One might be tempted to believe that of the double power to bind and to loose, our bishops now retain the first alone, such concord do they exhibit in condemning, repelling, execrating whatever the whole nation desires and is striving to obtain. Where fore this spectacle ? Are the Italians renouncing the doctrines of our orthodox faith ? No: on the contrary, they all revere that faith, and observe its rights in the most minute particulars. " In the opening part of his treatise Passaglia reminds the Bishops of the divine duties to which their mission is limited ; and he then goes on to prove, with a clearness, with a force of argument, with an array of patristic authorities, absolutely leaving no hope of reply, that the Roman Catho tensing no nope or reply, that the Roman Catho-lic Bishops, by their addresses, by their pastoral latters to the clergy and ther flocks respecting the temporal authority of the Popes, have betray-ed their duty, and have furnished the world an occasion of gross scandal. The preaching of the occasion of gross scandal. The preaching of the Gospel, the teaching of Christian morality, the inculcation and example of Christian love, these constitute the legitimate tasks of Bishops, mi-nisters of God; whatever goes beyond these is wrong. But to stir up by the deeds which we all deplore, especially during the last three years, war amongst Christians, to create deplorable and atrocious dissensions, to furnish the occasion of a religious schism which the Church must weep over to the end of time—this is a truly deplorable course of action, and one that can never be suffi-ciently condemned. M. M. No. XVIII. ANCIENT CHURCHES.

Many of the Churches in Rome are of great antiquity, though a large proportion of since their erection have been so changed in form and internal appearance as to lose the venerable aspect to which they are entitled. In very many instances modern taste has destroyed the simplicity of arrangement and ornament which once characterized theee structures-and given brllhant paintings, and glittering marbles for the more precious forms and hues which time only can produce or bequeath. The Basilicas of St. Giovanne, Laterani and Santa Maria Maggiore, though very ancient, are now remarkable rather for the richness and beauty imparted by modern wealth and genius than for that indescribable charm, which antiquity affords. The Churches S. S. Apostoli, Ara Coeli, S. Cecilia, S. Giorgia in Valabro, S. Giovanna, e. Paolo, S. Gre-gorio, S. Luca, S. Marcello, S. Marco, S Maria in Cosmedin, S. Maria in Trasterin Monti, S. Prictro in veri, S. Martino Vincoli, S. Prassede, S. Prisca, S. Pudenziana, are all very ancient, yet they have undergone so many changes that the visitor fails to discover in them any very striking marks of antiquity, and the visitor searches for them not as mementoes of an interesting period in the history of Chris-tianity but an tianity, but on account of the remarkable mosaics or paintings or statues with which the artist has adorned them.
