#### OBITUARIES.

#### ALEXANDER WRIGHT

Was born in Loboro, Frontenac County, November 19th, 1816. His narents removed to Sidney. In 1836 a gracious revival visited the neighborhood. Whether Alexander was then converted, or previously, he participated joyfully in the work, with great profit to himself. was married April 20th, 1837, to Sarah Ann, daughter of Abram Philips. In 1840 he was received on trial at Cumming's chapel (now Willowdale). and sent to Brighton Circuit. In 1842 he was received into full connexion and ordained deacon. His ministry was abundantly fruitful; scores were added to the Church. He labored on the Matilda, Farmersville, Centreton, Consecon, Hope and Wolfe Island circuits. He was Presiding Elder of the Augusta and Ottawa districts. He magnified his office by ability and fidelity. At the first session of the Ontario Conference he was sent to Seymour and Norwood, including Hastings. At Brighton. in 1866, he was stricken with paralysis while engaged in pastoral work. This closed his career in the active work. He was spared after this to serve the cause he loved, and in a local capacity preached with great acceptance and ability. For thirty years he was superannuated. Father Wright fell asleep September 2nd, 1896. He was an able minister, a true evangelist, and a wise administrator; blameless in life, esteemed and honored as a Christian gentleman by all who knew him. His last sermon was preached in the Presbyterian church in Hastings. On his death-bed he bore the most unwavering testimony to the faithfulness of God to sustain His servants in the hour of dissolution. Memorial services were held in the Methodist church, Hastings, and four ministers bore testimony to his purity and fidelity.

#### WILLIA'M SCALES

Died in great peace at his home in Oshawa, Wednesday, November 21nd, 1896. He was stricken with paralysis on Saturday, and on the following Wednesday passed to his reward. The deceased was born in Axeholm, near Epworth, in Lincolnshire, England, in 1818. For seventeen years he labored as a local preacher. In 1852 he came to Canada. In 1854 he was received on trial for the ministry of the Methodist Church. His first appointment was to the lumber camps on the Gatineau, a circuit 150 miles long by one hundred miles wide. In 1857 he was ordained, and the following year received into full connexion. He was married in 1858 to Miss Sarah Kneeshaw, who still survives him. For fifteen years Brother Scales travelled in the Eastern Townships in the Province of

Quebec, and in 1873 came to Ontario. His circuits were all within the bounds of the Bay of Quinte Conference. He retired from active work in 1883, and since then to the time of his death lived in Oshawa, beloved by all who knew him. His devoted wife and five children survive him. A memorial service was held in the Simcoe Street Methodist Church, Oshawa, which was largely attended. The remains were interred at Belleville. Our departed brother was kind and generous in disposition, sound in judgment, clear and discriminating in his views of truth, possessed of deep, unaffected humility, steadfast hope and vigorous faith. His preaching was eminently evangelical, practical and fruitful, and as a consequence he reaped wonderful harvests of souls. He was one of the best authorities on Methodist history, polity and doctrine in our Conference. Truly it could be said of him, "He was a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and of faith."

#### WILLIAM BIRD

Was born in the County of Fermanagh, Ireland, on the 12th of May, 1811. His parents belonged to the Wesleyan Methodist Church, but in coming to this country and finding none of that denomination in the neighborhood in which they settled, they united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. We have no data as to the time or place of our late brother's conversion. In 1836 he was sent as a supply to the Nelson and Dumfries Circuit, and at the next Conference was regularly received on trial and admitted to the ranks of the ministry, which, in those early days, meant hard work, many trials and poor remuneration, save in the gratitude of a loving people and the approval of his God. For sixty years he toiled and wrought to make known that Saviour who had saved his own soul. He was stationed on fifteen circuits, some of them in the west near London and others in the east near Bytown, now Ottawa; so, like all the early itinerants he took in his day nearly the whole of what was then called Upper Canada. His circuits, like all the circuits then, were large, embracing several townships. The only means of travel was the saddle, and hence to do the work on his charges meant fatigue, discomfort and long absence from home; but he nobly endured, and God so owned his labors that on every circuit there was fruit, indeed on some he had the honor of witnessing hundreds brought to God. While enjoying in a special manner the favor of God, he also won the confidence and appreciation of the authorities of the Church which he served, for he received at their hands the honor of the presiding eldership, which office he filled on the Augusta District. The Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada had few preachers who were more useful and acceptable. Our late brother preached the Word with power and unction that touched and melted the hardest hearts. He also possessed the faculty for organizing into classes and bands the fruits; thus the Church of Christ was established and firmly grounded. He was superannuated in 1871 and settled in Belleville, and after the union of the churches, united with the Bridge Street Church. Bro. Bird was a thoroughly good man, who delighted in God. As he advanced in years . his piety matured and was exhibited in a meek and patient disposition.

He died in the afternoon of Sunday, the 13th of December last, and was buried from the Bridge Street Church on the following Tuesday. The Rev. Dr. Gardner, who had been for many years associated with him, delivered a leving tribute to his memory.

#### RODOLPH W. MARSH

Was the second son of Johnston Marsh, M.D., and Lydia Bissell. The parents and their son were all born in Murray, Ontario. The family removed to Syracuse, N.Y., the latter to Orion, Mich. Bro. Marsh entered the army during the American rebellion, where he was wounded. After the war he returned to Brighton and lived with his uncle, S. E. Marsh. At a camp-meeting held in 1867, near the place of his nativity, under the preaching of Rev. Lachlan Taylor he was led to repentance, believed on Christ and was saved, September 9th, 1867. He was recommended as a candidate to, and admitted on trial in, the Ontario Annual Conference of the M. E. Church in Canada, May, 1870, at Brooklin, and sent with Rev. G. Jones to Stirling Circuit. The next year, with Rev. D. Smith to Haldimand. He married Miss H. E. Fraser, third daughter of Isaac Fraser, of Haldimand. In 1872 he was received into full connexion, ordained deacon, and sent to Hope Circuit. His appointments were all within the Colborne District until union; since that time Centreton, Seymour, Queensboro', Wooler, Yarker and Northport were his circuits. His labors were successful on every charge. He was an acceptable preacher, good pastor and wise administrator. On account of poor health he was superannuated in June, 1896. On December 9th of the same year, "He was not, for God took him." Memorial services were held both in Belleville and Campbellford, and at the last-named place his remains were interred.



# REPORT OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee recommend that the Fund known as the Sustentation Fund of the Bay of Quinte Conference be continued, the constitution of the Fund to be as follows:

1. The object of this Fund shall be to augment the salaries of all ministers and probationers in the active work in the Conference who receive less than the following amounts: Ordained married men, \$600; ordained unmarried men, \$350; probationers, \$300. These amounts in every case to include salary, board, fuel and horse keep.

2. The income of the Fund shall be the amounts received from offerings

and special collections taken on all our circuits and missions.

3. The general management of this Fund shall be entrusted to a committee composed of one minister and one layman elected to the Annual Conference by each Annual District Meeting when the laymen are present, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Annual Conference on the nomination of the Committee, and who shall also be conveners of the Committee. This committee shall transact all necessary business in accordance with the following regulations:

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(a) In making grants from the Fund the Committee shall have strict regard to the aforementioned scale of allowances, except in the case of large families, when the Committee shall have power to increase the allowance at their own discretion. No claim shall be entertained which has not first been presented by the Quarterly Board and recommended by the Annual District Meeting, and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims for recommendation shall declare their inability to meet their net deficiencies.

(b) When the District Meeting deems it expedient, a committee shall be appointed to visit such circuits as ask for assistance, to inquire into their circumstances and report to the treasurer of the Sustentation Fund before the first session of said com-

mittee:

(c) Should the income of the Fund in any year prove insufficient to meet the claims thereon, then the grants shall be so distributed as to make up the allowances of claimants to the same percentage according to the aforementioned scale. Should there be a surplus over the said claims, it shall be carried forward and included in the total income for the ensuing year.

(d) A report shall be presented by the Committee to the Conference annually while in session, including a summary of the business transacted, and an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary to the interests of the Fund, said report as adopted by the Conference to be

printed in the Minutes.

Your Committee regret to find that on some circuits and stations the provision in the Constitution asking for a special collection for this Fund has not been complied with, but that the Boards have appropriated a fixed sum out of the general funds of the Church instead. In our opinion, this mode of procedure will ultimately result in a great reduction in the contributions, and tend to lessen the interest that the congregations are likely to take in the Fund.

We, therefore, respectfully suggest that superintendents of circuits, when possible, insist upon a special collection being taken up, and that they fully explain the nature of the Fund and set forth its present inadequacy to meet the requirements as shown by the financial statement

submitted herewith.

There are eighteen claims upon the Fund this year, aggregating the sum of \$1,825.00. The sum of \$495.36 was placed at the disposal of your Committee, which has been disbursed as follows:

Whereas, the towns and cities of Canada are being threatened with the reproduction of the verescopic exhibition presenting every detail of the late brutal Corbett-Fitzsimmons prize fight, we memorialize the Minister of Justice to facilitate the measure already introduced to legally prevent the exhibition by placard upon the walls and the presentation by views in our public buildings of all such spectacles which are in the clearest sense indecent and debasing to the morals of our young people.

# REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee report that they have given careful consideration to the Sabbath School returns for the past year, and find that with a fairly satisfactory general result there is regrettable decrease reported in several important items. The number of schools, for instance, is twelve less than last year, with a corresponding decrease in teachers and twenty-two less scholars. While there has been a substantial increase in admissions to church membership, there is a small decrease of scholars who are members of the Church.

We regard as deplorable the fact that out of an aggregate of 38,000 less than 7,000 scholars are returned as having taken the total abstinence pledge, and we urge upon our Circuits and Sabbath School superintendents to give greater attention to this vital matter.

Again we would direct attention to the lamentable disregard of the use of our catechism in the Sabbath Schools. Less than 2,800 are reported as being taught, a decrease of 550 as compared with last year's returns.

While our Sabbath School literature is in general use, your Committee regard it as connexionally a mistake that over 7,000 of non-denominational and in some cases anti-British publications are furnished to our Sabbath School children. This certainly is not calculated to induce either attachment to Methodism or patriotism. We trust that before long this stigma upon our excellent Sabbath School publications may cease.

There is a creditable increase in the amount contributed for Missions, and also an increase in the contributions for the Educational Fund, but as a collection once a year in each Sabbath School is now a disciplinary stipulation, it is manifest that the eighty dollars this year returned does not at all represent the amount of such collection. There is a decrease in the contributions for Sabbath School purposes, and also in the Sabbath School Aid and Extension Fund, and it is greatly to be regretted that nearly one-half of our schools are closed during the entire winter.

The newly instituted, but now universally approved Home Department has so far failed to obtain recognition to any appreciable extent in this Conference, and we would warmly recommend prompt and earnest effort on the part of our superintendent ministers to introduce the Home

Department wherever practicable.

As there are many books in the homes of our people practically lying unused, that if collected and sent to the poorer schools, would be a great blessing, therefore we recommend that ministers in charge ask the several families of their congregations to send in one or more such books suitable for the Sabbath School library to the Rev. George Brown, Cannington, in order that they may be forwarded to schools in the more needy localities.

Your Committee recommend the Rev. J. J. Rice as Conference representative to the Provincial Sabbath School Association Convention, and that Rev. D. Williams be Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee submit the following report:

1. We have considered the resolutions on the question of Temperance submitted by the various Districts. These resolutions give evidence of the unabated zeal of the Church in the propagation of temperance sentiment, a zeal which will continue until the battle is over and the victory won.

2. We reciprocate the friendly greetings of temperance organizations, recognizing the value of the work they have done in times past and still are doing. We wish them God-speed.

3. Intemperance is an evil of the first magnitude.

(a) It injuriously affects the physical life of the individual and the race.

(b) It injures still more moral and spiritual life; it blunts the moral sense; destroys mutual faith and confidence, and breaks the strongest ties of social life.

(c) It disturbs economic conditions, sapping those principles of integrity and economy which are the motive and governing forces in production. It causes waste, decreases productive power, produces poverty and crime, and is a great hindrance to national advancement.

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4. The Temperance question has just now added importance, owing to the fact that the definite issue of the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic is shortly to be submitted to the Dominion electorate.

5. We are of the opinion that the legal prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, is an end highly desirable; also, that such legal prohibition must be associated with and supported by an educated and organized public sentiment to secure its permanence and strict enforcement.

6. We are of the opinion that the proposed Dominion plebiscite should be fairly presented to the electorate with full and definite information as to any financial burden it may entail. At the same time we are of the opinion that the extinction of the liquor traffic would so tend to increase general prosperity and augment other sources of revenue that the financial loss and the difficulty of providing for the same would only be temporary; that the country will be better able to bear the burdens of public expenditure without than with the liquor traffic; that all temperance people should be quite willing to bear their fair proportion of such temporary burden of taxation as the changed conditions may necessitate; that there are many sources of revenue available to the Government over which such temporary loss may be distributed, and that there is no necessity of raising such deficiency in any particularly obnoxious way. And as many citizens of the country are strongly opposed to direct taxation, we feel that there would be no necessity of raising any considerable proportion of such deficiency in that way, and consequently no necessity of coupling the issue of direct taxation with that of prohibition; and that the coupling of these issues upon a ballot, as has been suggested by some, would tend to unfairly prejudice the vote on the prohibition question.

7. We cannot too strongly urge upon the members of the Conference and other temperance workers, the necessity at the same time with unabated, yea, increased, vigor to work upon the old line of appealing to the individual conscience, the encouragement of coluntary abstinence, and the continual education of public sentiment.

8. We also appreciate the need of thorough organization of the temperance sentiment that is in the country for definite and progressive temperance work. Among other things (a) To secure a favorable vote on the plebiscite; (b) To take advantage of all existing laws to prevent the issue of new licenses; (c) To do personal temperance work on voluntary lines; (d) To secure if possible the establishment of thoroughly good and reliable temperance hotels.

9. We recommend that a copy of this report be forwarded to the Dominion Government, respectfully asking for the reasons herein set forth that the question of direct taxation be not attached to the plebiscite to be submitted on the prohibition of the liquor traffic.

10. Your Committee recommend that the Revs. D. N. McCamus and C. W. Watch, and Messrs. R. J. McLaughlin and W. W. Meacham, M.P.P., be appointed delegates from this Conference to the Dominion Alliance.

Your Committee further recommend the following: We heartily accept the suggestion of the W.C.T.U. of Ontario, and recommend that

the last Sabbath in November be set apart as Temperance Sunday throughout the Bay of Quinte Conference.

Moved by Rev. W. J. Crothers, M. A., D.D., seconded by Rev. W. J. Jolliffe, B.C.L., and carried, that this Conference has heard with profound satisfaction the address of the delegates of the W.C.T.U. We beg to assure them of our hearty esteem, and are proud to recognize them as most earnest allies in the cause of moral reform.

#### REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

We are pleased to report progress in every department and almost every feature of the Epworth League work during the past year.

The number of societies within the bounds of the Conference has increased from 275 to 305; the membership from 11,313 to 11,978; increase, 665. The amount raised for all purposes aggregates \$1,580.32, an advance of \$52.93 over last year. The contributions to missions amount this year to \$1,084.12, being an increase of \$318.42. When, however, we consider that the givings of the various districts range all the way from \$10.42 to \$236.33, there is obvious room for improvement in many districts in missionary givings. We regret to note in passing that the Conference Treasurer is compelled to report a decrease in the contributions to the General Board. The information comes to us from the General Secretary that the total receipts in behalf of this Fund are likely to be considerably behind last year. We recommend that special stress be laid on this Fund during the coming year.

The Junior League is steadily growing in numbers and influence. Seventeen new Leagues and an increase of 548 members are reported this

year.

We find, however, that the total of sixty-five Junior Leagues is a poor showing for this Conference. There is much room for development here. It is impossible to overestimate the value and possibilities of Junior work. Rich mines of religious life and power lie undeveloped in this interesting

but by far too much neglected work.

We recommend strongly the use of membership transference cards provided by our Book Room in transferring members from one society to another. We also continue to recommend that every League should be careful to forward, also through its corresponding secretary, in case of removal, a proper communication to the League to which such a one removes. This is necessary as a safeguard against any member being allowed to drift away.

The interest in the Literary Department is, we think, gaining ground. Our young people need to read more. They should be encouraged and urged to pursue a profitable course of reading, and this is admirably

provided by the General Board from year to year.

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Side by side with intellectual growth let there be a development of spiritual power. The great need of to-day is pre-eminently an increase in spiritual life. The culmination of intellectual and spiritual force will ever prove the mightiest lever to lift men from sin to holiness.

We wish to lay special emphasis upon the importance of the Forward Missionary movement. We are glad that many districts are already organized for this work. Arrangements are already made by many districts to have representatives of our colleges visit every circuit during the summer, and have adopted as their goal the support of at least one missionary in the foreign field. We urge that every District become at once organized for the attainment of their goal, always remembering that the prerogatives of selecting both the men and the fields, as well as the handling of all the funds, rests with the General Board of Missions, and that all funds should pass to the General Treasurer through the regular officers of the Church.

We note with pleasure that the Leagues upon the Cobourg District have, during the past year, raised \$236.33 toward the support of Dr. Smith in China, largely as a result of the two-cent-a-week plan. Their plan of giving and their splendid enthusiasm are worthy of your heartiest commendation, and we believe that by the adoption of this system of giving at least two cents a week by our societies, not only will better result in missionary giving, be at present realized, but an education will be given our young people of to-day, the results of which the future alone can reveal.

The Leagues of the Conference have made a noble response to the appeals in behalf of the India Famine Fund. Their liberality in this matter is especially to be commended.

This promises to be a red-letter year in the history of the Canadian League, as for the first time the International Convention is to be held on Canadian soil, and Toronto will be, for the time being, the Mecca of the Epworth League movement on this continent. The proximity of this Conference to the seat of this mighty gathering should place it within the reach of all who are interested in this work, and prove an untold stimulus to every department of Christian science within the bounds of our Conference for many years to come.

We further recommend that Rev. W. G. Clarke, B.A., be appointed Secretary-Treasurer of the Conference Epworth League Fund for the ensuing year.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee on the State of the Work beg leave to report as follows:

We have reviewed the work throughout the Conference and find reasons for thanksgivings and for searchings of the heart.

Thanksgiving.—1. That the great Head of the Church has so blessed the labors of His servants, that after all deductions are made we are able to report a net increase in membership of 485.

2. That notwithstanding the financial depression existing in the country, there is a substantial increase in the income of the General and Woman's Missionary societies, aggregating \$818.00.

3. That the Epworth League department of church work is reported to be in a healthy condition, and there is progress in literary culture, in spirituality and in missionary zeal.

Regret.—Because the apparent success is so small considering the numerous agencies and agents employed, their results are inadequate. We submit that there ought to be a larger ingathering from our Sabbath Schools. Our connexional funds should be more liberally sustained. Our church paper should have a much wider circulation, our social means of grace ought to be more largely attended. Felt responsibility and loyalty to all the interests of the Church are essential to success.

We urge more conscientious attention to family religion, Bible study, Sabbath observance, and liberal systematic giving, whole hearted consecration to God for service, a more direct aim in seeking the salvation of souls and unwavering trust in the power of the Holy Ghost with secure success

#### REPORT OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:

National aspiration for purer and higher virtue recognizes the sanctity of the Sabbath as a powerful and indispensable agency working toward the end in view. The Christian's supreme and decisive reason for keeping the day holy and excluding from it worldly pursuits and pleasures is obedience to the Divine will, with confidence in the higher wisdom of thought, will and commands of God. It follows that we should point out to the people that the sacred observance of the Sabbath is not to be made conditional on the vote of any people or corporation. The first day of the week is of the same length as any other day in the week. The entire day is separated and holy to the Lord. Sabbath visiting is an insidious entrance of the spirit of stealing from God, for the world and self, the day which we formally profess to hold hely to the Lord. Let such be avoided and discountenanced.

We rejoice that so many dealers in milk supply find it quite possible and suitable to have no milk delivered between Saturday evening and Monday morning. Let us not fail to urge the duty on this matter where it has not been attained. Let us point out to our people the essential Sabbath breaking of very late purchasing and selling, or other business. transactions on Saturday night, with a view to gain the lost rest by

taking it largely from the approaching Lord's Day.

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siness<sup>.</sup> st by Excursions started on Saturday with the purpose of embracing Sunday, and perhaps with the proclamation that the excursionists can go to church at some point on the route, should be warned against as a delusive robbing of God, and violating the sacredness of the Sabbath, and dissipating the life of the people.

The Grimsby Park, being generally regarded as a child of our Methodist Church, and its management, as an expression of the standard of religion and morality, which the Methodist Church sanctions and sets up as exemplary, we feel it our duty to urge upon the management of that association a more complete and particular inspection of all the internal operations appointed or permitted on the Lord's Day.

We rejoice that a regard to the sacred rest of the Lord's Day has secured a refusal to any landing of attempted steamboat excursions to the park on that holy day, and that the management has taken a step in the direction of discouraging other Sabbath excursions to the park by determining to discontinue the attractions of procuring and advertising specially popular and paying orators for the Lord's Day religious services.

A great deal can be done toward avoiding the evils of Sunday funerals by our ministers calling the attention of our people to the duty of subordinating all private and family conveniences to the great overruling duty and privilege regarding the entire Sabbath Day as holy to the Lord for the purposes of public and private worship of God.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE CONTINGENT FUND.

#### NAME.

1. This Fund shall be called the Contingent Fund of the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church.

#### ORTECT

2. The objects of this Fund shall be, (1st) To pay all contingent expenses in connection with the working of Conference and its committees; (2nd) To defray extraordinary expenses incurred in the service of the Church; (3rd) To relieve cases of special affliction. All applications for expenses incurred in the general work or for claims not otherwise specified, shall be submitted to the Committee in detail for their investigation and approval.

# Sources of Income.

3. The sources of income shall be, (1st) A collection to be taken up on all the Circuits in the month of September in each year; (2nd) The public collections taken up at each Annual Conference; (3rd) Such amount as may be appropriated by the Billeting Fund Committee.

#### COMMITTEE.

4. The Conference shall elect seven ministers and seven laymen who shall compose the Contingent Fund Committee of this Conference.

(1) It shall be the duty of the Committee to consider all claims properly presented to it, and recommend appropriation to their proper objects, and report all their proceedings to the Conference;

(2) This Committee shall meet at the seat of Conference and appoint a chairman and secretary-treasurer from among themselves, and also two

auditors, subject to the approval of Conference;

(3) It shall be the duty of the secretary-treasurer to keep a book in which he shall record the proceedings of all the meetings of the Committee, and the chairman of the Committee shall sign all orders upon the secretary-treasurer which have been authorized by the Committee;

(4) It shall be the duty of the secretary-treasurer to receive all moneys raised for this Fund from the financial secretaries of the Districts, and make such disbursements as have been authorized by the Committee;

(5) It shall be the duty of the auditors to examine the accounts of the secretary-treasurer annually, and present their report to the Committee.

## REGULATIONS.

5. The superintendents of circuits shall remit to the financial secretaries of the Districts only all collections taken up on behalf of this Fund.

6. The financial secretaries shall pay over the money of this Fund to the secretary-treasurer not later than the day before the meeting of Conference.

7. All applications for grants from this Fund shall be presented to the Committee by the chairman of the District from which the claim is made, or by such other person as he may appoint to represent his District.

8. No application for aid from this Fund shall be entertained which has not passed the Quarterly Board and been recommended by the District Meeting in the bounds of which the application has been made.

9. No application shall be entertained for medical expenses where the Circuit has paid the minister a salary of \$700 and upwards, except in special cases when pressing necessities would warrant special appropriations.

10. Ordinary expenses for physicians' bills shall not be entertained.

11. The maximum amount allowed for funeral expenses shall be for the minister or his wife \$40, for children \$20.

12. The Secretary of Conference for each year shall order the necessary

supplies for his successor in office.

13. In the matter of claims for ministerial supply on account of affliction or death, in no case shall the Committee consider any claims for more than the salary of a single, unordained man.

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# SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending July 31st, 1896.

A reduction of 6 per cent. on all claims has been found necessary in view of the prospective deficiency growing out of the largely increased number of ministerial claimants.

Notwithstanding this, the balance against the Annual Fund at the beginning of the year has been increased from \$7,221.62 to \$11,930.

The receipts from Circuits are \$9,326.16 less, and from ministers \$10.979.35 more than last year.

Unforeseen expenditure over the estimates on claims, refunds, interest on last year's balance, and over-drafts of \$2,146, and shortage in estimated receipts of \$2,208, together amount to \$4,354.

The contributions to capital account this year amount to \$5,180.

The Board regrets that notwithstanding an increase of \$2,535 in the annual income, and a discount of 6 per cent. in the payment of annuities, there is for the current year a deficit of \$4,709. This is partially accounted for by the large number of ministers and probationers (mostly probationers) who, on the 31st of July, had failed to pay their annual subscriptions. The Board looks to the chairmen of Districts and to the Conference Treasurers to correct this growing neglect of Discipline.

The most serious feature in the Report is the abnormal increase in the number of ministerial claimants. In two years past the annuity claims have increased by \$10,000, and for the current year over \$4,000, rendering necessary a painful reduction of 10 per cent. in the payment of annuities.

The Board is helpless to control the number of ministers placed on the Fund, and appeals to the Annual Conferences to check the ruinous policy of receiving more probationers than are needed to fill vacancies by death and superannuation and the actual growth of our work, which policy inevitably throws many older men prematurely on the Fund.

Rev. Principal Shaw, D.D, LL.D., lectures in Systematic Theology, Greek Testament and Church Polity; Rev. J. C. Antiff, M.A., (Edin.) D.D., in Apologetics and Homiletics; and Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., B.D., Bursar, in Church History and English. Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., having completed a Post-Graduate Course in Oriental Literature, in Leyden and Heidelberg, will resume his work in that department, as well as in Latin Patristics, next session.

The College is prepared to afford students facilities for meeting the Conference requirements in the new course for probationers or for pursuing the three years' course leading to licentiate's standing, or the University course in Arts in McGill, or the higher course in divinity leading to the degree of B.D. Copies of calendar containing full informa-

tion as to curricula, etc., may be obtained from the registrar.

The Endowment Fund is now \$75,000, current expenditure about \$6,500, total debt on current account (only liability) is \$4,000. The boarding department covers its need with the income of about \$4,000. The need is urgent for enlargement of buildings, for increased accommodation in dormitories, lecture rooms and convocation hall.

The effort of the Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, to further increase the Endowment Fund, is being continued, and all its proceeds are sacredly placed in new investments. In the meantime the institution is conducted with rigid economy in finances, and with regard to thoroughness and efficiency in educational work.

# REPORT OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

To the President and members of the Bay of Quinte Conference.

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—I have much pleasure, on behalf of the Regents and Senate of your University, in submitting to you the follow-

ing-report of our work during the year just closing :

Our net enrolment of students has reached the number of 282, an increase of 29 on last year. This enrolment has been distributed as follows: Arts, 226; Theology, 158; less counted in both faculties, 102; net enrolment, 282. Of this number 34 are completing the B.A. course, and 24 have completed one of the three prescribed curricula in theology. Of these 13, or more than one-half, have already graduated, or are proceeding to graduation in Arts as well as in Theology. We are thus, we believe, securing to our rising ministry an intellectual training not

inferior to

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inferior to that required by any other branch of the Christian Church in our country.

We are able also to report that the work of our theological school is extending itself quite beyond the training of candidates for our ministry. Probably nearly one-third of the candidates enrolled this year are not specifically preparing for that work. Quite a number are deaconesses seeking a thorough training in religious knowledge to prepare them for the work to which they have consecrated their lives. Others are young men, and even more largely young women, supplementing their Arts course by Biblical and other Christian studies which will fit them for the most intelligent Christian work in the days to come. These studies embrace the wide range of the English Bible, Biblical History, the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, Church History, Christian Ethics, Apologetics and Theistic Philosophy. The selection of these studies is optional, so that no candidate for an Arts degree is forced to take them. But as a matter of fact, the greater part of our graduates in Arts pursue these studies for either one or both the years in which they are pre-In this way our curriculum under Federation is quite as distinctly marked by the impress of Christian teaching as it was when we formed it independently.

A marked feature of the religious side of student life during the past year has been the growth of the missionary spirit. Organized bands of young men have gone out through our young people's societies, and have organized them in connection with our own missionary work. In this way, we believe, not only is Methodism strengthened, but valuable energy and zeal are directed to the largest results which might otherwise be largely frittered away in mere individual efforts.

The important subject of a refined Christian home for our young women students has been taken up by an organization of Christian women, who will ask your sympathy and assistance in this important work, and this we are sure they will abundantly receive.

We will venture once more to ask your co-operation in directing all our young people who are seeking a university education to our own college. There are still strong influences used to divert them in other directions. We have watched the course of those who have been so led, and have found that they are often diverted from the Church in which they first found spiritual life, or else decline in that life and step aside from their original Christian consecration. We feel certain we can offer them every advantage to be had in any other college in our country and combined with moral and religious influences which will make them strong in spiritual as well as intellectual life.

1st. That in the rule of God over His ancient people, the withholding from Him of the due proportion of income was visited with the loss of His favor and of His blessing, therefore it is to be inferred that He does now withhold His favor and His blessing for like cause, seeing that His general principles of government change not, and that the converse of this is equally clear, namely, that the offering of the due proportion of income secured His favor and His blessing, and that therefore, if His people now give to His cause as He prospers them, His favor and His blessing will rest upon them. Resolved,—That, in the opinion of this Conference, the time is come when a systematic effort should be put forth by the entire Church to awaken and deepen a sense of duty in the minds of all in regard to the

# REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE ONTARIO LADIES COLLEGE AND CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC.

To the Methodist Conference:

We, the directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, take pleasure, in presenting to this Conference our twenty-third annual report.

Notwithstanding the continued commercial depression, the attendance has been very gratifying, there having been 110 boarders and fifteen day pupils. This success is the legitimate outcome of faithful and well-directed effort. For many years it has been our aim as Directors to provide the highest educational facilities, and the most comfortable and

culturing surroundings.

The financial aid recently furnished by the friends of the College has enabled us to realize our ideal in buildings and equipment, and has given a wonderful stimulus to all departments of our college work. The Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, when visiting our College at commencement, was delighted with what he saw, and said that the most effective way of advertising, so far as our College was concerned, was to have the people of this country come and see it for themselves, and go forth intelligent as well as enthusiastic advocates of its real merit. Stronger language than we would like to use in this report is being used almost every day by visitors, to express their appreciation of the beautiful and extensive buildings, the chaste and elegant appointments, and the magnificent equipment for first-class educational work. It should be, and undoubtedly is, a source of pride and pleasure to the Methodist Church to have under its control such a grand college property with its ever-increasing possibilities for good.

We are deeply grateful to the friends of higher education who have aided in our scheme of extension and improvement; and we sincerely hope that others in the near future may be disposed to give us still more

extended aid.

Respecting the literary status of our College, and class of work being done by our students, we take pleasure in quoting from letters recently received from Chancellor Burwash, of Victoria University, and President Loudon, of Toronto University.

Dr. Burwash says:

"I have pleasure in stating that no less than nine students have entered Victoria and Toronto universities from the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby. The majority of these have taken the first two years of their university work at Whitby, coming up for their examinations to Toronto, and passing with credit. Three of these have already graduated with

honors, as at present two other city when university standing receive expressions.

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honors, and are a credit to the Ontario Ladies' College. Four others are at present doing excellent work as undergraduates in the University, and two others have been transferred to another Canadian university in the city where their parents reside. Any college carrying students up to university studies, and placing them in a position to obtain advanced standing at the University examinations, deserves great praise, and should receive every possible encouragement in its important work."

President Loudon says:

"When visiting your College in June last year for the first time, I was agreeably surprised at the extent and excellence of your building and equipment, which should, I think, afford every accommodation for physical comfort and health of students. I have observed also with pleasure the creditable stand taken at the University examinations during the past few years by several students who had prepared the work of the first and second years of the Arts course in the Ontario Ladies' College. Without entering into detail, I may say that these candidates have mostly taken honor standing in modern languages, and that their success affords testimony to the efficiency of the instruction imparted by your staff."

It is due our College to draw the attention of this Conference to the fact that no other ladies' college in Canada has been able to make a

similar University record.

Our Conservatory of Music affords the best facil ties for the study of piano, pipe organ, viòlin, guitar, voice-culture and harmony. No expense has been spared in providing concert-grand pianos, comfortable practice rooms, etc.; but the most important provision is a large two-manual pipe organ, recently erected in the new concert hall. This organ has been specially designed to meet the wants of students desirous of fitting themselves to become church organists. Considering the great demand at the present day for competent lady organists, and the difficulty usually experienced in obtaining practice on a suitable instrument in a wellwarmed hall, we take pleasure in referring to our superior facilities for organ practice, and trust that they may prove advantageous to many an aspiring student.

Time will not permit us to refer specially in this report to the Fine Art, Elecution, Commercial and Domestic Economy departments, except to state that they are just as thorough and efficient as the departments that have been referred to. Thanking the members of this Conference for the kind co-operation and support in the past, and trusting to prove worthy of the same in the future, we commend our College to the favor-

able consideration of all.

# ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR BRETHREN,—We are able to report another year of prosperity in connection with this institution. The health-of the students has been exceptionally good; in fact, we have not had a single case of serious

illness during the year, for which we are profoundly grateful.

One hundred and ninety students have been enrolled; all of the departments have been well attended, and the work has been conducted with vigor and a good degree of satisfaction. The College still continues to achieve most gratifying success with its departmental and university candidates. There can be no question that the literary work of the College is unsurpassed by that of any collegiate institute in the Province. Of six candidates for Senior Leaving teachers' certificates, five have been successful. This year the Senior Leaving class numbers eight, and is the largest in the history of the College. At the Departmental examination in July last, 80 per cent. of the candidates for teachers' certificates were successful. We invite the attention of friends of the College to this record. You cannot err in sending your sons and daughters to Albert College for this work. The classes for Junior and Senior Matriculation still continue to be large. Candidates for the Methodist ministry receive special attention. The special examination in May will be continued.

The Departments of Music, Elocution, Fine Arts and Commercial Science have been well attended, and have been successful during the year. By frequently winning medals, prizes and distinctions in competition with other schools and colleges, these departments have taken a first place. The aim is to keep them thoroughly efficient and at the same time maintain moderate rates. It is doubtful if any college in Canada offers equal advantages with Albert College at equally low rates.

The new building, "Massey Hall," the gymnasium, and the improvements to the residence are the great pride and delight of the students and teachers. The College is now able to provide for the comfort and

convenience of students as it has never before been able to do.

The students have been active in all religious work, both in the college and the city missions. Everywhere their zeal and devotion is spoken of. The missionary societies have been progressive and fully alive to every opportunity for good. 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#### ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS, ONT.

To the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—Alma College offers the annual greeting for the sixteenth year since its founding as a Methodist school for the higher education of young women. By the act of Union, 1884, the College came in as the property of the Methodist Church, and now is

completely controlled by the General Conference of the Church.

Alma College, in the spirit of Wesley, makes the world its parish. Students from Alma are in mission work in Africa, China, Japan, India and America, and more are preparing to go. This interest in missions is but one manifestation of religious life. It is never forgotten that the greatest mission is the making of cultured Christian homes in our own land and the practising of Christian virtue everywhere. Alma College is Methodist, yet enjoys the high honor of having usually one-half its patronage from other churches. No denominational meddlesomeness interferes with the church preferences of its students; the aim is to foster a love of truth in whatever form held.

The College is a gift of the people to woman's education. In thousands of subscriptions, the largest not exceeding \$500, the people have given over \$63,000 to this enterprise. The Methodist Church has undertaken to administer this generous liberality. Alma College is indeed the voice of the people, asking that the best facilities for woman's education be available equally to the daughter of the mansion and the daughter of the cottage. High scholarship, Christian kindness and social energy command the patronage of the wealthy, and low rates encourage the struggling to try to rise to better things. It is therefore possible to bring in touch and sympathy in college life the best minds and purest hearts from all spheres of life. This was the high ideal of the founders of this College.

In founding this institution they had at first to depend on the small

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contributions of the many less wealthy, but the plea of Alma has touched the kind heart of one man of wealth, and is the beneficiary to the extent of \$10,000 in the princely benevolence of the late Hart. A. Massey. And Alma expects that in answer to the faith and sacrifice of the people other men of wealth will be moved to place at the disposal of the Church the means to enable Alma yet to realize the original intent, that the College buildings and equipment should be a free gift to the cause of woman's There is a sphere of education which the State cannot fill, and that is a residential school-life incorporating the idea of church, home, and school, blended in one organization. This sphere the Church must fill in order to permanency, and to the development of the generous liberality essential to so great a cause. The Protestant churches have a very plain duty in this most important matter. Alma College is fully on the line of the traditional policy of the Church declared in the Discipline to be: That the best interests of the Church and of education imperatively demand that our colleges and universities should be under the fostering care of the Church.

In reviewing the work of the College for the past year, we most gratefully record the goodness of God in His providential care of our students and teachers. No serious illness or contagious disease has visited us. While the number of our students and the receipts of the past year cannot be placed among our best, it has its record of successful work and some

encouraging features to record.

The total enrolment, 10 in excess of last year, is 134 students, of whom 91 have been resident, and 43 day pupils. This enrolment represents the Christian denominations as follows: Methodist 70, Presbyterian 27, Episcopalian 16, Baptist 12, Roman Catholic 7, Congregational 23. Twenty students have been enrolled from the neighboring Republic.

The class preparing for graduation this year numbers thirteen, repre-

senting all departments.

The work of soliciting subscriptions has been greatly hindered by the financial stringency of the times, yet additions have been made to the subscription list, and very encouraging pledges of financial aid have been given by men of wealth.

The school is in a condition for effective work in all its departments, and is unsurpassed in its arrangements for the comfort, convenience, progress and health of its students. We are persuaded that no school in the Dominion can offer better advantages and at lower rates in the way of a

liberal education for young women.

A rearrangement of the loan upon the college property has been effected at a lower rate of interest, resulting in an annual saving of nearly \$400. The Board is using most careful economy in order to the reduction of the debt, but must also carefully guard the comfort of the students and the

efficiency of the school.

We would most respectfully urge the members of the Conference, lay and clerical, to aid the work of the school by personal interest and cooperation. By sending us timely information concerning prospective students, by bringing the claims of our Methodist institutions frequently before the people, and in a variety of ways, ministers and laymen can greatly aid the College.

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In conclusion, we beg to thank the Conference for excellent appointments made in preceding years to our Board of Management, and to ask that a Conference representative be selected for the current year.

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# PASTORAL ADDRESS.

Dearly Beloved,—Grace, mercy and peace be multiplied to both you and yours. The Conference this year in Bowmanville was one of much mutual edification and spiritual profit. While the most zealous scrutiny entered into every detail of the numerous interests of the Church, and the freest expression of opinion exercised, the kindliest spirit prevailed and nothing occurred to interrupt the good understanding we believe to exist among the laity and ministers within the bounds of the Conference. The numerical increase, after making up all losses by deaths and removals, is 485. While it is a matter of gratitude to Almighty God that we have not to report a decrease, yet the smallness of the increase should lead to much searching of heart and grave questionings as to whether the time has not come for a general presentation of ourselves to renewed consecration and mighty wrestling in prayer in order to bring again a wave of salvation over these lands.

The General Missionary and Woman's Auxiliary reports show encouraging increases, and indicate the steady growth of the missionary spirit throughout the connexion.

Our Sunday Schools and young people's societies we regard as among the most helpful agencies in the Church, and would affectionately recommend that every effort be put forth to commit all our children and youth at the earliest moment to Christ and association in class-meeting in some form, so as to be kept from drifting into the great ungodliness all about us.

The Superannuation Fund we find to be more and more commending itself to the judgment and generosity of our people. Those who have come to understand its constitution and workings have the most confidence in its management and sympathy with its claims. From time to time our noble laymen are leaving legacies in their wills to increase the invested capital, the interest of which goes to pay the necessities of the annuitants. The Book Room has increased its annual grant this year to \$9,000. Our aged ministers are disappearing from service here. Let us cheer their fleeting moments at the eventide.

The publishing interests, which are giving such handsome profits to the connexion year by year, and which command the attention and support of the community beyond the bounds of the denomination, deserve the support of every loyal Methodist. The Christian Guardian, Mayazine, Sunday School and young people's periodicals are, by common consent, for richness, purity, variety, adaptation and reasonable cheapness, unsurpassed in the language.

Our Educational Society is vigorously to the front. The age is calling loudly for an intelligent, up-to-date and well-equipped ministry, and one of the remarkable characteristics of recent years is that our colleges are not only schools furnishing every facility for higher education, but have been centres of strong spiritual power and pure morality, and one where scores of our youth are being turned into the channel of a decided Christian life.

This Church continues to speak out in unmistakable tones against Sabbath desecration, gambling, lotteries, greed of gain, questionable company, and the drinking habit, and counsels all our people to be definite in their attitude against the vices society reprehends, and stand out clear and strong on the side of the great Temperance issues approaching.

Dearly beloved, hold fast to the beginnings of the faith which is in Christ. Keep the holy fire burning at the family altar. Daily hold the household by the open Bible and the cross of Jesus. Let your constant attendance at the sanctuary be a protest against those who forsake the assembling of themselves together in public worship. Live your best and give your best while the sacrifice is possible to you. We recogn nize your past liberality, and ask that it may still abound; our ministry separated from secular things must be lifted above care, and that the connexional schemes started by our self-sacrificing fathers, and which have so signally succeeded, advance to richer results; and in the service of love we are assured that you will be in all your own economies and experiences material gainers. We notice the tendency in our churches to bring up their local claims by free-will offerings. We believe this method of raising money for the Lord to be most scriptural and satisfactory. We have not been insensible or indifferent to the financial trials that have come upon you in recent years, or been forgetful of the losses you have sustained by bereavements in your families, but you have been comforted by the assurance that the cause you have dearly loved has carried your friends through the last analysis, and placed them in glory at Jesus'

May we hope that the higher-life religion planted by our fathers along these shores may still increase in beauty and in force. May we ever live in the atmosphere of perpetual kindness, walking with Christ in white while on earth, living so that we may leave our successors an ecclesiasticism sublime in simplicity, pure in integrity and rich in increases, and go home to our ancestors triumphant in the joy that we have not been entrusted with these responsibilities in vain. We pray for you that all prosperity may attend you in this life, and that we may meet you sanctified and saved in the "general assembly and Church of the first-born whose names are written in heaven," and in the company of all the beautiful and immortal brotherhood who have believed in the forgiveness of sins, the communion of saints, the resurrection of the dead and the life everlasting.
