FOURTIETH ANNUAL REPORT.

YOUR HONOR,

Dear Friends,—Once more we are assembled to hear a brief report and to bear record of the Fourtieth Annual Meeting of this Home.

Thus the years roll on, each numbering itself among the links of time, which form the chain of the past. As we bid adieu to 1895-6, we welcome in 1896-7 in affording us new opportunities for comforting the unfortunate and ameliorating the sorrows of the poor.

We have in residence 100 children: 79 were admitted during the year, and 76 discharged. Of these discharged, 10 were sent to homes under Indenture and 3 to places under wages. This latter class still remain wards of the Home, requiring much careful management. The majority have been claimed by parents, and from this statement you will see that one of the aims of this institution is the maintaining of the family circle, the non-separation of parents and children in so far as the child's welfare is involved. If the dark days of trouble and misfortune come to a household, that burden is much easier borne if the children can be provided for, and removed from the temptation and evil ways of the street. These parents are encouraged to assist towards their children's support and to retain their interest in them. If business improves or a situation procured, which will enable them to gather their loved one again round their "ain fireside," they gladly come, and with grateful hearts relieve us of the responsibility. We rejoice that this Home has been the medium to save and protect the children for these happy reunions.

During the year we have had much cause for thankfulness. The health of the children has been exceptionally good, having had only *one* case of scarlatina which was immediately removed to the Isolation

Hospital, and has since recovered; and a few minor cases which received the prompt attention of the medical staff, to whom our grateful thanks are due for services rendered. We associate with this staff

Dr. Adams, who has most kindly and gratuitously attended all to the dental needs of thirty children.

We are encouraged in our work by the knowledge that many of our girls are filling places of trust. The demand for them far exceeds the supply. The majority of applications come from farming districts and small towns, where help seems difficult to be procured; but the greater number of our children are too young for the duties required of them.

The yearly fees to be paid into the Home for our girls (and which they receive on attaining their majority) are rarely a barrier to their being indentured. The conscientious applicant considers that the money paid into the Home is like having a bank account to which the yearly savings are added, that are to provide for future emergencies.

With much prayerful consideration, the management have felt the necessity of making a rule whereby the *nursery* children may be adopted. Our charter gives the power to adopt, but it was found and proved that in the taking of girls, our idea of adoption and that of the applicant was entirely different, so that the indenture plan was carried out as a safeguard to the child. But where a home is waiting to be brightened by the prattle of a three or four year old child, we are going to try to bring sunshine there from our nursery from among the children who are orphans, or the parent will give consent to the transfer. Every precaution will be taken, references to the moral standing of the applicant will be investigated, to secure as far as possible, the best homes for our dependent little ones.

The religious education of the older girls still continues under the faithful weekly teaching of our respected friends, the Ven. Archdeacon Boddy and the Rev. Arthur Baldwin. Misses Elliot, Geikie, Shortreed,

Ellis and the Misses Hood have charge of the Sunday School. These workers never seem to weary in teaching the children Bible lessons, leading their thoughts to noble resolves, and a higher plane of service.

The educational classes are still under the tuition of the Misses McKee and McMaster. We thank the School Board for recognizing our need of teachers and providing us with those who are so thoroughly qualified for the work.

The industrial and serving classes give evidences of painstaking on the part of the teacher as well as pupil; having made 174 garments, and 218 buttonholes, besides repairing quilts and darning stockings. Some of the older children assist in the laundry, turning and folding the clothes; others ironing. There are others who help the cook in her duties. All have some light duty assigned to them, making the Home a busy bee-hive, all of which tend to better prepare them for their future life work.

The daily routine workings of the Home have been steady going. At all times we have found cleanliness, order and a happy good-will reigning everywhere. We feel that this is due to the daily good management of our worthy Matron, Mrs. Bright, who with her excellent assistants, Mrs. Bowers and Miss McMillan, never cease in their watchfulness and guidance.

We have received many tokens of love and sympathy from old and new friends. We sincerely thank them all for their kind mindfulness of the Home. We would especially mention the pleasure the "four-in-hand" sleigh drive gave the children—their happy laughter, keeping time to the merry music of the bells and "floating like incense" on the frosty air. The "high tea" was another gala day, long to be remembered. This was the result of many days planning and sewing of six little girls, and a sale of pretty nick-nacks, the proceeds of which bought fruit, cake, candies, etc., with which the tables were laden, and then they as hostesses served the children. A bird whispered that these good little girls are preparing a *Xmas* surprise. The delights of the Balmly Beach picnic, and the Island treat, thoughtfully planned and managed by loving hands and kind hearts, were all thoroughly enjoyed by the

children. Punch and Judy were welcome visitors; the musical programme so kindly contributed by Dr. Geikie and his friend helped to enliven a winter's evening and was appreciated by their audience.

The Managers beg to acknowledge most thankfully the continued grants from the Government and from the City Council.

They are again indebted to Mr. Lee for his kindness in auditing the Treasurer's statement.

They owe grateful thanks to their solicitor, Mr. Neville, for valuable legal advice besides generously sending discharged account.

The Managers feel grateful to the Press of the City for courtesies received.

They also feel indebted to the proprietors of the "Pantech." for so generously loaning them lamps, china, etc., for use at their last Annual Meeting.

We have the memory of a sorrow in the death of our esteemed Honorary First Directress, Mrs. McCaul, who was one of the founders of this Home, and occupied the honorable position of First Directress for over thirty years. She has been called "higher" to receive the reward of one who, self-denying, did what she could for the Master.

This is the New Year for our Home, the season of gifts. From the days of paganism this happy custom of giving presents has been practised; we read of the Druids distributing branches of mistletoe, and of the Saxons giving away personal ornaments, but money giving is essentially English. In this fair Canada of ours, we seem to combine all the good customs of the past as our appended lists will testify. We feel a deep sense of gratitude that all our needs have been supplied, and we begin the year with a balance, owing to the liberality of those,

Who gave as the free air and sunshine are given,

Lavishly, lovingly, joyfully give.

Our earnest hope is, that as our collectors make their annual call, to gather the necessary means to carry on this philanthropic work, they will again meet with that sympathy and support which this charity

deserves. All service is the same with God, He would have us succeed, but He leaves much of the possibility in our own hands and hearts. Then let us a be faithful workers in the path of duty, and learn that nothing can be gained without some sacrifice.

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REPORT OF INDENTURE CHILDREN FOR 1896.

In addition to the thirty-five children mentioned in report for 1895 as indentured, we have this year placed out ten girls in homes where help was needed.

Three girls are receiving wages, two under my special guardianship, these being put to service in the city. Five have been returned to the Home, three of whom have again been indentured. Three having reached the age of eighteen have received the money invested for them, they are all doing well.

No person in future, need hesitate about taking a girl from our Home, some have feared that after years of care, the girl may be taken away when most useful, but this is now impossible, as I am happy to inform you the case in which we were engaged has been finally settled in our favor. The case was one where the Mother attempted to regain possession of the girl, whom she had allowed to be brought up by others, until she had become useful, and for the purpose of forcing us to take her from the lady to whom she was indentured, issued a writ against us, the case having been decided in our favor, she took the case to appeal, with a similar result, this therefore placed our Indentures on a firm basis. The health of the girls have been good, with one exception, and that one is now convalescent. I append letters from some of those, who have now passed out of our care, from these you will learn how much good this Home is doing in guarding the children abandoned to us until they are fitted to contend with the world and gain a living in a proper and respectable manner.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

Promptly at four o'clock, Friday, October 23rd, His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Kirkpatrick, Mrs. Kirkpatrick, Miss Law with Captain Law, as A.D.C., entered the "Girls' Home" to attend the 40th Annual Meeting of the Home. The children welcomed them by singing the National Anthem and a Hymn.

Autumn's lovely flower the Chrysanthemum was with ferns presented as a bouquet to Mrs. Kirkpatrick, while the gentlemen guests each wore one as a boutonniere.

His Honor occupied the chair. The meeting was formally opened, by an earnest prayer from Mr. J. K. MacDonald.

The Lieut-Governor, as Chairman, in his usual kind manner expressed the pleasure he always enjoyed in visiting the Girl's Home, and in concise sentences spoke of its lines and the good work it has and is accomplishing. He had one regret, and that was, this would be his last opportunity to accept the cordial invitation, so kind and so often extended to him, his hope was that his successor, would do far more than he had done to help in the cause of such a worthy institution.

The reading of the different reports followed, the adoption of which was moved by His Worship the Mayor, seconded by O. Howland, Esq., M.P.P., in earnest expressions of interest in the Home's welfare.

R. S. Baird, Esq., read the names of the Officers and Board of Management for the ensuing year. While confident that the old Management had done good work, he felt sure that the new Board would go on in increased usefulness; he also made kind allusion to Mrs. Duggan who was present, who had been on the Board of Management forty years ago, and was now on the Honorary Board.

Most interesting addresses were made by Mr. Edward Gurney, who emphasized the necessity of "Training," to enable girls to be independent, etc.

Mr. Massey who spoke of the diminution of crime, owing to the children being taken from such homes and trained to habits of endurance, etc.

Mr. J. K. McDonald, spoke of the noble work done in this and similar institutions for the uplifting of the poor, etc.

A vote of thanks was passed by Mr. Massie to His Honor for presiding, seconded by Mr. Gurney, who expressed the regrets of the Board that as Lieut-Governor, he would not occupy the chair next year, but their hope was that he and Mrs. Kirkpatrick would still feel that they would ever be welcome guests.

The meeting adjourned to witness the children enjoying a "Special Annual" Tea, after which the guests partook of a "Social Cup," bidding adieu, regretful of leaving so bright and happy a scene, but hoping to meet again next year.

The floral decorations in the Board and Tea Room, which were very effective, reflected great credit on those kind friends who donated the plants and flowers, and to the Committee who so successfully arranged them.

MEDICAL REPORT OF GIRLS' HOME.

To the Board of Management of the Girls Home.

Ladies,—The medical officers of the Home feel, in looking back over the past year, that the institution has been particularly blessed in the good health of its inmates. The cases of illness have not only been few in number but mild in character, and as was the case last year, there are no deaths to report.

Early in October last there was a slight outbreak of scarlet fever and four of the children were sent to the Isolation Hospital where all made good recoveries and no further cases followed.

At different times throughout the year several girls have had optithalmia and have been sent away for treatment, one going to the General and three to the Victoria Hospital. Besides these there were sent to the Victoria Hospital, Jessie Colquhoun with pneumonia and Mary Blackwell with carcis of the spine. The latter is still under treatment there and is the only one of the children who is at present ill.

We are glad to report that for the first time in years there is no ringworm in the Home. The last two cases returned from the General Hospital some months ago and though a constant look-out is kept by Mrs. Bright and her assistants there has as yet been no further manifestation of it. It is to this vigilance in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the children that we must attribute the uniform good health of the inmates, and we take pleasure in again returning thanks to these officers for the valuable assistance rendered throughout the year.

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CONSTITUTION OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. This Institution shall be called the "GIRLS' HOME," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral and temporal welfare; also the maintenance and support of girls from two to fourteen years of age.

2. Children are given out to parties furnishing suitable references, on payment of five dollars in advance and five dollars per annum till the child is fifteen, then ten, fifteen and twenty dollars for the next three years respectively; these sums, except the first, to be invested for the said child's benefit and given to her at the expiration of her term of service.

3. The management shall be trusted to a Committee of not more than forty-five ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected by ballot Directresses, Treasurer, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Superintendent of Districts. All vacancies shall be filled by ballot, on a majority vote at a monthly meeting after at least one week's notice. Should it happen at any meeting that no Directress be present, then the ladies in attendance, if sufficient to form a quorum, may elect some one of their number to take the chair, the lady so appointed to have, for the time being, the same authority in all respects as Directress.

4. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alteration must always be given to the Board, at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held every Tuesday, at 10.30 a.m., the first Tuesday in the month being the day of the Monthly Meeting, for which all important business shall be deferred. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.

2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer, and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present, which shall consist of five members at a Monthly and three at a Weekly Meeting, being conducted in the following order:

(1st.) The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed, or in case of a Monthly Meeting, all the meetings during the past month; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read the general Reports of the condition of the Institution.

(2nd.) The presiding lady shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and, if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as a member of the Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation not addressed to the presiding lady shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4. Any lady allowing three months to pass without being present, or notifying her inability to attend to the Secretary, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping account of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month.

6. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep account of all children given out from the Home, and correspond with them at least once a year, and shall keep account of and read all correspondence respecting them, at the Board Meetings.

7. The Secretary of Districts shall arrange with the collectors all details of the districts to be visited, and take charge of the lists of subscription in the Annual Report.

8. The Secretary shall direct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all the children in the Institution—giving a general report thereof at the Monthly Meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

9. Two members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the Regular Weekly Meetings. The 1st Directress, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, and Secretary shall not be of the number of Daily Visitors.

10. Any three Managers, including a Directress, may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with the doctor's certificate insuring them to be free from disease.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MATRON AND CHILDREN OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the girls between the ages of five and fourteen, in sewing, knitting and household work.

2. She shall admit any applicant not younger than two years, or older than fourteen, upon the doctor's certificate—subject always to the approval of the Board.

3. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be \$5 per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction may be made as approved by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.

4. The Matron shall daily inspect the cleanliness of the children, see that they attend the day school punctually and regularly, and every morning and evening conduct family prayers.

5. The children shall rise at 6 a.m. from May 1st to October 31st, and at 7 a.m. from November 1st to April 30th. The time for going to rest to be from 5 to 8 p.m.

Children under fourteen are not allowed to wash or scrub more than three hours a day.

6. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a.m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals by the elder children. The Matron and one servant to be present.

7. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday-School, and also Divine Service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron, or some other competent person, and in the afternoon attend the Sunday-school in the Institution.

8. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them on Wednesday afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock. Persons wishing to come on other days must obtain a permit from the Board.

9. The Home shall be open to the public any afternoon during the week

TERMS OF INDENTURE OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

Parties taking a child from the Home are required to provide the said child, during the whole period of service,—viz., till the child is eighteen years of age—with all necessary and proper food, clothing, lodgings, medicine and medical attendance, to bring her up in the principles of the Protestant religion, to pay due attention to her moral and spiritual culture, and to allow her to attend Sunday School and place of worship regularly, to instruct the child in reading, writing, and plain needle work, and in general household duties, to pay into the Home in advance, the sum of five dollars; and at the end of the first and each year of service until the child attains the age of fourteen, the sum of five dollars; when fifteen, ten dollars; when sixteen, fifteen dollars; when seventeen, twenty dollars; which money is invested by the Board for the child's benefit; and further, to provide the said child, at the expiration of her term of service with a good new suit of clothes. In case, through protracted illness or death, or any other cause, the parties fail to carry out their various obligations, the Home reserve to themselves the right of resuming their control over the child, or of taking such measures to secure her rights as may deem necessary.

In case the parties taking a child shall not be satisfied with her, they have the power of returning her to the Home, after satisfying the Board that such action would be to the interest of all concerned.
