COUNCIL IS NOT INTERFERING IN RAILWAY CASE

If trouble resulted, the whole blame would be laid at the door of the council. Controller Merryfield took a more charitable view

sulted, the whole blame would be laid at the door of the council. Controller Merryfield took a more charitable view of the matter. He said that the members of the board were evidently seeking information as to what had led the council to reject the company's application for increased fares. He believed that the council had concluded that the company could afford to pay the men a substantial increase out of its surplus earnings, and he thought the council should explain how it arrived at such a conclusion for the benefit of the board.

No Adjustment Yet.

When the meeting opened and after expressing his regret that the press was present. Judge Livingstone said that so far his board had failed to bring about an adjustment of the dispute. The company said that its financial condition was such that it was not in a position to make an increase. It was bound by an agreement with the city, and so could not increase its revenue. He did not presume to tell the council that it should take any action at all. However, he thought the council might have something to suggest that would bring about the desired result.

F. H. McGuigan, the company's representative, said that the men were entitled to a wage increase, but the company could not afford it. Last year it passed its dividend and paid its stockholders out of stock held in the treasury. If an increase in wages was given, and there was no increased revenue there would be nothing left but a receivership or else the stockholders go down in their pockets to make up the loss.

Chas. Ferguson, the men's representative, said he had nothing to add to what had been said.

GIGANTIC MERGER OF **EXPRESS COMPANIES** IN UNITED STATES

ed With Govt.'s Consent.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—One union xpress company for the United States express company for the United States was created today by agreement between Director-General McAdoo and the Adams, American, Wells-Fargo and Southern companies, whose transportation business will be merged under a new private corporation with a capital of more than \$30,000,000, to be known probably as the Federal Express Company. George C. Taylor, now president of the American Express Company, will of the American Express Company, will be the head of the new concern.

After July 1, when the combination becomes effective, shippers will direct shipments "by express" without regard to company, and soon thereafter the individual names of the separate companies will begin to disappear from wagons, stations and cars.

The company will be the express carrying agency of the railroads, operating privately, but under contract to turn over 50½ per cent of their gross revenue—more than \$200,000,000 last year—to the railroad for transportation privileges. The smaller railroad-owned

ompanies, the Western, Great North-rn and Northern, may join the combination later. nation later.
A pending application for ten per ent increase in rates filed before Government operation of railroads or the express combination were contemplated will be passed upon soon by the interstate comparee commission. tate commerce commission.
