AIRSHIP ALL RIGHT.

London, April 18. - Latest among the "flying machines" to attract public attention is the navigable bal-loon, invented by M. Auguste Gan-dron, a model of which was exhibited recently in the Crystal Palace. balloon was sausage-shaped, 17 feet long, and 3 feet 9 inches in diameter. It was steered by a broad rudder and propelled by four two-bladed screws, one forward, one aft, and two side by side amidships. The car was in the middle and the baloon was steadied by a weight, which kept it on an even keel, and in a real balloon would serve the double purpose of moorings at sea, and holding the balloon to earth on land. # **ELECTION FIGURES**

Number of Votes Polled Creatly Increased and Fewer Spoiled Ballots.

Ottawa, April 17 .- The return of the crown in chancery with respect to the last general election has been prepared. The vote by provinces was: Ontario, 426,083; Quebec, 237,259; Nova Scotia, 107,836; New Brunswick, 68,340; Prince Edward Island, 21,129; Manitoba, 41,780; British Columbia, 26,-129; Northwest Territories, 23,618. This is a total of 952,496, compared with 835,600 votes cast in 1896.

The largest majority was that of the premier, in Quebec East, of 2,772, and the smallest, that of Mr. Mc-Neill, in North Bruce.

The number of rejected ballots was 7,718, compared with 13,871 in 1896. It is believed this is due to the change in the ballot, and that with the additional changes contemplated, in the number of spoiled ballots.

NEW LIGHT ON QUEEN VICTOR-IA'S REIGN



Ottawa, April 17.-The house spent the greater part of the day in discussing the transportation question, more especially as it is affected by the conditions of navigation of the St. Lawrence. Mr. Bickerdike (Montreal) presented the conclusions arrived at by the marine interests of Montreal after taking the evidence of captains of steamers plying to the port of Mon-treal last year. The conclusion drawn from the evidence was that the aids to navigation were antiquated and inefficient. The debate, which continued until midnight, developed the rivalry which existed between Montreal and Quebec. Mr. Brock insisted that the cheapest and nearest port, wherever it might be, should be the port for Can-adian trade, and opposed further expenditure on canals. The debate will be continued tomorrow







# The Milkmen's Appeal.

The dairymen in this vicinity have issued the following circular:

A number of capitalists are trying to control the milk supply of this city. They intend putting on the market a "Pasteurized milk," and no doubt will claim it is better than that which we are supplying to you. We intend remaining in the field, and in defense of our position quote the following from Dr. L. Emmett Holt, the best authority on healthy milk in New York City:

"Heating milk for purposes for sterilization is at present imperative in cities during the warm months, as ordinary milk is from twelve to thirtysix hours old when received, and from twenty-four to seventy-two hours old when it is consumed. In the country it is a safeguard to be used when doubt exists in regard to the health of the cows or the handling of the milk; but when clean milk can be ob tained fresh every morning from healthy cows it is unnecessary 'Sterilized' milk requires the same modification for infant feeding as plain milk. While I advise and constantly use milk which has been heated, my preference is strongly for that which is sufficiently pure, clean and fresh to render this unnecessary. I believe the direction in which we are to work is toward securing the greatest attention to the cows, the feeding of cows, and to the handling of the milk in order to prevent every possible contamination.


