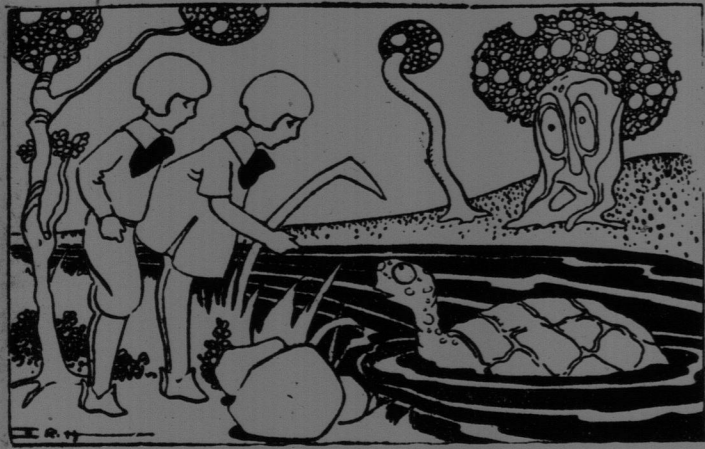

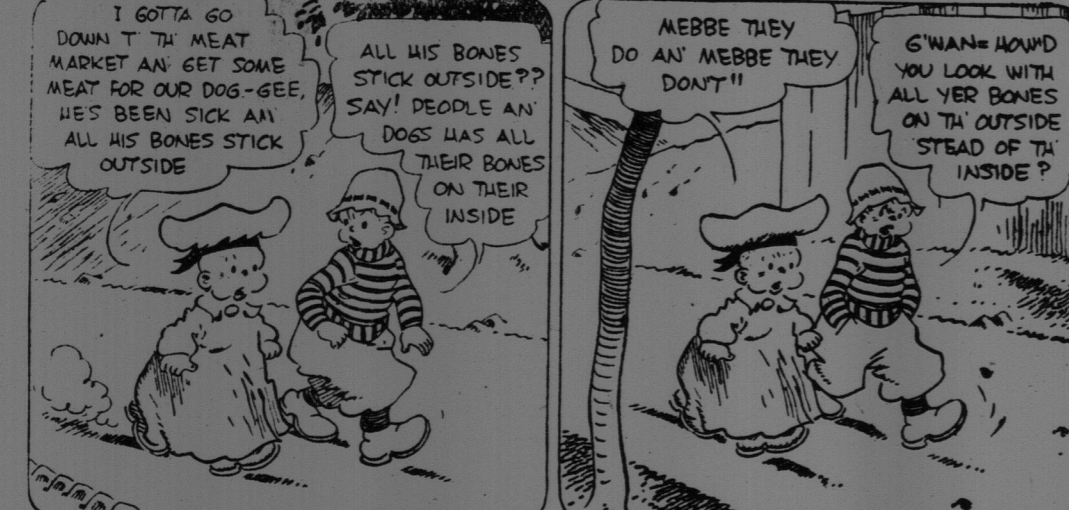
D. W. McLaughlin Says Tramp Steamers Would Prefer Montreal

Port Nelson at two months; that is between the actual docking of the first ship and the departure of the last. He submitted an estimate he had based on the rates at that day showing that the rate on grain from Saskatoon to Liverpool, via Fort William and Montreal was 26.4 cents per bushel. It would have cost 19.9 per bushel to haul the grain from Saskatoon to Port Nelson including handling charges, leaving a margin of 6.5 for the ocean rate, extra insurance and interest on the cost of work. The average rates obtained by tramp steamers carrying grain from Montreal to Liverpool was seven cents. The engineer points out that tramp steamers would inevitably choose the Montreal route unless there was a considerably higher margin to induce them to go to Port Nelson. Liners, he says, could never successfully run into Port Nelson nor could package freight be handled in large quantities. Mr. McLaughlin was of the opinion that it would always cost twice as much to handle cargoes at Port Nelson as it would at Fort William or Montreal. The white whale has become such a pest in French coastal waters that a vigorous campaign is being waged against it by the fishermen. The report which has not before been made public, was tabled in the House of Commons today with a file of correspondence. Mr. McLaughlin estimates the average season of navigation into

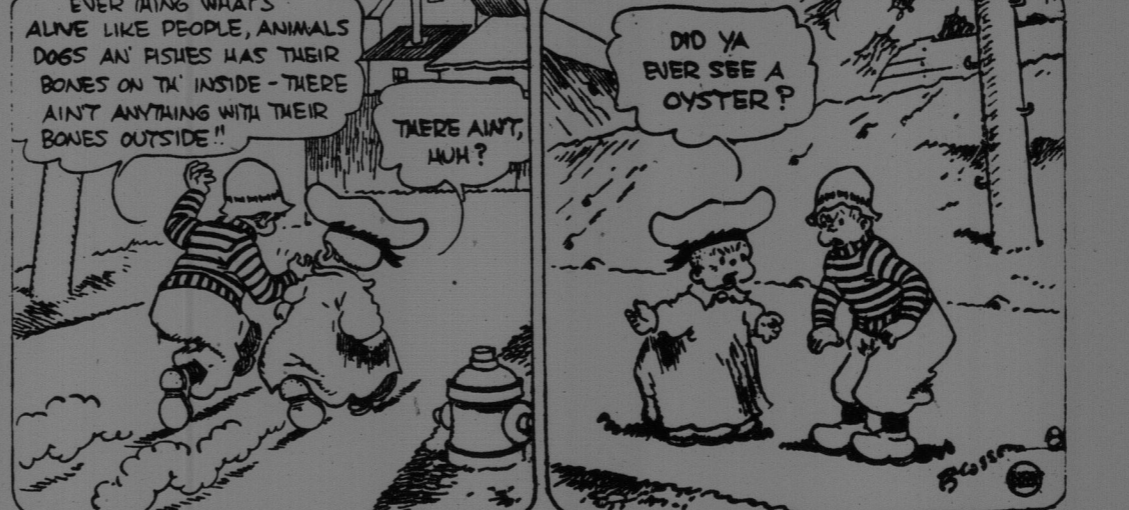

Mr. Mann soon found out that everyone, or pretty nearly everyone, has upon his hands a tough problem in getting the child to bed at a certain time. The child will, if he can get away with it, try to stay up as long as his elders. And, if encouraged, this can become a dangerous and unhealthy habit. Don't encourage it in the first place. Some resort to 'get-to-bed' games. But the more efficient get the child in the habit of wanting to go to bed. Children can be trained to go to sleep as soon as they go to bed. Disturbed sleep courts troublesome children. Try and have a dark, and reasonably quiet bedroom. Also the child should be made acquainted with house noises, so that tip-toed walking and talking in reasonable tone of voice will not disturb it. Such normal noises should not disturb the healthy sleep of the child. Try to avoid exciting play and romping before the child retires. This will leave the child too excited for sleep, oftentimes. Also parents now know that rocking and lullaby singing are not necessary. Don't resort to any artificial means, if it is possible. The healthy child will want to sleep and will enjoy it. Any tricks or devices merely get the child into other habits. Avoid them."

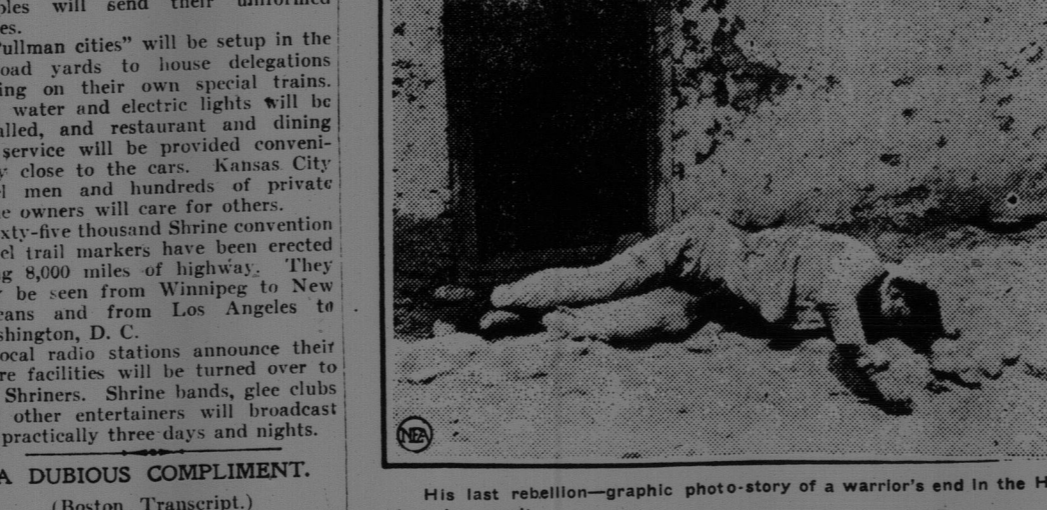

TAX REDUCTIONS PASS IN COMMONS

Further Details of Sales Tax and Income Tax Operation.

Ottawa, May 28.—Remaining budget resolutions passed the House last night. These were the resolutions reducing the sales tax rate from six to five per cent, increasing its list of exemptions and reducing the tax on certain articles to one half; and the further resolution increasing the income tax exemption on each child from \$300 to \$500 and amending the income tax Act in other particulars. One such is to "reorder certain" that the income tax lien "shall not take priority over securities validly taken prior to the time at which the lien attached."

Gloucester Takes Notice

Gloucester is listening with some attention to the things Miss Brooks is peddling for her home town, for Miss Brooks has already given her fellow citizens several tastes of the efficacy of her reform measures. After a liberal and lengthy education at Wellesley and Harvard Colleges, she entered the glue manufacturing business as an expert consulting chemist. In her spare time she organized vigorous branches of the suffrage party and later the League of Women Voters. Then she ran for alderman and swept the city. As alderman, Miss Brooks first leaped to fame as an exponent of women policemen. She appointed one feminine constable, who has been so successful that she now has a score of colleagues in various towns of the Commonwealth.

A DREAD DISEASE SHOWS INCREASE

London, May 27.—The death from sleeping sickness of a man as prominent as C. Bower Ismay, shipowner and brother of J. Bruce Ismay, has had the effect of focusing public attention on the alarming spread of that mysterious disease in a manner more pronounced than the deaths of many unknown individuals. The disease has always been sporadic in England, but the annual average of cases never exceeded 800 until 1921, when more than 1,000 were registered.

NOTED DOCTORS WILL BE THERE

American Physicians are to Convene in Chicago Next Week.

Chicago, May 28.—The forward strides of the science of medicine in the last year will be surveyed by thousands of American physicians who will attend the 25th annual meeting of the American Medical Association, to be held on the Municipal Pier during the week of June 2.

ONTARIO IS SEEKING COAL FROM WEST

Toronto, May 27.—Following a conference in the Premier's office yesterday between Premier Ferguson and Earl Lawson, G. H. Kilner, K. C. and Colonel Gordon, the Ontario Government's representatives, in connection with the investigation going on into Alberta coal rates, it was announced that Ontario and Alberta, jointly, will submit a new proposal to Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R., in an effort to get a lower freight rate on western coal into Ontario.

FREDERICTON FORMS SALVAGE CORPS UNIT

The organization of the Fredericton Salvage Corps and Fire Prevention Department is complete. The proposal is that two train loads of the Alberta fuel be sent eastward as a test of cost per ton of transportation. The committee suggested and Premier Ferguson agreed that Ontario should pay 7 a ton freight charges on the test shipment and in case the actual cost exceeds \$7 the Dominion Government should pay the extra amount.
