CANNED FISH N. S. Ottawa, Aug. 28—(Canadian Press)—Amendments to the Meat and Canned Poods Act respecting the marking of importations of fish or shell fish have been brought into effect and a memorandum covering the terms of the amendment has been issued by the department of customs and excise to officers of that department. The amendment provides that canned fish or shell fish imported into Canada to be exported need only be labelled to show the country of origin, and also providing that no false or misleading mark of designation of the kind or variety of the contents shall be shown on any can of fish imported for sale in Canada.

ANGER AROUSED

People Threaten to Take the Law Into Their Own Hands -Army of Irregulars Dis-

Obblin, Aug. 24 — The death of General Michael Collins has aroused the nation to fierce anger and pressure is already being brought upon the government to adopt severe repressive measures against those who brought about his death. Anxious as the ministers are to continue the dead commander's policy of clemency they may soon be compelled to give way to the great tide of public indignation. When the irregulars killed Michael Collins they killed a man who had done more than anyone else to save them from themselves. It was he who had insisted on dealing with them leniently, so that when the victory for which he fought was won, there should be left behind no seeds of bitterness. Now the people have seen the fruits of this policy and they are insisting that no longer should the captured irregulars be allowed that immunity from punishment they have hitherto enjoyed.

The people are already threatening to take the law into their own hands and from Cork there is a report that an infuriated crowd have attempted to storm the goal with the object of lynching Republican prisoners. No confirmation of the report can be obtained and it is regarded as probably untrue, but the repid manner in which it has spread shows in what direction the people's thoughts are turning.

What the irregulars could once boast was their army in the field has been dispersed. Their forces consist of but scattered bands who prey upon the countryside and descend upon outnumbered isolated forces of the National troops to kill and run. 





"More than this," said Prof. Smiddy, "he was not only a competent states man, but if he had lived I believe he would have also ranked as an intenational statesman. He had a dream that at some future day, when Ireland should have secured peace and freedom, Ireland and America might form the nucleus of a real league of nations, with she moral influence that is required to establish world peace. That was his dream; that was what he was working towards."


Despite the loss of Collins, Dr. Smiddy said, Ireland will rise to the occasion and organize effectively to fight for the principles for which he fought: "It is not right to say that Ireland is leaderless," said Dr. Smiddy. "Those who are left will organize themselves more efficiently to secure their libertic under the treaty. His death will stimulate the leaders to imitate him and cleetively make up for the loss sustained by his assassination.

"The alternative to the treaty is having the light to one of the land. It was to avoid that that Collins fought so strenously for the treaty. Ireland will rise to the occasion and things will be all right."

There will be no reprisals for Collins death, Prof. Smiddy said. "Whatever happens, the National Army will six to resort to reprisals. But in the end they will stampout insurrection and there will be peace." 

Announcements of advances in steel prices, such as had been expected in connection with the twenty per cent, increase in wages by the United States Steel Corporation and most of the independent steel companies, began to make their appearance in the financial district yesterday. Steel billets were moved up yesterday from \$35 to \$37.50 a ton, a new high record price for the current year to date. The price is still only about half the top price quoted in the war years, but it compares with a low of \$28 a ton quoted in January this year. Pig iron at Philadelphia is now quoted at \$34.25 a tons, compared with \$81 a ton last week and a low of \$21.28 earlier in the year. 
