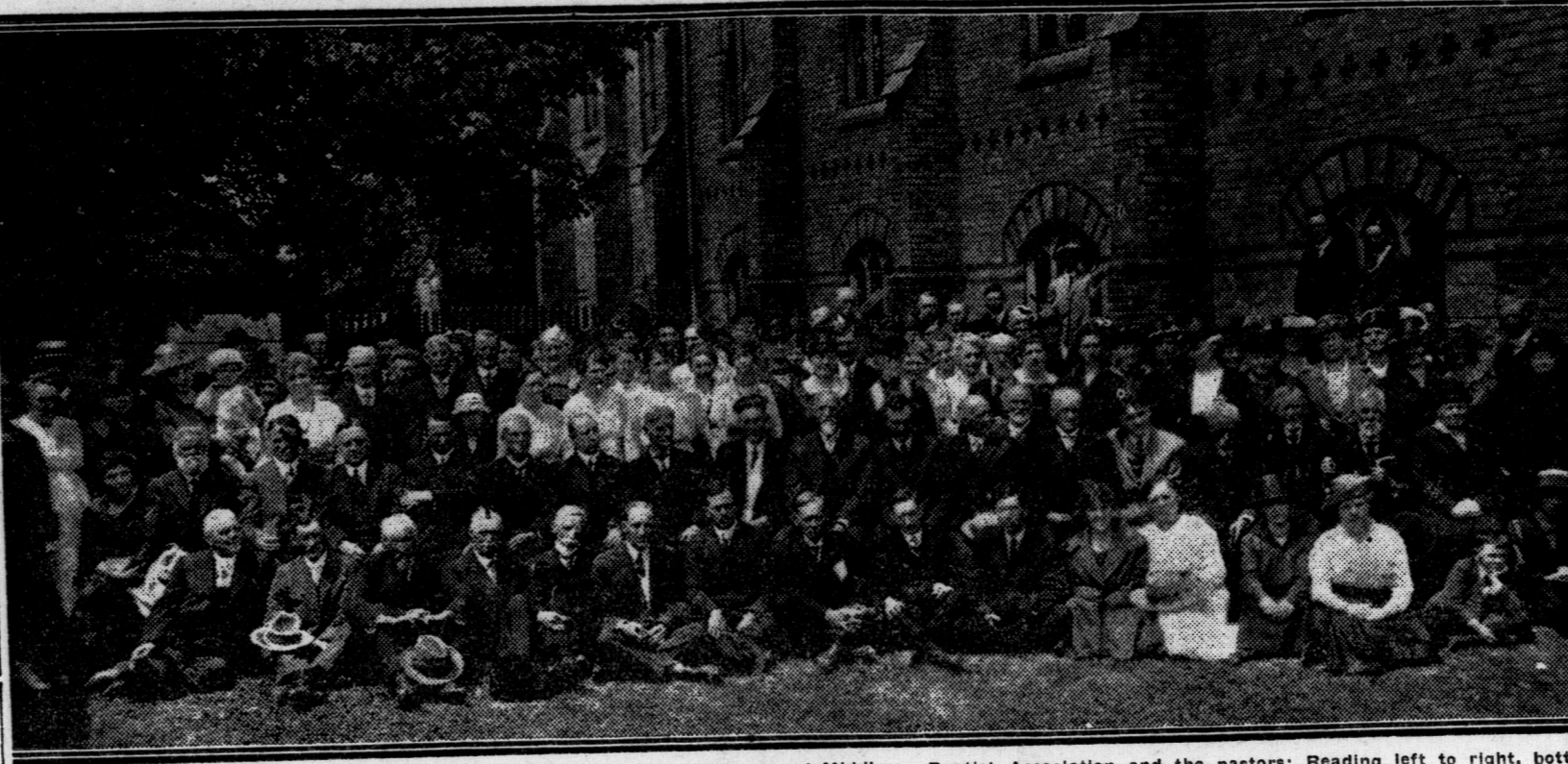

COUNTY COUNCIL PASSES GRANT FOR WESTERN

University Is Given \$100,000 For New Memorial Main Building.

SOME OPPOSITION MADE Vote Favoring Grant Increased When Yeas and Nays Called.

As a memorial to her fallen heroes in the great Western University grant of \$100,000 toward the erection of the main Arts Building of the new Western University on the Kingston farm west of the city. This was decided at a meeting of the county council last night. The memorial to the money will be made in five annual and equal instalments, commencing December next and will be covered by the issue of debentures without interest. There was some opposition to the grant and on demand of Councillor E. F. Reynolds, the yeas and nays were taken as follows: Yeas—Councillors Clark, Douglas, Brooks, Henry, McCall, Rossier, March, Harrison, Clatworthy, Ferguson, Peters, Oakes, Pickman, Campbell, Nicholson, Brown, McPherson and Fells. Nays—Councillors Holman, Reynolds, McLeish, Leach, Shiels, and Elliott.

Made Strong Appeal. Prior to the vote being taken, Mayor E. S. Little and Dean Sherwood Fox of Western University addressed the council. The finance committee a few moments before this had recommended that no action be taken on the recommendation of the special committee regarding the grant, and the council then went into committee as a whole with A. C. Ferguson, reeve of Lobo Township, acting as chairman. Mayor Little outlined the assistance granted to the Western University by the city, including the \$100,000 grant to the new medical school in January, 1919. He stated that the total cost would cost \$450,000 to complete and equip, and that private citizens had donated an additional \$100,000.

LUXURY TAX NOTES

Further information regarding the luxury tax has been received by the local branch of the inland revenue department, included in the list of taxable and non-taxable goods are several which hitherto were exempt, but which now are liable to the tax. Leather moccasins are included in the term "boots and shoes," and are liable to the luxury tax when sold in excess of \$9 per pair. Stamped postcards when printed are subject to the sales tax of 1 per cent as respects the cost of cards. Surgical instruments are not subject to the luxury tax, but the repair of products of the soil, such as sand, gravel, and unprocessed stone are not taxable, except when such which is quarried, crushed, or which passes through any process, is liable to the tax.

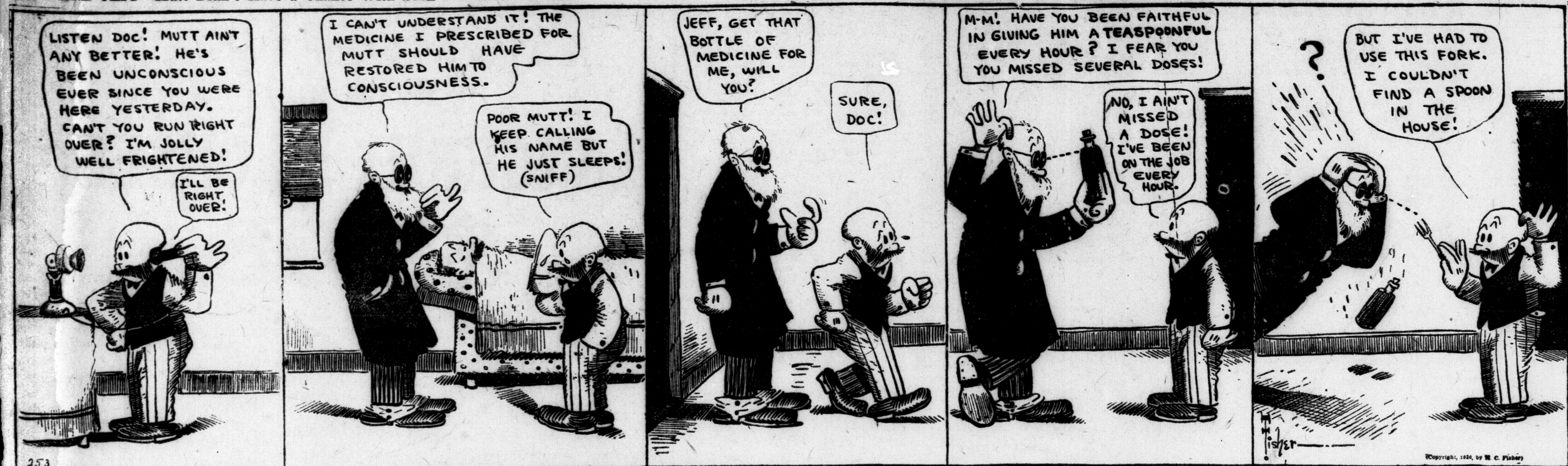

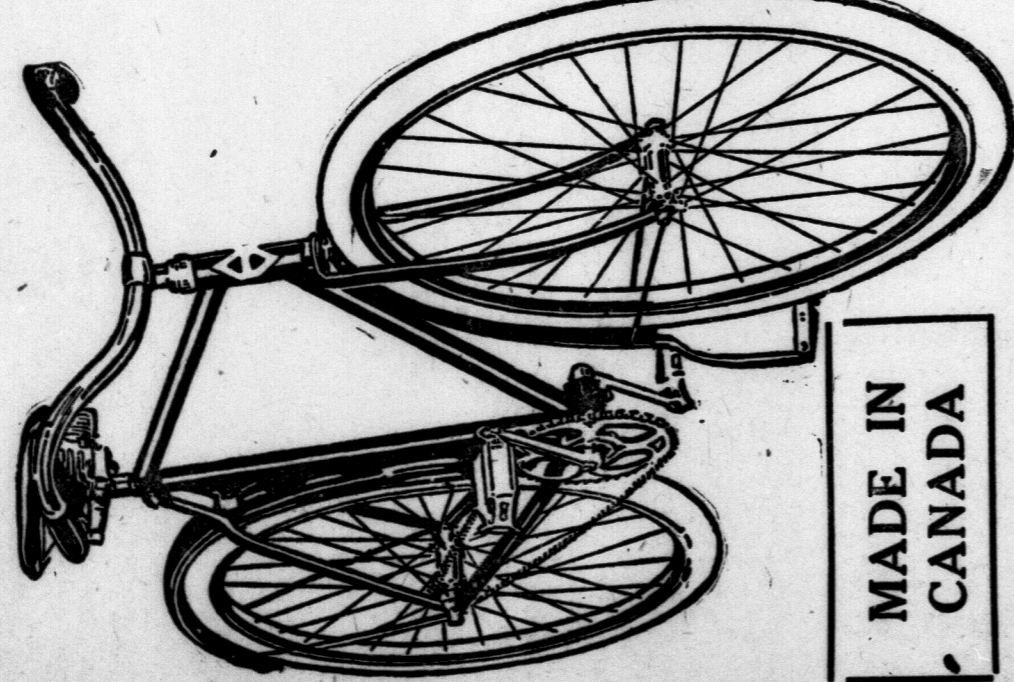

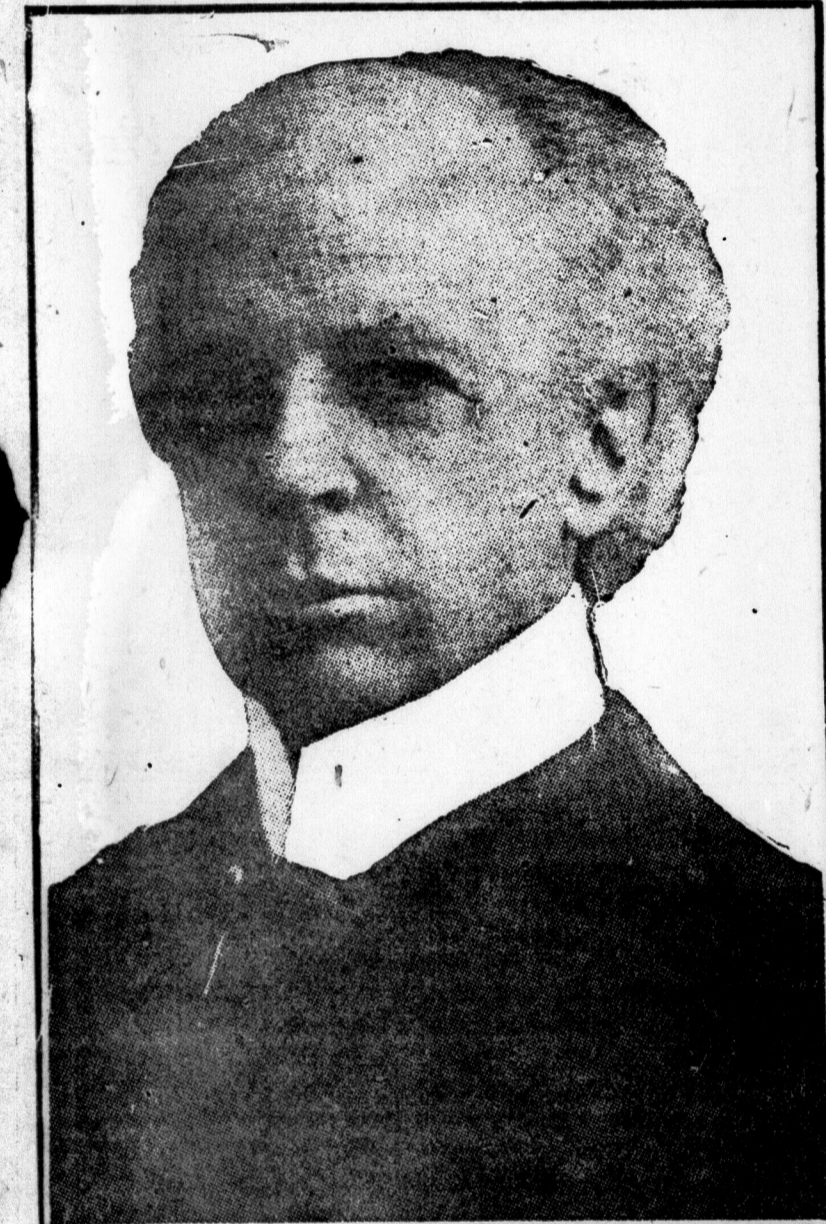

Increase of Scholars.
The report of the religious education presented by Rev. J. F. Knight showed within the conference 420 Sunday schools, a decrease of 9; 56,235 scholars, an increase of 463; missionary contributions, \$12,310 and total offerings from all sources, \$77,649, an increase over last year of \$5,486; 4,288 members were added to the church from Sunday schools and young people's societies.

Insufficient Receipts.
The contingent fund committee reported the receipts to the fund not sufficient to meet the requirements and recommended making an annual assessment upon the congregations of three-fifths of one per cent of the ministers' salaries towards its support. The committee also recommended that credit on superannuation funds be allowed to all the young men who by going overseas have been held back from beginning the ministry.

Message from the King.
The president read a cablegram received during the afternoon from King George, expressing his appreciation of the congratulations received from the conference of the Methodist Churches of Canada upon his birthday. The conference rose to its feet to receive the message and sang "God Save the King."

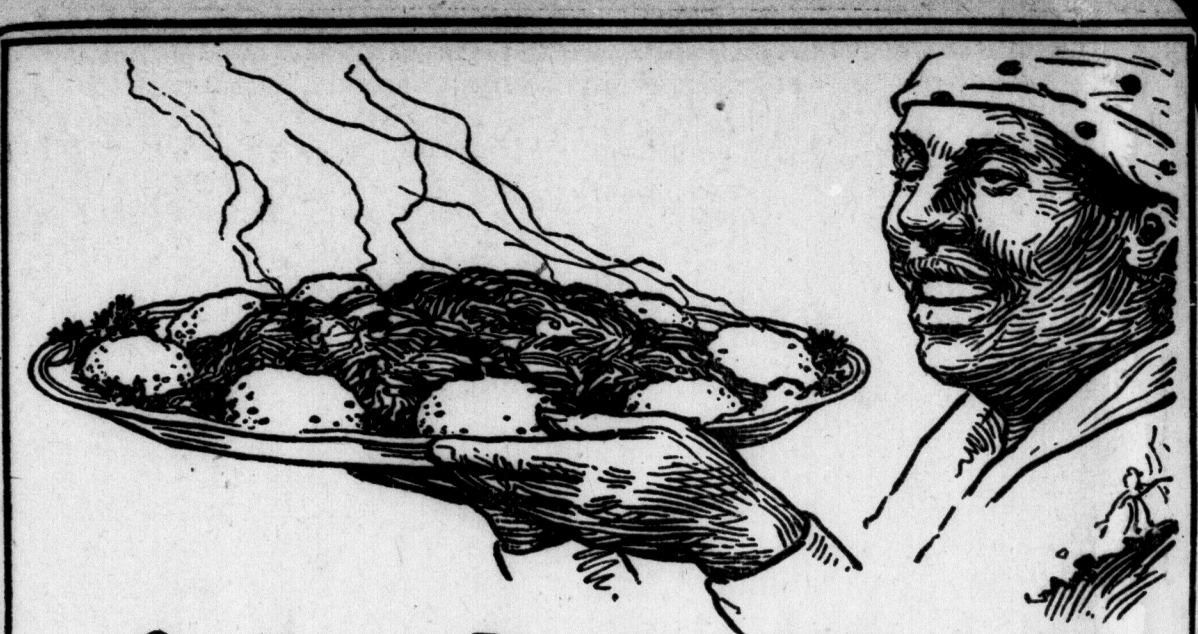
