## Haulan's Departure.

TORONTO, Ont., May 17.—A special cable to the *Mail* says: Haulan sailed from Liverpool at four o'clock Tuesday afternoon on the "City of Richmond." As usual, there was great enthusiasm, and a large number of friends and admirers, including the editor of the *Sportsman*, accompanied the champion on his last voyage, and with him till the last moment before saying good bye.

A number of excellent offers were made to Haulan to stay on the other side of the Atlantic. One of them was a proposition to him to stay and row exhibitions during an engagement of six months for which he was to receive \$5,000. Another and even more important one was an offer of \$5,000 a year for five years to stay and row champion races when required. Both offers were declined, but the champion intimated that he might return to England this year for a time. His movements have thrown in the shade even such celebrities as Laycock and Boyd, who are preparing for their coming encounter. The Australian is a slight favourite.

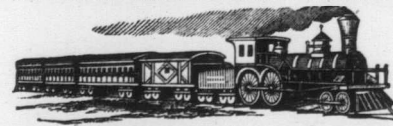
