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THE RAIN AT OSGOODE HALL

Two Cases Begun in the Court of Appeal on Which Arguments Are Now Being Heard.

JUDGMENTS BY THE CHANCELLOR.

Mistake of Drug Clerk Costs \$100—Widow of G.T.R. Fireman Gets \$1500, Another \$2100.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday afternoon, the Court of Appeal commenced the hearing of the appeal of C. S. Hochstetler of Detroit and others against a judgment awarding Arthur Wilson \$1000 in his suit to recover money paid for stock in the Highway Advertising Company, which he claimed was obtained from him by misrepresentation.

The cases set down for argument to-day are: Wilson v. Hochstetler (continued); Marshall v. London Street Railway; Edwards v. London Street Railway.

In the Divisional Court. The Divisional Court heard argument in the appeal of Mrs. Elizabeth Carman against the judgment dismissing her action to recover damages for a fire in a factory owned by the company's stock in April 28 last. The argument goes on to-morrow.

The preliminary list for to-day is: Brewer v. Conger; Merritt v. Nason; Clarke v. Hubbert; Congdon v. Hamilton; Pennington v. Housinger; Jones v. Stephenson.

Before the Chancellor. Chancellor Boyd handed out judgments in three actions tried recently at Osgoode Hall. Mrs. Annie E. Nutbrown recovered \$100 damages and costs from Robert Templeton and Robert S. Muir, doing business in Belleville as druggists, under the firm name of Templeton & Co., on a claim for a clerk's mistake in filling a prescription.

Emma Viola Martin, widow of Jesse Martin, a fireman who was killed at the Grand Trunk, \$2000 of which will go into court. The widow and three children of another fireman, named John Macdonald, who was killed in a collision, were awarded \$2000 by the Grand Trunk Railway Company.

By a fourth judgment given by Chancellor Boyd, the widow of Norman Macdonald of St. Thomas is declared entitled to \$20,000 on his life. The creditors sought, and have obtained.

Chancellor Boyd also decided that nephews and nieces of the late Mary Manly of Milton district were not entitled to share as residuary legatees of Thomas Peterson, for whom she was a servant for 40 years.

The court however, directed that the next of kin bring an action against the executor of the estate, and a claim for wages there may be. This action may be brought, will be first determined by the court.

For permanent injuries received in an accident at Toronto Junction last June, Hugh McCracken of Oshawa has received \$1000 from the C.P.R. for \$3000 damages.

NON-JURY ASSIZE COURT.

Alfred D. Tingler Loses His Suit Against the Dominion Building and Loan Association.

At the non-jury Assize Court yesterday, Mr. Justice Street heard the suit of Alfred D. Tingler against the Dominion Building and Loan Association. In June, 1901, the plaintiff borrowed \$600 from the company, and gave as security therefor a mortgage on his home.

The interest he was compelled to pay was believed to be too heavy, amounting to about 10 per cent., and the action was brought to recover \$215 paid under the mortgage. The judge found in favor of the defendants, after telling the lawyers to run over the account together and agree the plaintiff further expense.

Held by the Covenant. Judgment was given for the plaintiff in the action of Edward B. Franzer against Edward S. Stavely, for \$115. The principal and interest due under covenants in a deed dated April 9, 1900, was claimed. The defendant claimed that in consideration of his releasing his mortgage, Stavely had agreed to pay the balance of the mortgage.

Military Funeral To-Morrow. The funeral of the late Col. Serg. E. J. B. Stavely, for 21 years, 102 Berke, of the regiment who can make it. Members of the regiment are requested to go, those attending will pass at the Armory at 8 p.m. in review order, with beret and sword. A full computer will form the firing party.

Investigation of the Industrial. Aid. Denison moved the resolution of which he had given notice, that a special committee be appointed to investigate the Industrial Association, its past management, as well as its present position. He stated that the investigation go back only to the time when the Industrial Association was formed, and that there should be no time limit.

Ald. Uryahart suggested that the committee be composed of a representative of the Manufacturers' Association, that had already been appointed, and that there would be no opposition from any member of the Industrial Association.

Ald. Denison said it would be better to have a committee of five, and that the Manufacturers' Association would be nothing in the way of a joint report.

The motion was then carried unanimously.

The Jarvis-Street Sewer. Aid. Burns moved that the Committee on Works be requested to extend the Jarvis-street sewer into deep water, in order to every day, and to the mouth of that sewer.

Ald. Mitchell said the Jarvis-street sewer was only a detail of the sewage problem, and that the City Engineer should once bring in his estimate of the cost necessary to treat the whole question.

Ald. Denison said that the Jarvis-street sewer into deep water would be a good deal of good for the outlet.

Ald. Burns: The others have been carried out.

Ald. Denison: Not all of them.

Ald. Burns: I cannot describe the nuisance that exists at this particular spot, and it is to call the Engineer's attention to the floating mass of silt that should not be allowed an hour in the city, that I move this.

The motion was carried, Ald. Denison voting against.

Reception to the S. A. Soldiers. Aid. Graham moved that, in view of the expected early return of a large number from the contingents in South Africa, that a reception and reception committee be authorized to make the necessary arrangements for a suitable reception.

Ald. Burns seconded the resolution. Aid. Denison hoped the resolution did not mean that the action of the city was to be upon the reception plan.

The resolution was adopted to include the men returned at all times, and passed unanimously in its amended form.

Wallace Nesbitt's Retainer. Aid. Foster opposed the item in the Board of Control's report, relative to the retention of Wallace Nesbitt, C.E., to act as City Engineer, in the place of the late Mr. Nesbitt.

Ald. Denison: The Board had recommended the appointment. It had made the appointment, and Mr. Nesbitt's opinion was that the retention was now attempted to exercise. The thing was done at a secret session of the Board.

Ald. Uryahart: A secret session? The Mayor: Had it not been a secret session, it would not have been a secret session.

Ald. Sheppard: I object to the Mayor's statement about the retention of Wallace Nesbitt. The Mayor: The board, acting upon the recommendation of the Board, recommended the appointment. It is right in the eye.

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TOO TICKLISH TO HANDLE

The City Council Ran Away From the "Consent Judgment" Which Breaks the Agreement Between St. Railway and City.

Should Nesbitt Be Retained—Municipal Telephone Would Be Cheap for Toronto.

A surprise in Council yesterday awaited the opponents of the agreement to a consent judgment made last week by the Board of Control with the Street Railway Company. It was so cleverly arranged and executed that it carried Ald. Spence on his feet and left him wondering where he was when the waters were gone.

The report embodying the text of the proposed consent judgment had been printed in full in the City Record, and was ready for Council.

The Board of Control had set upon it three days in succession, being convinced that as a matter of pressing moment it demanded their indefatigable attention.
