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IN FAVOR OF CHURCH UNION

Joint Committees Report Adopted by Presbyterian Assembly by Vote of 184 to 73.

ASSEMBLY WORK

HALIFAX, June 8.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which has been in session in Halifax for five days, decided last evening by a vote of 184 to 73 in favor of union with the Methodist and Congregational churches. The resolution that was adopted was as follows:—

"The assembly declares its approval of the documents agreed upon by the joint committee as a basis upon which this church may unite with the Methodist and Congregational churches, and they direct that this resolution, along with the above mentioned documents, be transmitted to the Presbyteries for their judgment under the Bazaar act, instructing Presbytery clerks to report the decisions arrived at to the clerks of the general assembly not later than May 1, 1911.

"The assembly is of opinion that in the event of the returns from Presbyteries warranting further steps be taken in the direction of the union, the assembly of 1911 will proceed to consult sessions and congregations regarding the whole matter."

"This question has been under consideration for five years, and of the three churches, the supreme body of the Presbyterian church is the first to take action as far reaching as that agreed upon last night. The leader in the union movement is Principal Patrick, of Winnipeg, and the chief opponent is Principal McKay, of Vancouver. The assembly will meet in Ottawa next year, when it reports from Presbyteries on this subject will be submitted.

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ASSESSMENT NOT YET DEALT WITH BY TOWN COUNCIL.

Council Spends Tuesday Evening Transacting Business. Much Money Needed for Water and Sewerage Work.

THOSE DOG TAXES.

Town for the year assessment was made. Referred to assessment committee.

A number of petitions from residents on different streets asking for water and sewerage extensions were read and referred to the Water and Sewerage Committee.

A large signed petition from residents asking that the Moore Bros. warehouse on Mosley Street be removed and said street straightened and widened was read.

Coun. Richards said that the Public Property and Streets Committee had been after this for two years. Messrs. Moore Bros. asked \$1500 for the land. Coun. Miller said that Messrs. Moore Bros. wanted \$1500 for the land and the right to sit or seven feet of the present street along the side of their store. There was some difference of opinion as to the value of the property and nothing further had been done.

The matter was referred to the Public Property and Streets Committee. On recommendation of Police and License Committee various licenses were granted and accounts passed.

The Assessment Committee reported on the applications for reduction of taxes as follows:

You committee to whom are referred all matters relating to assessment and appeals respectfully submit that they have under consideration the application of Frank Blair, Joseph H. Sharpe, F. G. Kerr and Joseph Duncan for reduction in 1909 assessment and would recommend as follows:

That in the case of Frank S. Blair and F. S. Blair & Co., and Mrs. Murhead, no reduction be made.

That in the case of Joseph R. Sharpe no reduction be made.

That in the case of P. G. Kerr, the assessment of Miss Clara Kerr's real estate be reduced from \$7,000 to \$1,000. No reduction be made.

The report was received and adopted.

Several department reports with accounts were passed.

A general and informal discussion took place on the advisability of extending the water and sewerage systems in various sections of the town. The cost of these extensions would be very large and it was hardly fair to ask the ratepayers to pay the entire cost in one year. It would be necessary to issue bonds if this work was to be done.

Some time was spent in discussing the matter of dog tax collections. It appears that there are nearly one hundred dogs in town which pay no license and although the list has been handed to the magistrate, no further action has been taken and the magistrate was hauled over the coals for not attending to this part of his duties.

Coun. Mowat moved that the Clerk be authorized to write the Police Magistrate to collect the dog taxes and if he does not intend to do so to notify the council.

The council adjourned until Tuesday night next.

DRINK WAS AT BOTTOM OF IT

Dying Stabbed by Companion at Amherst.

MURDERER ARRESTED

AMHERST, N. S., June 8.—Drink was at the bottom of it all, was the dying statement made by his physician by George Davis, the young Englishman, who died from the effects of a stab from a butcher knife in the hands of a fellow boarder, named Harry Hanson, in a drunken row last Saturday evening. Davis lingered until noon yesterday, when he passed away, and an inquest was opened at 4 o'clock in the town hall yesterday afternoon, before Coroner Dr. C. McQueen Avari.

Mrs. Hiley, the proprietress of the boarding house, was the first witness. Her story was the same in substance as appeared in the report of Monday. She told how the men began quarrelling in the afternoon, were separated and how the row was renewed at the supper table. Davis said the back yard was the place to fight, and not in the house. They started for the door, but Hanson struck at Davis before they got to the kitchen and closed the door. Davis did not follow. Hanson caught up a butcher knife from the table and went into the dining room by another door. Witness called out that Hanson was coming with a knife. The next she saw was Davis lying on the floor with a wound in his breast, from which blood was flowing freely. Both men had been boarding with her about a month. They roomed together, both had been drinking.

Dr. Ross Miller was the next witness. He explained the nature of the wounds found on the body of the deceased. One cut was on the left arm and a staving wound in the chest about two inches wide had penetrated the chest cavity. Deceased was very weak from loss of blood, and his condition was such that it would not permit of the exploration of the depth of the wound. Several arteries were cut. Deceased had made a statement to him to the effect that he had no relatives in this country. His mother lived in England. He and Hanson had quarrelled in Joggins several weeks ago. He said Hanson was a bad devil, but he did not want him to suffer for anything he had done to him. Drink was at the bottom of it all.

Sam Bull, Roy McQuay, and Chas. Nolles were also called. They all admitted they were present at the row, but they were drunk and could give no connected story of the tragedy. Nolles and Bull swore they did not know Davis was stabbed until Sunday.

Chief Carter testified to the arrest of Hanson. He said that Hanson told him he had stabbed Davis and would kill another even if he had to hang for it.

The inquest adjourned at 1 o'clock this morning, and will be resumed this afternoon. In the meantime an autopsy will be made to determine the exact depth of the wound.

BOLD ATTEMPT TO HOLD UP TOWN

Former Secretary-Treasurer of Dalhousie Refuses to Deliver up Books and Papers to Successor.

NEW BOOK-KEEPING SYSTEM

The regular meeting of the Dalhousie Town Council was held last evening, those present being: Mayor Stewart, Aldermen G. E. Mercer, Scott, Barthe, Bateman, Jamieson and D. G. Stewart.

After the minutes of previous meetings had been read and approved, a communication was read from Mr. Burpee of the L. C. R. Moncton, relative to the crossing of the track in laying water pipes for watering stations at the Public Wharf. This matter is now in order. A letter was also read from Supt. Sparks of the N. B. Telephone Co., stating that the complaint of L. D. Jones would be attended to promptly and that the "offend-post" will be removed.

The Under Secretary of State informs the Council that the Department of Marine and Fisheries is in view of the fact that the granting of this favor to this particular district might result in a great deal of dissatisfaction in other parts of the Province, and that under these circumstances it would appear to be impossible to grant any extension at the present time. It is here worthy of note by those engaged in this industry that the Deputy Ministers recommends the use of "gill nets" which are permitted to be used for a much greater length of time than the big nets usually used here. Alderman Scott thought that the matter ought not to stop here and suggested that further pressure be brought to bear upon the authorities and the Clerk was instructed to keep the matter in hand and communicate further with an eye to the question of tap-waterage at the wharf, he had to refer the council to the Dept. of Marine and Fisheries, whose affairs this is. It was decided by the Council to take this matter up with the Marine Dept. and Clerk Macgoe was instructed accordingly.

Mr. Pugsley's communication also dealt with the matter of the recalculation of the ratepayers on the South side of William Street, that it would be impossible to take up this matter this year on account of the large quantity of other work in hand, and the roads and sidewalks requiring so much work to put them in proper shape. This report will no doubt be adversely criticized by many of those who signed the petition, but it would be well to bear in mind that this committee is greatly hampered in its ideas by the lack of funds, and whilst it is their desire to see this work carried out, they never,theless have to look to other parts of the town which are in more needy case than the petitioners.

Once more the question of the fate of Policeman Seely was taken up and discussed, being introduced by the recommendation of the Police Committee, that this officer be dismissed. A petition was read signed representatively, praying that the services of Officer Seely be retained, and the statement made by Alderman Stewart that this did not represent a majority of the ratepayers. It was not your correspondent has been informed by Mr. Seely, the intention of the petition that it should represent a majority, but he states that it is signed by a large majority of the business men of the town. This ought to be a matter of consideration. However it was decided that this question should be decided at the next meeting, at which time Mr. Seely was requested to produce a copy of the agreement made between himself and the Town at the time of his appointment. A notification of this question either one way or another would be quite a relief to all interested in town affairs.

The report of the Town Auditor was read and adopted, it being decided by the Council to get a new set of books, in consultation with the Auditor, the latter having advised the Council that the existing books were antiquated and had not been adapted to the correct and complete keeping of public accounts. There was a shortage of \$6.00 in the books which amount was deposited in the Royal Bank by ex-Treasurer LeBlanc, since the time of the audit.

Notice of addition to the Water by-laws was given by Ald. Stewart. This was in order that no difficulty should be met in the matter of Lavatory installations.

The request of James Arsenault that a landing from the road to the beach at Inch Arran point was referred to Roads and Streets Committee for report.

Several bills were passed for payment, including one for \$50.00 for the Assessor's services. In view of the fact that a statement was made some time ago that the accounts for expense in connection with the recent Local Option election, were payable by the town, it would be well to here make particular reference to the receipt by the Town Treasurer of a check covering all the expenses incurred in the running of this election. This was expensed by the Local Government, which is exactly according to the statements made by the supporters of the Local Option movement. Some of our citizens would, will to read marks, warn and inwardly digest the above facts.

Mayor Stewart stated that ex-Clerk and Treasurer LeBlanc had made him the statement that he would not give up the books, papers etc. of the town, until he had received back his bond, together with a full release of all responsibility in the matter of any default or error in these books which might subsequently occur, which request is a most extraordinary one. In fact one cannot recall any time or place where such a thing was ever done before. There is no solution of the business unless we state our position as follows:

DEATH TERMINATES A NOTABLE CAREER

Prof. Goldwin Smith, Passed Away at His Home in Toronto.

DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR.

TORONTO, June 8.—Goldwin Smith died at 2:30 yesterday afternoon.

About 3 o'clock the distinguished scholar was still showing slight signs of life. He had been unconscious for some time. Gathered at his bedside were Dr. Grassett, Goldwin Smith's physician; T. Arnold Hamilton, private secretary, and the butler, who had served in the household at the Grange for many years. The end came peacefully, though suddenly, and some time elapsed before the news went out from the death chamber, that Toronto had lost her greatest citizen. Goldwin Smith, last infirmity survivor in literature of the Victorian era.

His death was indirectly due to an accident. He slipped on the polished floor of his home in February last. First reports did not alarm the public. It was understood that while walking the hall Goldwin Smith had slipped and fallen, was badly shaken up and confined to his bed. An examination by Dr. F. Len Grassett revealed the fact that the right hip bone had been broken, a serious injury to a man of Goldwin Smith's age. Then it was announced that the surgeons attending on Dr. Smith had decided not to try to knit the two portions of the fractured thigh bone.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry, (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

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**BEAUTIFUL STORY
OF THE ROSARY**

The custom of using beads to keep
count of the number of prayers is said
to have had its origin in the East,
Homer. Each country in the Orient
claims the proud antiquity of having
originated the habit. It is of such an-
tiquity and so widely extended that
even archaeologists are not prepared
to say in what locality and at what
precise moment of time the act became
custom. This is certain, however,—
rosaries are used in nearly all religious
systems which attach more importance
to the repetitions than to the spiritu-
ality of prayers.

The Buddhist adaptation of beads
for this purpose, with the intention
that no prayer should be omitted, is
said to have been mentioned by St. Au-
gustine, A. D. 366. The name of the
"beads" or prayer should gradually
come to indicate the symbol is
very natural.

The Buddhist rosary used in China
is composed of 108 beads and is fre-
quently arranged in two rings. The
prayer there is "Omho Pait" the In-
finite Buddha. In Japan, "Naraku
amida Butsu"—"Honor to the Infinite
Buddha." Priests sit in the
temple and pound a wooden fish and
repeat this prayer from morning until
night. The wandering monks are of-
ten decorated with a variety of beads
made of jade and other precious ma-
terial which are works of art. At Ning
po the people spend whole days count-
ing their beads, say "Ma-mo-ne-
do-reh," which comes from the Indian
language. They believe they will ac-
quire merit for each repetition of this
prayer.

The Turkish rosary is called tespi,
and the faithful murmur the hundred
verses of Allah as they slip the beads
and become quite unconscious of the
things of this world. The hundred
beads are made of rose leaves pressed
together, or perhaps of sacred earth
from one of the three holy cities.

"St. Oulbert's beads" was the name
given to a chaplet of beads made from
the joints of the stems of cherries.
Monks in Corea wear a rosary of
red wooden beads polished like crys-
tal or celessus fingering. They wear
them either as necklaces or bracelets.
Pindora Petrie in his recent discov-
eries at Abydos has, among other
things, unearthed quantities of beads
of clay covered with blue enamel, or
opaline, amethyst, emerald and rock
crystal, all pierced for stringing. These
were used by the Pharaoh and his
court in whose tombs they were discov-
ered, and were for aught we know,
used as rosaries by the people of the
First Dynasty.

The "African" bead is looked upon by
the Africans with superstitious awe
and is held in as great reverence as
the rosary of other countries. It is a
curious bead, made of stone of green-
ish blue color, supposed to be a speck
of Jasper. Both men and women wear
necklaces of these beads wrought in a
variety of patterns. The necklaces
are long, reaching below the waist,
They also wear strings of beads
around the knee and wrist, and
kings are seen with fillets of them
around their temples. When they are
used as money, as they are sometimes,
they are cut in half for small transac-
tions, as coins are frequently in some
countries.

"Arges" beads are used for charms
in diviners and hundry ways. If the
successor to a property is a child his
family grind "arges" beads into pow-
der and rub him with it daily after the
bath, believing that it hastens his
growth and maturity.

DISCOVERING A THIEF
When anyone is suspected of a theft
an "arges" bead is placed in a small
vessel of water, and the person sus-
pected puts his right foot against the
leg of the accused, who invokes the
power of the bead to kill him if he
is guilty. His shirt takes it into his
mouth, with a little water, the feet be-
ing thrown on the ground. The belief
in the power of the stone is so great
that the guilty party generally confesses.

The Dalai Lama is said to possess
rosaries of very precious material, etc.

Indian Moslems use rosaries called
tasbeeh. They are furnished with tas-
beeh, called shama. The literal transla-
tion of the name is "muttering chap-
let" which seems very suitable, be-
cause by means of its beads the mut-
tering of a definite number of prayers
may be counted.

A rosary found by a traveller in India
is said to have been used by a wood-
rotter, suspended horizontally from
posts supporting a chain, which con-
sisted of fifteen rough balls, each as
big as a child's head. The working
devotees of India who have vowed to
lead a life of vagrancy frequently use
rosaries. Perhaps one of these rosaries
is to count the beads a certain num-
ber of times a day. The efficacy of
these prayers is supposed to depend
upon the dimensions.
