# Greatest Disaster a Premature Peace

Lloyd George Says it Would be Worst Thing That Ever Befell Mankind

Glasgow, June 29 - Discussing the question of peace today, Premier Lloyd George said that if the war should be concluded a single hour before the allied powers reached the end they sat out to attain at the beginning of the war, it would be the greatest disaster

"In my judgment," said the prime minister, "this war will come to an end when the allied powers have reached the end they set out to attain when they accepted the challenge thrown down by Germany to civilization. Then this war ought to come to an end; but if it comes to an end a single hour before, it will be the greatest disaster that ever befell mankind.

"I hear people say that Germany is ready to give us satisfactory Cents More — Ail Mines East peace. No doubt you can have peace now at a certain price, for no doubt Germany wants peace; but it is a peace which would give her economic and other control over the countries which she has in-

> "Russia will regain her strength with a bound, and become mightier and more formidable than ever," Lloyd Geosge continued, "Although these distractions had the effect of postponing complete victory, they made victory more sure than ever, more complete than ever and, what is more important,

The premier said there were many hearts filled with gloomy anxiety, contemplating the prospect of a peace conference to settle the future of democracy with representatives present of the most reactionary autocracy in the world. Russia is now unshackled and free, and her representatives at the peace conference would be representative of a free people fighting for freea still further cut dom and arranging a future democracy on the lines of freedom. Not merely would the Russian revolution insure a more complete, but a higher, more exalted victory than ever was contemplated before.

### Talk of Canada-Wide Strike To Make Plan Of Conscription Ineffective

Quebec, June 29.—The idea of a general strike throughout entire Canada as a means of preventing the enforcing of conscription if it is passed was endorsed last evening by the local union of stationary engineers. They did not take upon themselves to ask the general strike, but endorsed the action of the Trades and Labor Council of Calgary, Alberta.

A monster meeting of labor men is called here for Sunday night, to discuss means of preventing the putting into force of conscription in Canada. Interesting and important decisions in the matter are expected at next Tuesday's meetings of the central labor council of Quebec City.

# **British Hit Them Another Hard Blow**

The removal of the ammunition is being carried on by two methods. The divers are at work in one place sending

divers are at work in one place, sending the cases up after they have secured them, and in another place men working from floating stages are spearing the cases with boat hooks. William Murdoch, city engineer, who

is laying out the plans and specifications for the reconstruction of the shed, is developing a new idea for strengthen-ing the foundation. Instead of tieing the piling together with timbers running from side to side of the wharf, he is planning a lattice work of timbers, running diagonally in both directions with each end of each timber securely fastened to the wharf side. It is be lieved that this would give the utmos rigidity. On the top of this the framework which will support the warehouse floor will rise to the level of the top of the wharf and Mr. Murdoch will recommend ties between these timbers in both directions. When the ware-house is rebuilt he wants it to be strong enough to carry any weight which can be placed on it, so that the margin of safety in filling the warehouse will not

# Canadians on Outskirts of Lens

Canadian Headquarters in France, via London, June 28-(By Stewart Lyon, Special Correspondent of the Canadian Press)-Fighting their way forward, amid a labyrinth of ruined houses over which the smoke of battle hung densely, the Canadians at sundown tonight were more than half way through Avion. The attack, which was the second in twenty-four hours, was made in conjunction with the British troops, all of whom reached their objectives.

On the north, our hold upon Reservoir Hill was made absolute by the gallant advance of the British soldiers, who went forward without check, despite

Canadian Army Headquarters, June 28-(By Stewart Lyon, Canadian Press correspondent in France)-A further phase of the long struggle for the recovery of Lens was reached early this (Thursday) morning, when the enemy's front line protecting Avion, a suburb of the city, was captured by storming waves which went forward under the protection of a concentration of artillery fire on the part of Avion immediately behind the German line.

The assaulting troops were composed of m:n from British Columbia, Manitoba, central Ontario and Nova Scotia. By this morning's advance the British line has been carried forward to within a mile of the centre of Lens.

When this despatch was sent, few Germans were left on this part of the line. On the extreme left of the two mile front along which the attack was made, the Nova Scotians pushed their way up the Lens-Arras road to the village of Leauvette. Here they came into contact with the enemy and took a

Elu Dit Leauvette is located half a mile beyond Lievin, where some time ago the Germans made a desperate stand against the British advance. Avion, where the Canadians last week made some brilliant advances, is about threequarters of a mile due south of Lens, and about the same distance southeast of Fleu Dit Leauvette. Lens is practically encircled on three sides now.

# Test Case Over

The events which led up to the place ing of the complaint against Mr. Cam-eron were referred to the effect that a soldier had been arrested recently for drunkenness, that he had pleaded guilty and had been fined \$8, and that he had said that he had become intoxicated through drinking a bottle of Wilson's Invalid Port, which he had purchased from the defendant along with another caldies who also purchased a bottle. neither of them having a prescription. Following the statement of the soldier who had been arrested the complaint

In the police court, yesterday after-noon, the defence called Mr. Cameron to the stand. A bottle bearing the label of the L. A. Wilson Co., of Montreal, was produced in court. The de-fendant said that he carried such goods in stock, they being registered as a pat-ent medicine and, such being the case, he had not had any hesitation in selling

J. Benson Mahoney was next called to the stand by the defence. He said that he was a registered druggist and had en in business for thirteen years. With respect to the wine in question the witness said that it was for sale in every drug store in the city, that it was a registered patent medicine and was sold and handled as such. a case of attempting to get around the The case was adjourned until next Thursday afternoon at a date to be fixed as between counsel and, at the next hearing, argument will be heard.

# Was Drowned In Unsafe Meter Box

The inquest into the death of little Ronald Totten, whose disappearance created such intense interest here, was held last night and the jury, after find-ing that death was due to drowning in a meter vault owned by the city in Old Dorchester street, "considered the said meter box to be absolutely unsafe and langerous to the public and recommends that the commissioner of water and severage have all such meter boxes inspected monthly or oftener."

The inquiry was held before Dr. F. L. Kenney, coroner, at the court house. The

following gave evidence: Frank J. Totten, father of the drowned boy; Robert Gilliland, Dr. F. T. Dunlop, Thomas Ougler, Commissioner Wigmore and Andrew Martin, inspector of meters.

Dr. Dunlop, who held a post mortem, felt absolutely satisfied that death resulted from drowning and the condition of the body showed that it may have

been there since Sunday, June 17, when the tot disappeared. The evidence of Mr. Totten and Mr. Gilliland established that the body was found in the vault and Mr .Ougler stated that on the Sunday afternoon when the child disappeared he found two planks off the vault.





# Contracts Let For First Wooden Ships

Construction of 3,000 Ton Auxiliary Craft by Grant & Horne at Courtenay Bay to Mark Revival of Industry Which Once Made St. John Famous

A telegram was received last night by H. C. Schofield, representing the Imperial Munitions Board, from Colonel W. I. Gear, director of shipbuilding for the board, confirming the contract to Grant & Horne to build wooden ships at their new yard in Erin street. The ships will be built by Grant & Horne, fitted with engines, which will be supplied by the munitions board from standard patterns. They are to be 250 feet long with 431/2 feet beam and will have 25 feet depth of hold. The speed will be about 91/2 knots per hour, and the boats will have a cargo capacity of practically 3,000 tons.

The delay in awarding the contract was in connection with the technical parts of the arrangements, such as determining the size of the timbers. The plans also had to be approved and registered by the Lloyd's registry of shipping. The work will start immediately and a start on the yards was made yesterday. The contract will give employment to 200 men and the ships are to be built on the same ways; one will be finished and launched before the other one is commenced. The material, however, will be assembled for them both at the

It is expected that this will mean the re-establishment of the shipping industry in St. John, and while the war continues there will be further contracts

Grant & Horne, who have entered into the present contract with the director of shipping, have leased a yard near the Peters' tannery, on Courtenay Bay. They are a young firm, and while they have not had much experience as builders of ships, they have made good in their other undertakings and will doubtless succeed in this venture. The firm built McAvity's new plant on the Marsh road and were connected with the work on the sugar refinery. Mr. Grant has had some experience in contracting in

# Talk of Grave Danger to Country

Ottawa, June 28-Further serious warning to the government of the grave danger to which it is exposing the country by the precipitate forcing through without first ascertaining whether the people were ready for conscription, was given in parliament tonight. Alphonse Verville, of Maisonneuve, a former president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, in a strong speech, declared that autocracy in Canada was becoming a real menace and that labor believed it was being exploited for the benefit of the vested interests who were behind the government.

"I tell you what compulsion means if the people are not consulted. It means a general strike," he declared. "I want parliament to understand that even if all labor were exempted they would not change their determination in this question. Organized labor has been ignored since the war commenced."

Mederic Martin who, besides representing a constituency in the commons

is also mayor of Montreal, declared: "You may pass this law but you can never enforce it. The workers are too intelligent for that. We have a government that is not responsible and has no right to legislate. Next week we will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of Confederation. Be careful that you do not bring about the demise of Confederation. If you pass this bill you are deliberately provoking the people and may enter the realm of civil war."

Mr. Martin noted that government of rich men without sons would naturally try to impose conscription on Canada.

During the course of a thoughtful and logical speech at the afternoon sitting A. B. McCoig, Liberal member for West Kent, suggested a further trial of the voluntary system on the understanding that each military district which raised by voluntary recruiting, the required number of recruits proportionate to its population should be accorded the honor of exemption from the operation of any conscription measure.


