Most of them now making a living by catching fur, and it is not an unusual thing for an Eskimo to make as much as \$1.500 by this means during a season. Few of them understand English. There were thirty-one persons in the party, all brought from Puerto Mexico and all, including four women and eight children, telling a thrilling story of their adventures after the American occupation of Vera Cruz.

All the members of the party were connected in some capacity with the Tehuantepec National Railway Company, from W. B. Ryan, vice-president and general manager of the rail-road, with his daughter, Juliette, twenty-one years old, to a stenographer in the company's offices.

Mr. Ryan told how the entire party, including women and children, were placed in jail and doomed to be shot. Because of his own long residence in the country, and the fact that he was an official of the railroad he was allowed to telegraph to General Gamboa, at San Geronimo, and finally obtained their release. 




