by Natural History Society

At the regular meeting of the Natural History Society last night an interesting lecture was given by Gordon Leavitt, his subject being "Birds." Dr. G. U. Hay presided and there was a good attendance of. members. The chief business of the meeting was the receiving of the donations made to the museum.

Mr. Leavitt in his lecture gave a comprehensive review of the history of orhithology from its beginning among the Egyptians. He referred to the fact that the oldest pictures of which we have knowledge Todude among the designs carved on them the figures of birds. He then traced the gradual progress in ornithology between those earliest periods and the time of Pliny, the elder, and Aristotle, in whose age the science had reached a more advanced stage, although still very crude. Linneaus it was who first brought order out of chaos and evolved a sensible classification of our feathered friends.

The lecturer then dealt with the achievements of the past fifty years in ornithology in New Brunswick and gave his hearers many interesting facts concerning the different varieties found here. 

IMPRISONMENT FOR DEST.

The first step toward the abolition of imprisonment for debt in England was taken sixty-nine years ago today, when Fleet Prison, immortalized by Dickens and other writers, was abolished. For over two centuries this had been a debtors' prison. It was burned during the Gordon riots in 1780, but was rebuilt. The site is now occupied by a railway station.

The debtors, constantly growing fewer in number, were lodged in Queen's Street Prison until 1881, when imprisonment for debt, except when fraudulently contracted, was finally abolished. In eighteen months after the panic of 1825, over 100,000 English people were jailed for debt. In 1840 there were only 1,732 imprisoned debtors in England and Wales.

While imprisonment for debt has been abolished, imprisonment for court by reason of failure to pay debts is still continued in both England and the United States.



OUR FORM OF GOVERNMENT COMPARED WITH THE U.S.

Prof. Adam Shortt, Lecturing before Canadian Club, Show that Canada's Governmental System is Much Superior to that in Vogue Across the Border.

Before a small gathering of members of the Canadian Club, in Keith's assembly rooms, last evening, Prof. Adam Shortt of the Canadian Civil Service Commission, gave an interesting comparison of the Canadian and American forms of government, and traced their historical evolution. While they had a more or less common origin, he pointed out that the Canadian system, being a more natural evolution, was better adapted to modern conditions. The great virtue of the Canadian system was its definitive concentration of responsibility upon a cabinet responsible to the dominant party in parliament, and dependent upon having a majority in parliament and the country.

The weakness of the American system was the inability to fix responsibility, the president and his cabinet not being dependent upon a majority in either house. As there were a vast number of acts adopted at Washington and in the state legislatures which were never enforced, causing a general disrespect for law.

As compared with the acts passed in Canadian or British legislatures the volume of legislation in the States was very large; so much so that they had found it necessary in some states to only allow the legislatures to meet once in two years.


