Member of the First Contingent From Woodstock Dies in Johannesburg.

Woodstock, Dec. 19.—There died recently in Johannesburg, South Africa, Garnet M. Odium, a nephew of Dr. Odium of this city.

The intelligence of the death was received in a cablegram this forenoon. No particulars as to the cause of death were given.

His position in the contingent was that of a private, and he was promoted to the rank of sergeant.

He was discharged from the contingent in 1900, and returned to Woodstock with the last section of the contingent.

A week ago Chief Agent Flynn of the secret service called at police headquarters, and at his request several detectives were put on the case. Dugan and Kinler, after getting what they believed to be sufficient evidence against Schlemmer, arrested him on Saturday.

He confessed, according to the detectives, that he had bought spurious silver pieces in his pockets at a "fence," and had 12 silver 50-cent pieces and a ten-cent dime. The man who was making them, he is reported to have said, sold them at 50 per cent. discount, and the pieces were made in the States.
