WOMEN IN THE CAMPAIGN.

The Pail Mail Gazette devotes an article to the immense indirect power wielded by women in British politics. As a woman's political organization, the Primrose League stands foremost in the world. It numbers 1,655,703, nearly half of whom are women. There are 1,400 women on the Women's Grand Council, and about 54,000 Primrose "dames" in England and Scotland. They do not speak much on platforms, as in the heat of elections they are liable to insult, as in the case of Mrs. Stanley at North Lambeth. Canvassing, talking with wives, asking them about their homes, interesting themselves in the children, solving political difficulties as they present themselves to the minds of the husbands, and, in a word, using their personal influence, are the means employed by the women.

The Women's Liberal Federation is the great counterpoise to the Primrose League. They are not quite so harmonious a body as they were before Mr. Gladstone pronounced against woman suffrage. The methods they adopt are exactly the same as those of the Primrose League. They are careful not to do anything which can even be associated with bribery. Any gifts they may have been accustomed to bestow in a private capacity are not allowed to be continued while the ladies are engaged in political work.

The results of to-day's elections were highly encouraging to the Liberal cause.
The agricultural voters continued to show the utmost indifference for the feelings of the nobility and gentry. The most notable instance of the kind recorded to-day was the defeat of Viscount Weymouth, Lord Thomas Henry Thynne, eldest son of the Marquis of Bath. For over three centuries the Thynne family have lorded it over a large domain in Wilts and Somerset. It was only in late years that their absolutism began to be questioned, and now at length Hodge has actually rejected a Thynne for a comparatively obscure plebeian named Barlow. This is one of several notices served within a few days on the Conservatives that the country voters no longer ecognize the lords and squires as having a

prior claim on seats in Parliament.

There is now no longer any doubt of Mr. Gladstone's success through a combination of the Liberals and the Irish and the Irish Nationalists. It is to be remembered, however, that 136 constituencies remain to be heard from in the course of the next few days, the number of members being 670, of whom 534 have been elected and the returns reported. The remainder may have surprises in store for both parties.

A Boat Filled With Pleasure-Seekers Capsized.

Ten Persons Known to be Drowned-Many Small Boats With Their

Many Small Boats With Their Occupiants Missing.

Peoria, Ill., July 13.—Peoria Lake was last evening the scene of shorrible catastrophe. A cyolone struck it about 10:30 p.m., and capsized the Frankie Folsom, an excursion steamer, with a party from Pekin. There were about 40 persons on board. All but eighteen of them have been accounted for. It is believed that these are dead. It is positively known that fully a dozen perished. No one scaped from the cabin. Almost every rowboat on the lake was out at the time of the storm, and it is feared that many Peorians have gone down.

MORE BODIES RECOVERED.

Up to 2 colock this morning nine bodies had been recovered from the wreck of the Frankie Folsom, and the search continues. The list of casualties so far is as follows: Mrs. Frank Fisher and daughter Cora, Mrs. Henry Durdicker, John Ahrends, Miss Corey, Mrs. M. Wiles, Maud Ford and two unidentified, one a man and the other a woman. It is believed six more bodies will be found. Capt. It is said the accident was caused by the pilot becoming seared when the storm struck them. Had he kept the boat headed for the Willows, on the apposite bank, there would have been no danger of it capsizing. His description of the scene is realistic. When the storm struck the boat there was the wildest scene imaginable. Men and women haddled to the side from the shore, and when the boat careened over many wereswept off. The vessel settled rapidly to the bottom of the river, and every gust of the tornade would sweep some poor unfortunate off into the waves. The wind was blowing directly off shore, but the screams of the women and the hoarse shouts of the men could be heard above the fury of the terrible storm.

When the storm broke the lake and river were filled with boats of every description. There are over 200 pleasure boats at the yards, and this morning only 96 of them had been accounted for.

Serious Epidemic of the Disease in victorie, B. C.—Forty-Seven Cases and Five Doaths.

TACOMA, Wash, Jály 13.—Victoria officials admit that at present there are 47 cases of smallpox in that city, but it is thought that the number of victims is much greater. All Sound ports, including Tacoma, Seattle, Fair Haven and Port Townsend, yesterday established stringent quarantine regulations against Victoria and Vancouer, which latter place is the terminus of the Canadian Pacific.

Last night six cases were reported at Whatcom, on Bellingham Bay, they being the first oates so far announced at a United States port. Six cases were also reported last night at Seattle, but this is denied by health officers of that city.

The Postoffice of Cyrus.

Harper's Young People tells us where and by whom the postoffice was invented:

The invention of the postoffice is ascribed to Cyrus, king of Persia, who lived about 600 B. C. Cyrus required all of his governors of provinces to write to him exact accounts of everything that occurred in their several districts and armies. The Persian Empire was of vast extent, and some means had to be provided to render that correspondence sure and expeditious. Cyrus therefore caused postoffices to be built and messengers appointed in every province. He found how far a good horse, with an experienced rider, could travel in a day without being hurt, and then had stables built in proportion, at equal distances from each other. At each of these places he also appointed postmasters, whose duty it was to receive the letters, from the couriers as they arrived, and give them to others, and to give fresh horses in exchange for those that had performed their part of the journey. Thus the post went continually night and day, rain or snow, heat or cold, and Cyrus received speedy news of all occurrences, and sent back whatever orders he considered necessary. Darius, the last king of the Ancient Persians, was superintendent of them before he came to the throne.

To ripen the cream place it all in one vessel 20 to 24 hours before the time when you intend to churn, and warm up the fresh cream to between 60 and 70 degrees F. It depends on the season of the year; not so high in summer; the kind of cream; challow pans, deep pans or centrifugal; shellow pans do not require as high a temperature; the age of the cream—the fresher the cream—the higher it has to be raised. It is a question for the exercise of judgment. Let the cream stand at the temperature to which it is has been raised, or it may be gradually to cooled down to the churning temperature to be ready for churning in the 20 or 24 hours. 

WEALTH IN GREAT BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES.

The Census Office at Washington has completed a provisional estimate of the wealth of the United States, and the New York Sun makes an interesting comparison between it and the statistics of British progress compiled by Mr. Giffen, the English statistician. If the same correction factor is applied to the returns for 1890, the true value of all property represented in the census of the United States will be not \$24,651,000,000, as reported, but \$63.648,-

In the absence of exhaustive data, for the purpose of comparison it may be assumed that \$63,648,000,000 represents the aggregate wealth of the United States. Now in 1885 Mr. Giffen entered into an elaborate series of calculations, in pursu-ance of which he fixed the wealth of the ance of which he fixed the wealth of the United Kingdom at \$50,000,000,000, all railways and every other species of property being included. It follows that of the two countries the United States is the richer by more than \$13,000,000,000. That for the last ten years the Government of Canada has been sustained and its party majorities secured by a system of organized fraut; that the public funds have been systematically used in subsidizing railways, erecting public buildings and other public works, not with reference solely to the needs of the country, but to promote the interests of the party in power; that in return for legislative and departmental favors conferred at the public expense, railway promoters, manufacturers and contractors have contributed large sums of money which have been used by the Government or its agents in bribing electors; that the constituencies have been outrageously 'gerrymandered' for the purpose of creating artificial Government majorities; that a Franchise Act has been passed and manipulated for the same purpose; that investigations demanded by the Opposition for the purpose of unveiling specific cases of corruption have been returned aside by ineffective substitutes; and that, as a result of the peraisent and systematic use of these and similar corrupt methods, the public conscience has become so deadened and debauched that the clearest evidence of the grossest corruption no longer avails to arouse popular indignation."

It is now reported that the union men have taken Van Delashnutt, of Portland, William Sweeney and other mine owners, and will hold them as hostages until the trouble is settled.
