# DISASTER TO EXCURSION STEAMER 600 Senate Reading Room ND CHILDREN KILLED IN JAPANESE VICTORY

Vessel Takes Fire and Panic Seizes Passengers, Who Throw Themselves Overboard.

FIVE HUNDRED BODIES FOUND

New York, June 15 .- One of the most alling disasters in the history of New York, tragic in its immensity, dramatic in its episodes, and deeply thetic in the tender age of most of its victims, occurred to-day in the East River, at the entrance to Long Island Sound, within a short distance of the New York shore, and within sight of ands of persons, the majority of

of the General Slocum, a three-decked excursion steamer, the largest in these waters, more than 600 persons, the majority of whom were women and children, were burned to death or drowned by jumping overboard or by being by the lurching of the vessel. Approximately 500 bodies have been recovered, and now are being tagged at the morgues of Bellevue Hospital and Harlem. Divers still are busy taking bodies from the hold of the vessel, which, they say, is choked with bodies, and hundreds who leaped or were thrown into the river have not been recovered. The fire is said to have broken out in a lunchroom on the forward deck, thru the overturning of a pot of grease. The wind was high and all efforts to subdue the fire were futile.

Canada Should Retain Increased Business She Now Gets.

Port Arthur, June 15 .- (Special.) -The tie up of the American vessels which was caused by the strike of the masters and pilots, has proved of great benefit to the Canadian shipping industry. The ports which have been mostly affected have been Port Arthur and Fort William. At both these places there has been a large increase in the amount of freight handled.

Agent Phalen of the Canadian Northern Company in antimerylaw. Agent Phalen of the Canadian Northern Company in ani interview with The World correspondent stated that his company was now handling at least 30 per cent. more freight than they did for the same months last year. This increase he attributes to the tie up of the American vessels. The Montreal and Lake Superior Navigation Co's liners are the steam. The Montreal and Lake Superior Navigation Co.'s liners are the steamers which catch the new business. They make stops at Buffalo and Cleveland, and since the opening of navigation each boat has received large portions of their cargoes at these American ports, the freight being destined to the Canadian Northwest. This freight formerly was shipped via Duluth by American steamers.

"This trade will not be affected by the break up of the strike," said a well-

"This trade will not be affected by the break up of the strike," said a well-known marine man. "The efficient service given during the tie up of the American liners has opened the eyes of the American shippers to the advantages of the Canadian route, and when the American vessels begin operations again we will have this business cinched."

The Northern Navigation Co.'s steamer, the Huronic, has been the only vessel to move flour eastward from Duluth this season, and on every down trip she carried a full load. This is mostly export flour.

With the majority of the American liners out of business a number of the Canadian boatmen went into ore hauling, taking full cargoes out of Two Harbors and other United States ports.
