



Ottawa, July 17-Mr. F. B. McCurdy, of Halifax, M.P. for Queens and Shelof Halifax, M.P. for Queens and Shelburne counties, was today appointed under the war measures' act as parliamentary secretary of the Department of Militia and Defence. Under the terms of the order-in-council appointing him, he will in the absence of the minister from Ottawa, preside over the administer the department of militia and defence, but he shall not make any change in the policy of the department without the authority of the governor-in-council. 




