pin, and both of the jewelers mentioned, as did also a score of acquaintances, that they had frequently seen it in Mr. Herchmer's shirt front. The Waltham watch had been promised by Mr. Mitcheller. watch had been repaired by Mr. Mitchell at different times, and the reporter was shown an entry in his order book indicating that on April 5, 1886, it had been left for repair.

The statement that the joint or hinge of the watch found on the dead stranger was broken, was also investigated. A few days prior to his departure from Praymen Mr. Herchwer

was also investigated. A few days prior to his departure from Brampton, Mr. Herchmer called upon a jeweler to have it repaired, but upon learning that it could not be done at once he said he would call again and leave it.

If anything was now lacking in establishing the identity of the dead man it was furnished by Mr. Robinson, of Robinson & Stark, who in answer to an inquiry as to the sale by his firm of the braces found on deceased, said: "Two weeks ago Mr. Herchmer bought a pair of braces from us, and from the description published of those foundupon the man, I have not the least doubt, he is Mr. Herchmer. The pattern I remember well, and the letters and figures 'R.D.—75,' found upon the white cloth, are our private mark."

Facts About Herchmer's Sudden Death.
PHILADELPHIA. April 5.—Crowds, still continue to throng the morgue at Bristol to view the remains of the dead stranger. There is little doubt now but that his identity has been

the remains of the dead stranger. Here is little doubt now but that his identity has been established by telegrams and letters sent on here from Canada. The information telegraphed from The World office in Toronto easily led up to a conclusive clue. Word has also been received that the dead man's brother-in-law, Mr. C. F. Gildersleeve of Kingston, is now on his way to Philadelphia.

The post mortem examination shows that florchmer did not meet with foul play, but died from fatty degeneration of the heart.

There is no doubt now about how the man got to Andalusia; that part of the mystery has been cleared away. He was suddenly taken sick on the "owl" train from New York, which stopped near Andalusia at 2.55 last Thursday morning on account of a freight wrock at Borie's station. He got off the train evidently to get the fresh air, and fell down beside the track. The train proceeded on its way, and Herclmer expired as described by the section man, who found him gasping in the throes of death. Nearly every one who has called at the morgue came out of sheer curiosity. Many hundreds of well-dressed women were among the number.

A BIG FIRE AT WINDSOR.

Detroit, April 5.—This morning the stable attached to the Beeman House at Windsor, Ont., caught fire, and being old and as dry as I tinder, resisted all the efforts of the firemen to extinguish the flames. The hotel proper caught fire, and although the Windsor firemen worked hard they could not control the flames. The Detroit department was telephoned and two stanners and hose carriages were immediately sent over on the ferry Victoria. The Beeman House and the frame stores to the south of it were quickly destroyed. By this time the Detroit refler party had arrived, and finding that they could not make connection with the hydrants, they ran the suction directly into the river and had the fire out in a few minutes. The Government insists that the debate on the Irish Criminal Law Amendment Bill shall proceed but will postpone the division on the bill till April 19. The Conservative whips retain enough members to keep their majority secure in order to

The Second Reading Meved.

London, April 5.—The second reading of the Irish Crimes' Act Amendment Bill was formally moved this afternoon by Mr. Balfour. Mr. Samuelson, Gladstonian member for Banbury, moved an amendment that the bill would, if passed, increase disorder in Ireland and endanger the Union and Empire, and therefore should be rejected.

Henry Chaplin (Con.) defended the bill. The land laws which the Radicals now condemned, he said, were passed while Mr. Gladstone was at the head of the Government. Mr. Chaplin asked Mr. Gladstone, not as a Liberal, not as a politician merely, but as an honest man, to disown before Iroland and the whole world the reign of sheer plunder now preached in Iroland. If there was any robbery in connection with the present land system of the country the author of it was Mr. Gladstone. It was he who fixed the ronts in Ireland, under a solomn guarantee that they should remain unaltered.






