Mr. Gladstone's Speech at Chester.

London, Jan. 23.—Mr. Gladstone, speaking at Chester yesterday, declined to criticize the course of Lord Salisbury in the dispute with Portugal until he is more fully informed as to the details of the case. He considered it a duty to avoid cavilling at the foreign policy of the Government. Turkey appeared again as inviting England to intervene to protect the suffering population of Crete and Armenia, but he warned the Sultan that England's reply would involve a reference to that mockery of justice, the trial of Moussa Bey, and the reply would be that he would not obtain British sympathy in times of trial and difficulty unless he governed with humanity and justice. Referring to the United States and the plans for an enlarged navy, Mr. Gladstone said the worst of it was that while America would cite England's example for enlarging her navy England will give a similar excuse for further naval expenditure. It is a matter of deep sorrow to reflect that the very ostentations addition to the defenses of a country made under a real or pretended necessity is made an apology for the increase of the burdens of every other country. Under profession of an additional security the policy of governments thus tended more and more to jeopardize the peace of the world. The country would be likely soon to hear much about the Parnell Commission. Mr. McCarthy introduced his bill to abolish the official use of the French lan-guage in the Northwest Territories. De-parting from the usual custom, he made quite a length speech on introducing the measure, and his speech was of a nature to cause considerable feeling among the French-Canadian members. The following is the text of Mr. McCarthy's bill:

Whereas it is expedient, in the interest of the national unity of the Dominion, that there should be community of language among the people of Canada, and that the enactment in the Northwest Territories Act allowing the use of the French languages should be expurged therefrom, therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of the Senate and House of Commons, enacts as follows:

act shall be printed in ooth those languages.

Mr. McCarthy proceeded to give the history of official French in Canada. There was not a word, from the time of the conquest till the union, giving authority for the use of the French as an official language in this country. Nothing could be gathered from the Br itish North America Act that the dual language was to be permitted in from the Br itish North America Act that the dual language was to be permitted in any other quarter of the Dominion. It was then clear that any legislative warrant for the use of dual languages was founded simply upon the will of Parlianent. He argued that the dual language system was inimical to

In view of the result, it is worth while to consider what this point was. At the previous election trial, Mr. Justice Street was the presiding judge, and to his attention was brought a novel set of affairs. The tion was brought a novel set of affairs. The Tory bosses of the county went into the box and swore that they had carried on the election without any regular organization. They had no division chairmen, no secre-taries, no election managers, no committees, no nothing. The inference was that they had purposely refrained from ap-pointing committees in order to prevent pointing committees in order to prevent the establishment of the agency of those guilty of corrupt acts. By this dodge, they were able to swear out of responsibil-ity for the corrupt practices established at the trial, as the judge in each case ruled against the appellant on the ground that the agency had not been shown. The case was carried to the Supreme Court, and Dr. Montague, the Tory respondent, was unseated, but the agency question was not raised. In the last contest, when the same candidates were brought forward, the Liberals borrowed a page from the Tory book of in-structions, and failed to appoint committees or to organize. When the case came for trial, it was proved that a man repre-senting himself as a friend of the Liberal senting himself as a friend of the Liberal candidate, though he was not known per-sonally to Mr. Colter, nor had he any authority from that gentleman or his legal agents to act for him, had paid the railway agents to act for him, had paid the railway fare of a voter who desired to leave the constituency on election day. Judge Falconbridge took a contrary view to that adopted by Judge Street, and ruled that, inasmuch as the respondent's friends had no regular organization for carrying on the

since last general election. The voters' lists have at length been revised, the bogus Tory votes which were found on the lists of 1885 cannot now be polled, and the Liberals assert that they have added 100 to their strength in the last revision. If this is Tory candidate, even with the as-sistance of sleight-of-hand manipulators of ballots at the polls, to prevent a Liberal triumph. It is a misfortune to the constituency that through the act of a mistaken, though zealous man, it is once more plunged into an election tussle. Of the result, there seems to be no doubt. Mr. Colter will keep the seat, unless the whole-sale ballot spoiler of Oneida is duplicated at the other polling places, and the Liberal scrutineers should be able to prevent that.

On the contrary, it had been put on record by the Tory leaders in the riding that neither Mr. Morgan nor any local man could hope to win the people over from Liberal prin-ciples. But Mr. Morgan was chosen as a makeshift, with the sole object of keeping Mr. Ross in his own constituency as much as possible when the campaign opens. The nomination had been offered to School inspector Hughes, of Toronto, but he refused it on the ground that he had lost all Equal Rights party.
