The Queen's Speech.

London, Aug. 19.—Parliament was prorogued yesterday. The Queen's speech says that the relations of her Majesty's Government with the iforeign powers continue to be pacific. Friendly attention has been called to the inconveniences which might arise from a possible conflict over territorial claims in Africa. Therefore the Queen's Government was negotiating with the powers mainly concerned with the purpose of defining the boundaries with which the action of the respective governments should be confined. The arrangements with Germany, closing the most difficult of the questions, was complete, and her Majesty's Ministers laid before Parliament the history of those negotiations which had resulted in the cession of Heligoland to Germany. The speech them announces the arrangement with France whereby the French Algerian territory is separated from that of the British Niger Company. The agreement for a British protectorate over Zanzibar and the placing of Madagascar under the rotection of the French is also explained. "We have got men enough, though they are green," said one of the yardmen, "and will put them to work if the strikers will let them do anything. The East Buffalo yards are full now, and what ever else comes has got to lie outside till we can make room for it."

The first consignment of live stock sent out over the Central to any but neighboring points since the inception of the strike was several cars of hogs loaded for New York yesterday afternoon. The hogs had been in the chutes since Friday. Dressed beef cars are crowded on East Buffalo sidings and some of the meat must be spoiled by the delay. The stockmen complain bitterly because thousands of dollars worth of stock cannot be sold because it can't be shipped. All competing roads have more than they can handle.

The strike has lasted eight weeks, at a loss of \$120,000 to the men. The firemen and engineers had been allowed to continus work until Friday night when they were ordered to quit. Once the pumps are idle the whole underground workways will quickly 'e flooded and the mine ruined.

My word is to all Sabbath school teachers, to all parents, to all christian-workers—Plow deep! Deep plowing for a crop. Deep plowing for a soul. Broken heart or no religion. Broken soul or no harvest.

But what means all this crooked plowing, these crooked furrows, the repentance that amounts to nothing? Men groan over their sins, but get no better. They weep, but their tears are not counted. They get convicted but not converted. What is the reason? I remember that on the farm we seat a standard with a red flag at the other end of the field. We plowed up to that. Losing sight of that we made a crooked furrow. Now, in the matter of conviction we must have some standard to guide us. It is a red standard that God has set at the other end of the field. It is the cross, plow up to the cross. Aim not at either end of the horizontal piece of the cross, but at the upright piece, at the center of it, the heart of the Son of God who bore your sins and made satisfaction. Crying and weeping will not bring you through. "Him hath God exalted to be a Prince and a Saviour to give repentance." Oh, plow app to the cross!




