Girl, Escaping From Room in Nurse's Absence, Seized Hose as Weapon.

INQUEST STARTS TONIGHT

Crown Action Depends on Its Findings and on Medical Board's Report.

A young woman patient at the London Rospital for the Insane, while unfering from delusions Thresday night, assaulted and killed Mrs. Mead, Lakeside, another patient. Coroner Maclaren was notified and will hold an inquest at the institution at 7 o'clock tonight. The remains will be viewed, but no evidence will be taken. The hearing will be adjourned until some day next week.

Escaped While Nurse Away.

The young woman who caused Mrs. The young woman who caused Mrs Mead's death has not been at the asylum for many months. She has been Mead's death has not been at the asylum for many months. She has been under the delusion that Mrs. Mead was an enemy of hers. The latter had never in any way injured her, but the girl in her insanity thought so. Shortly after 10 o'clock last evening she was restless, and the nurse in charge decided to go to the diet kitchen and get her something to eat before she went to sleep. She left, and while she was gone the girl slipped out into the corridor, and, selzing a hose nozzle, struck Mrs. Mead over the head.

Two other nurses were in their office just off the room, and hearing the noise rushed into the room and overpowered the girl. The third nurse returned and the alarm was given. Dr. W. J. Robinson and the staff rushed to the corridors, and Mrs. Mead was removed to the hospital ward. She lived until 1 o'clock this morning, never gaining consciousness. Concussion of the brain was the cause.

Not Responsible, Says Doctor.

"The young woman has been with us afrout four months," said Dr. Robinson.



National Organization and Economy Could Save Sum Large Enough to Feed Million Soldiers for Year.

Ottawa, Sept. 21.-The enormous wastage in food throughout the Dominion is indicated in statistics compiled by the food controller. It is estimated that, owing to carelessness and inefficiency, there is wasted in garbage every year food to the value of \$56,000,000, or about \$7 per head of the total population. By complete national organization and rigid economy it is thought the cost of living can be reduced by five cents per day for each individual. Counting in the elimination of garbage waste this would mean an annual saving of \$25.55 per head, or a national grand total saving of \$204,400,000, enough to feed an army of one million men for a year. The estimated preventable waste in garbage alone is more than sufficient to feed all Canada's soldiers overseas. HAIG'S WIN ANSWERS FOE

Germany "Feeling" for Peace, But British Keep Right On Fighting.

Montreal Sept. 20 .- A special cable from London says: Mr. Asquith has returned from visit to the western front, where he has been the guest of Sir Douglas Haig, and will on Wednesday next speak at Leeds at a meeting arranged the war aims committee, of which by the war aims committee, of which the late premier, together with the present prime minister, Lloyd George, are presidents. Asquith's speech is looked forward to by the whole country. The necessity of an authoritative and indisputable lead for public opinion here at this particular juncture is everywhere recognized, for a small peace-at-any-price party is getting a more sympathetic hearing in various parts of the country than it has received in the past. A counter-propaganda, which as yet has not attained the dimensions of that which it designs to offset, has been begun by the war aims committee.

New Line East of Ypres Is Considerably Expanded During Night By Haig, Who Has Little Trouble In Driving Off Germans-Australian Banner Now Floats Above Many Strongholds.

British Front in France and Belgium, Sept. 21-(By the Associated Press).—During the night the British forces, with comparatively little opposition, consolidated and considerable improved the new line which they had won in their offensive against the Germans to the east of Ypres. Today, from the newly-acquired enemy stronghold known as Anzac, southwest of Zonnebeke, flutters the Australian Janner, a symbol of the greatest victory which has marked British operations in the western theatre in the past year, not excluding that at Messines.

Southwest of Gheluvelt, the Germans still are holding a position which the British desired, and today at 9:30 o'clock Field Marshal Haig began a local attack here.

GERMAN CASUALTIES ARE GREAT

British offensive on the Belgian front, to the east of Ypres, yesterday, when the British troops pushed through the German lines for a distance of more than a mile, says that the completeness of the British success is confirmed by detailed accounts of the battle. BAKER DECLARES CORNMEAL FLOUR UNFIT FOR FOOD

Says Its Heating Qualities Affect Brain.

PROHIBITED IN ENGLAND

Against Law to Use It in Manufacture of Bread There, Declares Head of Firm



GOVT. REGULATION

Hanover People Refused to Put Up Supplies of Fruit.

TORONTO, Sept. 20.—Because they had heard that the food controller had ordered the confiscation of all canned fruit and vegetables over 50 pint jars per family, the people of Hanover, Ont., have refused to do any canning under any circumstances. One of the citizens wired Dr. A. H. Abbott, secretary of the organization of resources committee, asking for confirmation or denial of the rumor. Dr. Abbott wired back that while the order-in-council of August 24 prohibited the sale and purchase of certain canned vegetables there had never been any suggestion of confiscation, the idea being to compel the use of fresh vegetables. The regulation does not affect the use of privately canned goods.





The recipes for Apple Tapioca Pudding, Escalloped Potatoes and Bran Gems, mentioned above, are as follows:

(Wheat and meat saving recipes by Domestic Science Experts of the Canadian Food Controller's Office). Apple Tapioca Pudding— 34 cup pearl or 1/2 cup minute

Soak the tapioca an hour, and cook it in a double boiler. Pare and slice the apples and arrange in a buttered pudding dish. Add the sugar, pour over the tapioca and bake in a moderate oven until the apples are soft. Serve with sugar and cream. Minute tapioca requires no soaking.

Butter a baking dish well. Put in a layer of potatoes, sliced thinly. Sprinkle with salt, and pepper, and dredge with flour. Repeat. Add milk until it may be seen through the top layer. Add bits of butter. Bake in the oven until the potato is soft.





"WILL YOU HAVE IT SENT?"

Because you answer "Yes" to the foregoing question, even when the smallest purchase is involved, you are guilty of helping to keep up that "Cost of Living," which is grinding down others, if not yourself, with worry about making ends meet, while supplying the absolute necessities.

Having your parcels sent means delivery charges. "Oh," you object, "the grocer or the butcher or baker or the fruit man or drygoods man, has delivery vagons anyway. What difference does it make?" Your orders to "Have it sent," when combined with other orders in suffi-

cient number, involve in time an extra delivery wagon or car, and up go the delivery? Perhaps YOU can, but what about those other people just a block or so away? They aren't as fortunately situated as you are. They have a much

larger family, and the pennies count up till they don't know where it is going to stop, those extra pennies for which you are in a measure responsible, because you WILL insist on having everything sent home. To prove that delivery charges really DO make a difference in price of commodities: In Boston, Detroit, Newark and Montclair, there are "two-priced stores," and it isn't anything against them. The principle on which they are run is simply this: Two prices are displayed on each commodity offered for sale, one price, two or three cents less than the other. The purchaser who buys a

pound of butter, pays cash for it and carries it home, gets it for two or three cents a pound less than her neighbor who orders it over the telephone, charges it, and has it sent, or the neighbor who picks it out herself but charges it and orders it to be delivered. A prominent London woman who, notwithstanding ample means of her own, has been giving much attention to cost of living problems, told of a chain of stores established in an American city, where all business is done on a cash basis. The owner has no telephones in his places of business, hence no telephone charges. He makes no arrangements for delivering goods, so patrons must carry home their own parcels. He gives the customers the benefit of what

to solve the high cost of living problem The woman who related this incident says: "My grocer invariably asks "Shall I send these parcels?" I invariably answer, I am going home and will take them myself, or I will call for them later. I don't in the least mind carrying bundles or being seen with them. It is time for the general good that

"FAGAN'S FOLLY."

The story of how the little white hearse is being routed in Jersey City has been told by Honore Willsie in a recent number of a well-known magazine. It is the story of what is known as "Fagan's Folly." Fagan, by the way, is one of those Irishmen, tenement-born and bred, who by reason of sheer ability has become the chief executive of a big city. Mayor Fagan happens to be an undertaker, and one winter day when he was quite a young fellow he was taking an inventory in the undertaking establishment. Standing on a step-ladder, dusting off the babies' coffins, he said to himself, "Now, I'll have to be ordering the usual three hundred extra little white coffins for our summer Of a sudden a thought struck him so hard that he sat down on the top of the step-ladder and stared at the baby coffins on hand with a lump in his throat.

"Now, why," he asked himself, "should so many more babies die in sum mer than in winter? By Jove, I'm going to find out why. And when I find out, I'll try to put OUR OWN LITTLE WHITE HEARSE OUT OF BUSINESS." Pretty altruistic, wasn't it, for an undertaker?

This undertaker achieved a prominent place in civic affairs. He at last had the honor of being made mayor of Jersey City. The resolution formed that day on the step-ladder with a row of baby cof-

fins staring him in the face, led to a little clinic in a small room in a public bath-house in a tenement district. He put in a bit of his own money and got a bit here and there until he established in that room one of the best baby opened wide to rich and poor alike. The foreign-speaking woman comes with her baby and a child of school age

for interpreter. The woman of wealth rolls up in her limousine to get the help for her little one which is free to all babies. Because they do not accept fees the woman of wealth donates a layette for some poor baby or helps in some

And what has been the result of all this trouble and expense "just for One of the little white hearses in the neighborhood has gone out of busi-

ness. On the list of the babies under the care of the clinic are no less than three thousand. THE SUMMER OF 1916, THE YEAR OF THE BIG INFAN-TILE PARALYSIS EPIDEMIC IN THAT PART OF THE UNITED STATES. NOT ONE OF THESE BABIES TOOK INFANTILE PARALYSIS.

Down in the children's sun room at Victoria Hospital a few weeks ago, group of children played gleefully the never out-of-date game of horse. Three small laddies were mettlesome steeds, driven by a beautiful boy of perhaps seven years old. "I want you to notice that oldest boy who is driving," said the guide, as the handsome, manly little fellow looked up with a smile of greeting. Even by throwing bimself about quickly on the floor, it was all the driver could do to keep pace with his lively small horses. His fine head was well set on a pair of sturdy shoulders, his arms strong. To his knees he was an unusually well developed boy. Below that, his limbs were useless stumps. "Infantile paralysis when he was a little bit of a chap," explained the guide. "The doctors have been hoping to strengthen up his legs and develop them so he could walk on them, but they have just about given it up as hopeless. Jack is very patient and makes the most of life, but it is sometimes hard to answer him when he asks when he is going to be able to walk. Now, he is going to have a wheeled chair on which he can go out on the street. He is taking a good deal of pleasure out of anticipating that. Though he hasn't said so, I think he understands now and is making the best of it."

Is it any wonder that infantile paralysis is dreaded? And wasn't it a wonderful thing to save three thousand babies from the plague in Jersey City the year that scores were going down before the foe over in New York and in other cities, or being left alive but sadly maimed?

FAGAN'S DREAM.

Mayor Fagan hasn't finished up his war on the little white hearse in Jerse, City with the establishment of one small baby's welfare clinic. Fagan is one of those rare civic officials with real big vision, which extends beyond laying of pavements to the people who walk on them, to the welfare of the citizens that are to be. He has dreamed a big dream, and its practical value has been already in a measure realized. This is Fagan's dream:
"I want Jersey City to have the greatest baby clinic in the world. I want

the babies of Jersey City to have care long before they're born, and until at six they enter school, there to go under the most rigid school medical inspection. And I want this not for my tenement folk alone. I want it for EVERY BABY in Jersey City, rich or poor, without regard to race, creed or color. I want the best-trained baby specialists in the world to be on the payroll of Jersey City. I want every precinct to have its clinic. And I want it made compulsory for every father and mother to report to their precinct clinic the prospective coming of their baby. And when this is reported, whether it be rich Mrs. Jones or poor Mrs. Smith, prospective mother automatically goes under the care of one of the finest baby specialists in the world, there to remain till the child is six years old."

Now, what do you think of a mayor like Fagan, willing to spend the city's good money like that, and for what? Why, just to save human lives. Commenting upon the dreams and efforts of Mayor Fagan in the way of child conservation, Honore Willsie says, "Never in the history of America have we had such pressing need of Fagan's Follies. Peace is hard on little babies. War is many times harder. Birth-rates decrease. In previous great wars, nations have acknowledged this and done nothing. But in England today a gigantic effort is being made to conserve the babies. There has been a babies' revolution in England. And when the final dreadful toll of the dead and maimed in the trenches is taken, on the other side of the balance sheet will be found a list of baby lives saved, that but for the war would have been sacrificed to ignorance or poverty. What greater thing could be done to wipe the blood stains from Is it worth while trying to do something in London? No not merely "trying," but actually "DOING?"

HONEY OR JAM?

Dear Miss Armstrong,-In view of the present shortage of so many fruits sually used for the manufacture of jam, both of the home-made and "canning factory" types, can you give me or have some of your readers tell, the relative

I have been told that honey, even at the present higher prices, which dealers and apiarists declare is due to the short spring season and the consequent reduction in the production of honey, is a much more economical "sweet" to rve with bread and butter than jam. I have also been told that five pounds of honey will go as far in the average household as eight pounds of jam. Can anyone tell me if this is true?

I might say that I have never used honey to any great extent, but this year my neighbors are storing it away in 25, 30 and 50-pound lots, and in some cases even more. I don't want to be left behind in the food conservation race, nor do I want to neglect anything that might tend to keep down the present high cost of living, but I want to know something about the question before I lay

in any great stock. Another thing you might answer, if you will, and that is, does honey affect children? Can they be given too much of it? I know that it has medicinal qualities, and that it is used for colds and in some cough mixtures, but can "Medicus" tell me if it is possible to use too much of this? Yours,







Practical Housekeeping

How to Care for Food

A food may contain sufficient nourishment to give it high value as a food and yet if proper care is not taken of it the food may become unfit for consump-

Foods may be divided into three classes: Those that spoil easily; those that do not spoil so easily; those that may be kept a long time with proper care.

The foods that spoil easily are milk, cream, uncooked meat, uncooked fish, certain fruits, such as peaches and plums, and vegetables that wilt easily, such as lettuce and spinach.

Milk and Cream-Milk and cream bottles are usually dirty on the outside when delivered to you. Wash them carefully, particularly the top of the bottle, before opening, so that no dirt can possibly get into the milk or cream.

Uncooked Meat - Do not keep your meat in the paper in which it is wrapped when bought.

Unwrap it as soon as you get it home and wipe it off with a clean cloth that has been wrung out in cold water. The meat will keep better and the juices will remain in it longer, if you will wrap it in wax paper until you are ready to use it.

Uncooked Fish-Never put uncooked fish into the ice-box unless the fish is closely covered. You will find a tin lard pail useful for this purpose. If the fish is not covered other food in the ice-box will absorb the strong odor from it and be made unfit

Fruits-All fruits should be kept in a cool, dry place, and spread out, if possible. Vegetables - Vegetables that are to be eaten

in a raw state should be washed well in clean, cold water, placed directly on the ice, or in a very cold place, to preserve their crispness. Lettuce should be carefully picked over and washed at once.

The foods that do not spoil so easily are eggs, butter, fruit such as apples, oranges and lemons, cooked meat, and cooked, salted and smoked fish.

Eggs-Care is necessary in the handling of eggs, as the spoiling is partly due to unclean handling, the shells being more or less porous. It is best to wash them as soon as you get them home. When only the yolk of an egg is used, the white may be kept in a cup or glass, covered with a damp cloth fastened with an elastic band; or, if only the white is used, the yolk can be kept in the same way.

Butter-Butter should be kept well covered and in a cool place.

Cooked Meat and Fish will keep much better if they are well covered before placed in the ice-box.

The foods that can be kept a long time with proper care are flour, salt, coffee, tea, all dried groceries, spices and chocolate. All these should be kept closely covered to keep out dust and dirt. Coffee, tea and spices will lose their flavor if left uncovered.

Cheese should be kept in a cool dry place. It should be wrapped in a clean cloth moistened with vinegar. This will prevent the formation of mould.




