THE PAPAL AGGRESSION.
(From the Times.)

We hope the attention of the public will be given, more carefully than perhaps is usual to the intelligence now reported each morning from Ireland. There is nothing

more important to the safety of our country than the progress of the rebellion in Ireland.

There is every new character to the actors, or else to their party. These men are now organized under their priests; with the strown design of dictating to the imperial government. From the mere words little can be learned. Their city may be "sacred" to day, "blow" to-morrow, and "mete" the day after. They have not the solidity of mind or convictions required for any definite resolve, but they have cunning enough to discern when they have intimidated their adversary, and to push to the utmost its favored lea chance.

For ourselves, we say and stated reasons for confining at the titular positions of Papal bishops in Papal provinces, but that discussion has now been superseded by statute, and the only question is of law or rebellion. The law says one thing, the Catholic Defence Association says another.

It was far Englishmen to determine in which of these bands they desire the supreme authority to be lodged.

ANOTHER "EL DORADO."

The world started by a new announcement.

Very Rev. Piaget Hoboken, one of the most zealous priests who have recently promoted the Catholic Defence Association; the organ of the "Defenders," have far outstripped our conclusions by exaggerating in strains of triumphant hyperbole the penal character of their doings.

"They broke the law"—we transfer their announcement literally—"we transcribe their

unconventionalities, break it in the most public manner,

broke it on the most signal occasion, brook it in a way most calculated to excite the public animadversion of its authors, and so as to intimate an intention to break it hereafter, whenever they please, for all time to come."

This is the style of antagonism for which we are to prepare ourselves. It does not really mean that all proclaims, for to

say that it is extravagant is nothing more

than saying that it is Irish.

If an Irishman stole a sheep and believed himself beyond reach of the thief, he would spit the blood on his doorpost, stick a piece of

the wool in his hat, and announce himself ready to steal sheep and other like or

like practice for the term of his natural life.

The whole race is hyperbolically ridiculous

not from want of fear, but from want of

foresight. They run into danger as they

run into debt, and have no thought of either

the constable or the creditor till it knocks

at their door. If an Englishman or a

Scotsman so comport himself, we should

know that he had steadily resolved to defy

the worst, but with Irishman all this vapour-

would not stand in the way of recantation or denial the very next day. These same

men, who follow their priests to public offices as devoutly as to public worship, who gesticulate in ecstasy over the idea of systematic crime, and who invoke all the

powers of Heaven to witness the sinfulness of

their rebellion, are the most impudent

and the most impudent of all.
