

\$225,000 For Harbor Here, \$25,000 For Maritime Probe Provided In Federal Budget

OTTAWA, March 15.—Main estimates for the next fiscal year, amounting for government services to \$345,771,351 were tabled in the House of Commons by Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance today. This is a decrease of \$5,652,672 from the total estimates of 1925-26. Estimates for the Canadian National Railways amounting to \$31,000,000, as compared with \$50,000,000 last year, were also tabled.

Included in the estimates is a vote of \$225,000 for Saint John harbor. Provision of \$25,000 is also made for the Royal Commission to inquire into the Maritime case.

Of the total amount of the main estimates, \$202,783,000 is required for statutory and post-war expenses, leaving \$142,988,000 for other public services. Provision for construction and betterments on the Hudson Bay Railway amounting to \$3,000,000, is made.

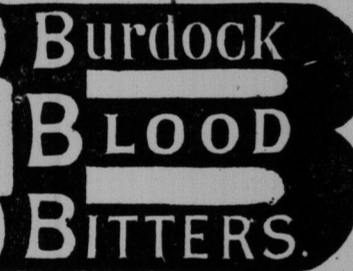
"Public works capital, including marine department, is reduced by \$2,177,803 and contains provision for—Ottawa, Parliament Building, \$225,000; Esquimaux Drydock, \$570,000; Fort Arthur and Fort William harbor, \$500,000; Saint John harbor, \$225,000; Toronto harbor, \$200,000; River St. Lawrence ship channel, \$1,490,000.

C. N. R. REQUIREMENTS

"The budget requirements of the Canadian National Railways are \$31,000,000 as compared with \$50,000,000 last year. This includes provision not only for the amount by which it is estimated the lines will fall short of meeting their fixed charges due the public in 1925-27, but also for current capital and refunding requirements. The estimate for the Canadian Government Merchant Marine is \$800,000, a decrease from last year of \$68,000."

News from the Montclair, N. J., High School.

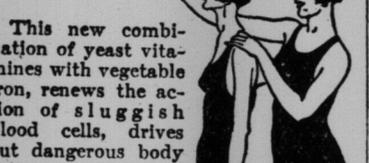

MANY WILL GO TO CHICAGO FOR EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

Largest Special Passenger Traffic Movement in History of Canadian Railroads is Looked For

According to advices received by Passenger Traffic Officials of the Canadian National Railways, one of the largest special passenger traffic movements in the history of Canadian Railroads will take place in June next in connection with the Eucharistic Congress at Chicago.

Preparations are being made in Chicago for the reception of more than a million pilgrims during the Congress, which will be held from June 20 to June 24, and the problems of transport for this multitude is already engaging the close attention of both American and Canadian Railroad Officials.

The Canadian Delegation will, of necessity, be a very large one, and will be thoroughly representative of the whole Dominion. Already the Canadian National Railways have contracted with various organizations for ten special trains from the Maritime Provinces as far West as Alberta. Most of these specials will be operated from Quebec and Ontario, but already enough travel is assured from the Maritimes for a special train to leave Moncton at or about 2.30 p. m., on Friday, June 18. The train will reach Chicago early Sunday morning. The train equipment will be of the very best, and standard C. N. R. diners will serve meals en route. The return trip will be made by special, leaving Chicago Thursday, June 24, allowing side trips to Niagara Falls and Ste. Anne de Beaupre, reaching Moncton on Monday, June 28. 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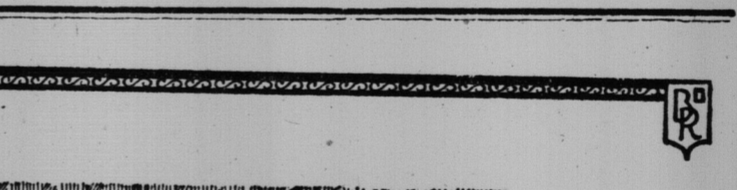

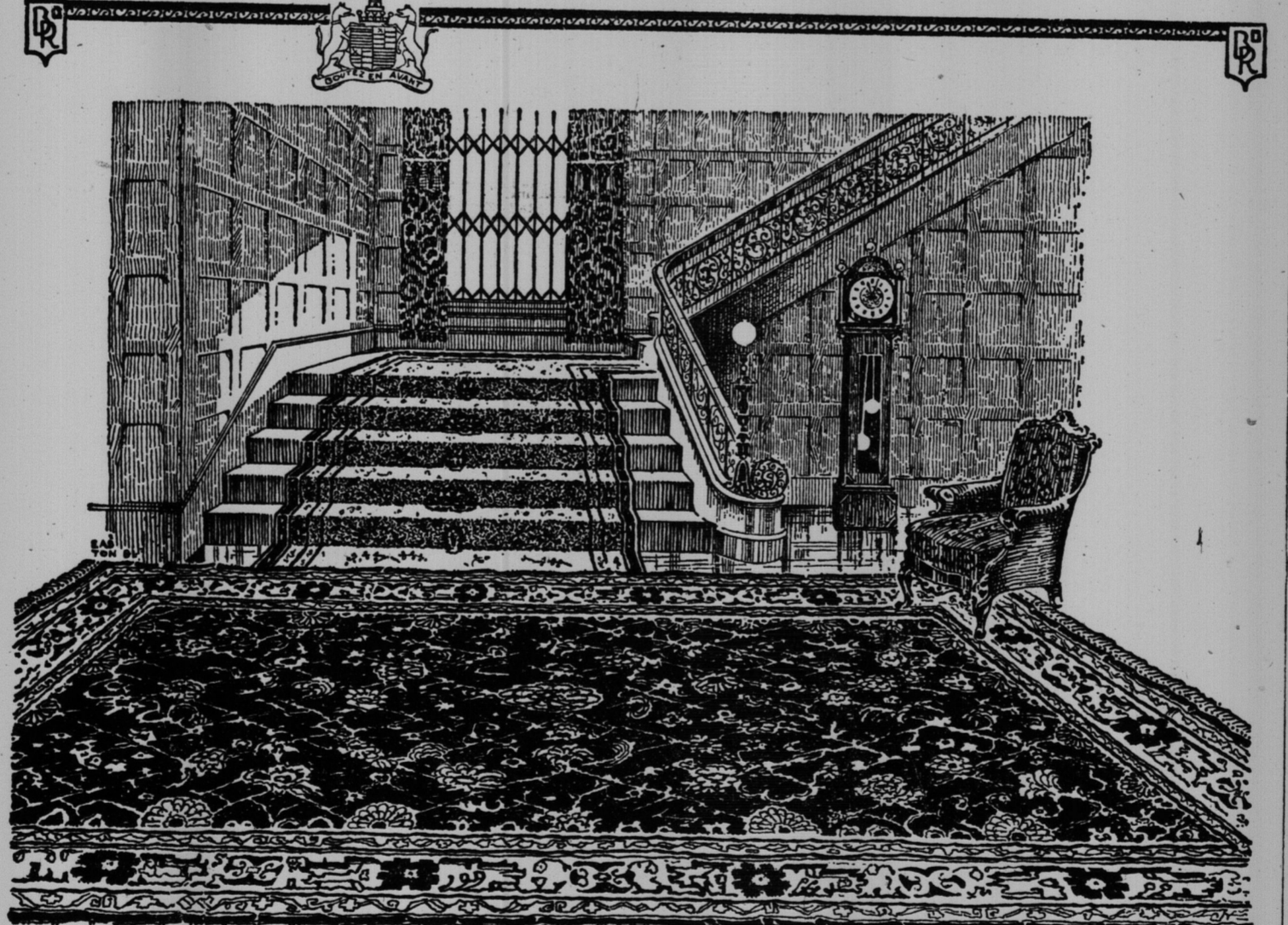

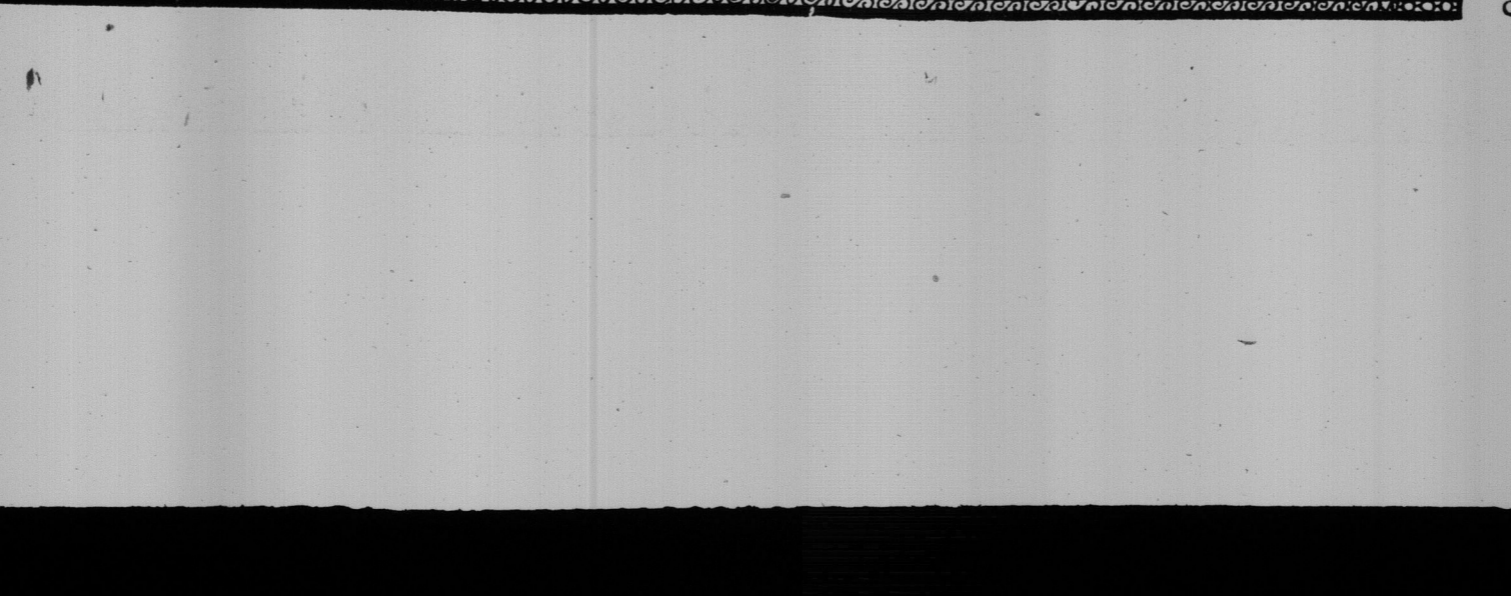

A LIVELY WEEK.

Unusual interest will centre this week, so far as New Brunswick is concerned, both in Fredericton and Ottawa. The debate on the address will be resumed at Fredericton by Hon. Dr. Veniot, who has said that he has in his possession important documents relating to Grand Falls development, and that he will bitterly oppose the development of Grand Falls by private interests. He will be followed by Hon. Dr. Baxter, who, it is also said, will have something to say that will come in the nature of a surprise. We need not attempt to anticipate what either leader will say, but it is evident from what both of them have said that the debate will be one of the most interesting that has been held in the Legislature for some years.

The convention of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance in Fredericton is also a matter of universal interest, the more so that a member of the Government and two of its supporters will speak at the public meeting this evening. It is assumed that the Alliance will make representations to the Government regarding the prohibition of liquor, and by the end of the week the people may be more fully informed regarding the intentions of the Government with regard to any possible legislation regarding the liquor question.

Since the New Brunswick Federation of Labor is also to meet in Fredericton this week, it may be assumed that it will have some resolutions to bring to the attention of the Government, and particularly in regard to the Workmen's Compensation Act. Although this should be one of the most interesting weeks of the legislative session. At Ottawa the proceedings will be enlivened by the return of the Prime Minister to a seat in the House; and by the development of Conservative tactics, the aim of which will be to embarrass as much as possible, and if possible bring about the Government's defeat. Thus the citizen this week will find more than the usual amount of "pep" in his daily paper.

RAILWAY PROBLEMS.

In his address before the Canadian Club in Montreal yesterday President Beatty of the Canadian Pacific Railway made it clear that he is opposed to the nationalisation of all railways in Canada. On the other hand, he believes in competition, and declares that the Canadian Pacific has no designs upon the Canadian National Railway. The two systems, he says, are working in harmony, as far as that may be possible between competing lines, and the thing he is most concerned about is such an improvement in economic conditions in Canada as to bring more business to both systems. President Beatty speaks very pointedly on the question of freight rates, and insists they should be such as to yield a fair return, which should be large enough to give the property adequate protection. The problems of the Government railways, he says, are fundamentally the same as those under private ownership, and in Canada the success of both systems depends upon something else besides readjustments of rates. On this point Mr. Beatty says: "Our problems revolve around the necessity of having people, taxation and definite fiscal policies, national in their purpose and their scope." With these conditions remedied, he says, the country's railway problem may be faced with confidence.

So far as the Canadian Pacific Railway Company is concerned, the President says the present directors of the company have the same faith in Canada's future as they will signify their faith by their work. It is characteristic of Mr. Beatty that all his deliverances are marked by moderation, though none the less clear on that account. His address yesterday is a very valuable contribution to the discussion of the railway situation in Canada, which now absorbs so large a share of public attention.

safe. Today's despatches announce that Hon. Charles A. Dunning is also to be opposed in Regina; but, since the Conservative leaders decided they would not go into the fight, it is quite safe to assume also that the new Minister of Railways will have a large majority.

It seems extraordinary that a country like Brazil should hold up the Council of the League of Nations. It would be still more extraordinary if such action should throw the League upon the rocks, and such an outcome cannot reasonably be anticipated.

On the same day on which it was announced that the estimates contained \$225,000 to be spent in Saint John harbor, the country was informed that it will take \$85,000,000 to complete the Welland Canal, on which over \$60,000,000 has already been spent. The Maritime Provinces have always cheerfully contributed their share toward the building of the canal, but they do not find a like cheerfulness in the rest of the country when development of their national ports is urged. The tune must be changed.

It is announced that the Canadian National Railway secured from Buffalo for this port the shipment of 246,000 bushels of American wheat. The announcement will be a terrible shock to Mr. A. A. Wright of Toronto, who has been working for the movement of grain this way as a sheer waste of money. Today's despatches say that something over 200,000,000 bushels of Canadian and American grain went through Montreal and Vancouver last year, but it is added that 316,000,000 bushels of Canadian grain were shipped from the Head of the Lake. Since the total shipments through Montreal were a little over 171,000,000 bushels, Vancouver getting nearly 85,000,000 bushels, the quantity shipped through American ports was almost as great as that through Montreal. We have a long way to go before justice is done to Maritime Province ports in the matter of the export of grain.

What System Of Civic Government Do You Think Best?

MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT IN CANADA.

Municipal government in Canada differs from that in the United States, in that, with some recent exceptions, we have followed much more closely the example of the mother country. The council is usually elected in greater part, if not wholly, by wards. The Mayor, as in England but not in the United States, is a member of the council, sitting with and presiding over it; he is, however, usually elected by the city at large instead of by the council as in England.

While city government in Canada has been comparatively free from the flagrant evils which have affected it in many cities of the United States, there has, nevertheless, been very general and frequent complaint as to its unsatisfactory results in this country. It has been found to be lacking in foresight and constructive purpose, vacillating and ineffective as compared with that of Great Britain and the continent of Europe.

Within the memory of the present generation, we have had in Saint John a council elected upon the ward system pure and simple—the alderman representing a ward being elected by the voters of that ward. For the revision and direction of the several administrative departments, dependence was placed upon a number of boards and committees. With the passing of duties came not only division and dispersion of responsibility but delay instead of despatch in the conduct of the city's business, with the result that, as in later times, complaints were loud and numerous with regard to neglect and mismanagement of civic affairs. It was thought that men rather than methods were at fault and that if the aldermen, though not elected to represent wards, were elected by the city at large, a more capable person would be selected to represent the ward he was nominated to represent, was required to appeal to the city at large for election. Under that plan it was soon discovered that men who would be willing to appeal as candidates to the electors of a single ward would not improve himself, but Man never is, but always to be blest. The Importance of Discussing Marriage Problems Before the Knot is Tied—Shall "Miss Twenty-Five," Who Has Never Loved, Marry to Keep From Being Lonely?—How to Treat a Selfish Husband.

DEAR MISS DIX—Should a young couple who are engaged discuss the problems of their future life together before they are married, or should they wait until after they are married to settle them?

ANSWER:

If you were going into a business partnership with a man, into which you were putting every cent that you had or ever expected to have, and every bit of your soul and body, wouldn't you try to have just as clear and definite an understanding about it as possible?

Wouldn't you want to know just what duties and obligations you assumed? Wouldn't you want to know what he expected of you? Wouldn't you want to know what his ideas were, what his principles were and how he proposed to manage the concern? And wouldn't you want to know just what he was investing in the firm and what sort of a division he proposed to make of the profits and what your status was to be in the business?

You wouldn't sign up a life contract in any sort of a business concern without looking into it and asking the advice of experts and calling in a lawyer to make out the papers so that you would get a square deal. Why, then, go blindly into matrimony, which is a business contract as well as a sentimental one?

I think a great deal of unhappiness would be saved if every young couple who are contemplating matrimony would not only thrash out on the safe side of the altar every subject that affected their mutual life, but if they would have a good lawyer draw them up a marriage contract in which the duties and obligations of each to the other was spelled out forth. It might not be possible to enforce all the provisions of this contract, but it would certainly be a useful document to refer to in times of domestic stress.

No man should marry a girl, for instance, until he knows definitely whether she will do her part in making a home out of the money he earns or not. If she is career mad or society crazy, and if she thinks that the function of a husband is merely to support her while she amuses herself a her own way, a man certainly has the right to know it before he commits himself for keeps.

Also, a man has the right to know before he marries a girl whether she prefers Pommern pop to babies wood, and not just thrash out on the safe side of the altar every subject that affected their mutual life, but if they would have a good lawyer draw them up a marriage contract in which the duties and obligations of each to the other was spelled out forth. It might not be possible to enforce all the provisions of this contract, but it would certainly be a useful document to refer to in times of domestic stress.

Knowing these things, he could either take her or leave her. He would at least know what he was doing, and he would not suffer the awful shock of surprise he gets when he finds out that his bride regards matrimony simply in the light of a graft and that she does not propose to worry herself about making him comfortable or giving him anything fit to eat, and that she considers that all he is good for is just to make money for her to spend and take her to places of amusement.

Certainly a girl should marry a man who will not make a definite agreement with her before marriage to give her an allowance for the house and one for her own personal expenses; who will not promise to take her out at least once a week to some place of amusement and who will not bind himself to spend most of his evenings at home.

For many of the men who swear at the altar to endow their wives with all their worldly goods because their wives' street fare, many a man thinks that being married to him is all the entertainment any woman could want and many a lover who drew the most alluring pictures of the sweet little home they would have never come home until every other place is closed up.

So my advice is to find out all you can about the views of the man or woman you are about to marry before the fatal knot is tied. Even then there will crop up enough unexpected quirks of temper and temperament to keep you in a state of amazement till your dying day.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—I am a young woman, 25 years old. I have a fine position, with every chance for promotion. Here is my problem: A man whom I like and admire wants to marry me, but I care nothing for him. I have never been in love. Shall I marry this man who loves me or shall I keep my position and wait to see if I ever find a man I love? It is all right now to be unmarried, but it is the years after 40 that I hate to think of spending alone.

ANSWER: It is foolish of you to despair at 25 of falling in love. You have only come to the years in which a woman is really capable of the grand passion. Up to that time it is only mushy calf love that girls feel. And you are lucky to have escaped that.

So I should certainly urge you not to marry this man whom you do not love, for there is every chance in the world that before long your real mate will come along and you will want to be free to take him instead of being bound. You don't want to be held by every tie of honor and duty to a man that you will hate when you realize that he stands between you and happiness.

Believe me, Betty, marriage is no picnic for women. It is full of sacrifice and suffering, of self-denial, of work and worries, and nothing on earth makes it worth while except a love for a man so great that it makes you feel that you would rather have a crust with him than a feast without him; that makes any labor a pleasure if done for his sake, and that causes you to feel that life without him is cinch, ashes and dust.

You have a good position. You are doing the work you enjoy doing. Your life is full of interest. You have independence and money. These are mighty good things to have, Betty. And you should be very certain that you are head over heels in love with any man before you give them up for him.

And don't worry about the years after 40. Every phase of life has its own particular joys and interests, and you will be just as keen about things at 40 and have just as good a time doing them as you have now.

The chances are that if you don't marry you will be no more lonesome than you will be if you do marry. Look about you and see how many middle-aged men are chummy with their middle-aged wives!

It is a great thing to marry if you find the right man. But it is a lot better to be single than to marry the wrong one. And there are no compromises in matrimony.

DEAR MISS DIX—My husband goes out to the movies three and four times a week. I have two small children, and when I ask him to mind them so that I can go to see a picture he refuses and says that a woman's place is in the home with her children. Do you think he is right?

ANSWER: I certainly do not. I think he is monumentally selfish and unfair. The children are just as much his as they are yours, and it is just as much his duty to take care of them now and then and give you a rest and a change as it is your duty to look after them most of the time.

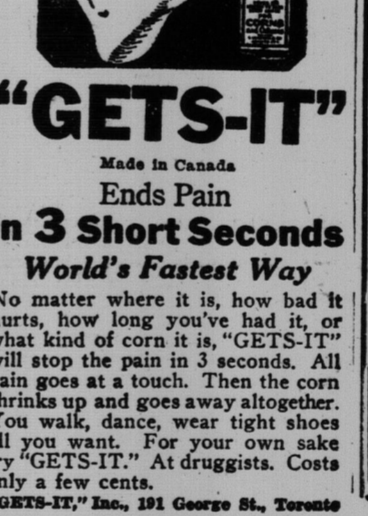

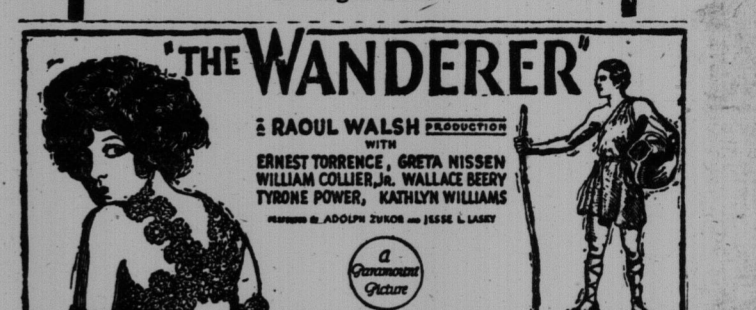
