PROGRESS OF WORK AT THE SAW BILL MINE.

From all accounts Sophia Mountain will this year do a good deal to help swell the output of Roseland camp. Two mines in that vicinity have large amounts of shipping ore in sight—the Velvet and Victory-Triumph.

Work on the Saw Bill. Since the taking over of the Saw Bill by a new syndicate, under a working bond some weeks ago, little has been heard of the property.

At the Saw Bill a force of 12 miners under the direction of Captain Williams is now engaged in drifting and stopping, taking out really nice looking ore. When the present campaign is completed it is intended to sink the shaft as rapidly as possible to a depth of 450 feet, the shaft at that time being about 200 feet in depth.

That Strike at the Roseland. The Superior Gold & Copper Company received a letter Thursday from their former agent at Roseland, which contains the claims owned by the company. The letter states that after the surface capping of oxidized quartz had been blown off, most of the free gold began to show everywhere.

Smuggler Smelter Returns. Currie & Kiteley yesterday received copies of the smelter returns from one recently shipped from the Smuggler in Camp Fairview. The sacks of ore, weighing 96 pounds and 98 pounds respectively, were sent to the Tacoma smelter, and returned \$12.25 and \$20.47 in gold and silver.

Buyers would not pay more than 85c for both white and colored. Warrington got 85c and 80c for white and colored respectively.



CHICAGO WHEAT CLOSE FIRM After Weakening Early on Bear News.

Such as Big Decline at Liverpool and at Northwest Points—Primary Receipts Also Heavy—Later Good Cash Demand From the Continent and Record Takings for Export Rallied the Market—Notes and Gossip.

Friday Evening, Oct. 14. Liverpool wheat reported stocks of red winter wheat advanced an advance of 14 in No. 1 Cal, and a decline of 14 in No. 1 Northern. The December and March options closed 15d to 15d per bush, respectively, lower than yesterday.

London was strong and Paris wheat closed 5 to 10 centimes higher for the day, with flour 10 to 30 centimes higher.

Chicago wheat receipts today, with flour 10 to 30 centimes higher. The cash article at Minneapolis and Duluth, together with liberal primary and Northwest receipts, caused an easy feeling on the Chicago board.

Primary wheat receipts today, 1,400,000 bushels against 1,220,000 bushels same day a year ago; corn receipts, 613,000 bushels against 533,000 bushels.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth today, 1,244 bushels, against 107 bushels the same day of 1897.
