men, and is not satisfied with the situation. They decided that the question should be left to the men, according to the rules of the union, before the last resort of conciliation and arbitration may be tried.

READY FOR ARBITRATION.

The executive committee went in session practically all day yesterday working on the report for the mass meeting. The chairman stated, however, that there were no developments, but that after the meeting it would be up to the company to decide whether or not the differences would be settled satisfactorily.

TO PREVENT LOCKOUT.

The agreement signed last year the following clause was included, which, if lived up to, will prolong the negotiations: To prevent lockout of the company, and to its employees, and to preserve the interests and convenience of the public, the company and its employees hereby agree not to resort to lockouts or strikes, but in event of the parties being unable to satisfactorily adjust any differences or grievances which may from time to time arise, and which, if not adjusted, might cause a lockout or a strike, a conciliatory committee shall be appointed from time to time in such differences or grievances arise, to be composed of three men representing the employees and three officials of the company.

TO AMEND ELECTION ACT.

Proposal of Government Will Be Fought by Opposition.

Ottawa, June 15.—(Special).—Prospects of an early prorogation are considerably discounted by an amendment to the Election Act, which the government proposes to introduce. It appears that the bills in Manitoba are unfavorable to the government, for which reason it is proposed to take the franchise out of the hands of that province and have the lists prepared under federal direction. The opposition will vigorously oppose a measure of this kind, it would mean having one election law for Manitoba and another for the provinces.

At the same time, we believe that a new short interest has been made the past day or two, which may cause an advance of some kind when they endeavor to liquidate.

Oats—The market was dull and featureless, without any change worth mentioning in quotations. Offerings were small and chiefly by floor traders. There was a reported sale of 100,000 for shipment east. The lake strike has been declared off, and this will stimulate the eastern demand. September oats look cheap by comparison with July price, and would advise buying on any slight break.

Provisions—Pork was a feature in today's provision market. After an early bulge the market declined 20c to 50c, then rallied and closed firm. Armour sold about 1,000,000 pounds of ribs and 100,000 tierces of lard.

Ennis & Stoppard wired J. L. Mitchell, 21 Melinda-street.

Wheat—Liverpool cables showed considerable weakness, opening 3/4 to 1/2 lower. The opening on this side was influenced by these conditions, which were, however, considerably modified by heavy rains in the west and southwest. In the early trading local people were the best sellers, owing to signs of inherent weakness in the local cash situation. No 2 hard had to be sold 6c during the past week. Some of the firms towards the close was caused by shorts covering on the light receipts in the south-west, where it was feared wet weather might delay harvest, and possibly lower the grade of new wheat, but the advance was small and trade light, and generally local. Advances say spring wheat is progressing rapidly, and aside from a late start, has been attended with uniform conditions favorable to a full yield. Professional traders are looking for lower prices, and have sold both hard and soft wheat in short. The latter delivery shows a considerable loss interest as a result of the favorable sentiment, and is going to be sold at all prices by commission houses, and which is widely assumed in small lots.

This long interest in September constitutes its weak point at this time, and may have to be shaken out by a sharp decline before the market improves much. Wheat looks to be a safe bet for a turn on the mill. Primary receipts, 265,000, against 311,000 a year ago. Clearances, 38,000 bushels.

Corn—Small receipts and too much rain over the belt caused shorts to cover during the morning, and a feature of the trading was continued buying of September by a prominent commission house.
