This motion was talked out last Thursday after a closure division in which the Government had a majority of only 34.

On that occasion several Conservatives were absent and the promoters of the movement believe that with the presence of these members and the abstention of a section of the Liberals they will be able to defeat the Government.

Mobilizing Forces.

The cry of "wolf," however, has so often been raised that the public is becoming skeptical, and but for the statements in Governmental quarters that the Government, if defeated, will treat the question as one of confidence and recommend dissolution of parliament, this new alarm would probably not be

this new alarm would probably not be regarded seriously.

Nevertheless, the Government is mobilizing its forces energetically to meet the menace and has called the parliamentary Labor party together for Thursday morning to discuss the situation. The Liberals also will meet before the House assembles to decide upon their attitude.

Some of the best informed authori-ties are confident that the Liberals will again save the Government, but there is enough uncertainty to sustain public curiosity.

RESENTING **EXCLUSION**

Prince Regent Assents to the Action Being Taken by Foreign Minister.

CABLED TODAY

Violation of Treaty Rights by Immigration Bill, is Govt. Contention.

Tokio, May 28. - Foreign Minister Matsui today asked and obtained the assent of the Prince Regent to the forwarding of Japan's protest against enactgration Bill barring Japanese The proceeding was extraordinary and is interpreted as indicating unusual importance was attached to the document.

The foreign minister went to the Imperial Palace immediately after the extraordinary cabinet session, called yesterday to give final approval to the protest, had ended. The Regent sanctioned the protest.

The protest was placed upon the cables for transmission to Ambassador Hanihara at Washington soon after the foreign nister had left the Imperial Palace. The Ambassador will deliver it to Secretary of State Hughes. The foreign office announced it would issue a statement at 5.30 p. m.

Ambassador to Return. The cabinet today approved the text of the protest against the provision of the U. S. immigration bill excluding Japan from that country. The protest will be sent immediately to Ambassador Hanihari, whose return to Japan when the protest has been dealt with also was approved by the cabinet. The protest, it is learned, is based on alleged violation of Japan's treaty rights under the first article of the

Article 1 of the treaty provides for equal treatment of the subjects and citizens of the contracting parties as

Treaty of Commerce and Navigation

between the U. S. and Japan.

"We know that the present American

"We know that the present American administration is opposed to the exclusion clause, both from the President's statement and the attitude of himself and Mr. Hughes throughout this controversy," he asserted, "and we understand that conditions in this Congress have been abnormal. We believe that exclusion does not represent the will of the American people. Considers It Affront.

Considers It Affront.

"We still hope something can be done to undo the action of Congress and wipe out this condition, which the Japanese consider unjust and an affront to our nation," he went on.

"Sustained by this hope, the Government is holding to a policy of restraint and dignity and is trying to maintain this attitude for the whole nation. We are doing our best to avoid anything petty, any small retaliation embargoes or discrimination against Americans.

"In this policy the Government has the support of all responsible elements in business and commerce. I believe that thus far we have succeeded in maintaining a dignified national attitude."

Three Die From Electrocution. One is Crushed in Elevator.

Montreal, May 27-Four sudden deaths occurred in this city and district this afternoon, three of them by elec-

A double electrocution occurred in the Andrew Baille Coal yards on Wellington street, one man being killed by the current of a coal loading machine that apparently was not out of order, and a second victim was killed in trying to help the first.

The two are Edward Warren, 86, and Ludger Gagnon, 43, both of this city. A third man, Oscar Magee, was twice violently shocked in trying to aid Warren and was thrown to the ground but was not seriously injured.

An hour earlier, Mallette Niligeane, 14, climbed to the top of a metal pole on the Canal bank at Ville St. Pierre, a suburb of Montreal, touched a high voltage wire and was instantly killed. On Top of Cage.

ately. Bacteria increase rapidly in milk which stands in the sun or warms up, and such milk will sour quickly.

Keep milk in the original bottle until the moment of serving. Milk which has been poured from the bottle should not be returned to it.

If you have a cow be sure she is helathy, and have her tested for tuberculosis by a competent veterinarian. If she has tuberculosis have her killed, under supervision of the state veterinarian's office. The state will pay you for the cow.

Keep the cow clean and wash your hands well before milking.


Consider Court House Suggestions

BEDLAM REIGNS IN THE REICHSTAG ON OPENING DAY

Berlin, May 28 .- The opening session f Germany's second post-war Reichstag today terminated in a typical German "saengerfest," the Communists striking up the "Red Internationale" to

striking up the "Red Internationale" to which the Reactionaries responded with "Deutschland Uber Alles."

The discord which marked the usual Parliamentary vocal demonstration made a fitting climax to a session thrown into confusion by boisterous obstructionist tactics in which the Communists had the lion's share.

With its initial session the new Reichstag succeeded in living up to expectations, and the party leaders frankly admitted that conditions will grow worse once the new Parliament attempts to settle down to serious business.

Howl Down Opponents.

An attempt by the Communists to force recognition of several political motions was frustrated and the Reds thereafter reserved their sabotaging ammunition, howling down their political opponents as the names were checked off on the official roster by the House

was called, the Left responded with "Woe unto you that you are his grandson." Shrill whistling sirens and miniature fog horns greeted the name of Admiral Von Tirpitz. General Ludendorff got the benefit of a stratagem employed by his party and friends, who started up a deafening cheer when his name was called out. Prince Von Bismarck, the Reichstag's youngest member, circulated among his party's veterans as though he were anything but a newcomer to the Parliamentary arena. At 28 he is exactly 50 years younger than William Bock, Socialist. who is the Reichstag's






